Welcome to Saint Andrew's Church in the city of Tampa. You are sharing in a tradition of worship that has been offered here since 1883, when a wood-frame building was erected on this site as Tampa's first Episcopal Church. The cornerstone of the present church was laid in 1904.

Each Sunday we celebrate The Holy Eucharist at 8 a.m. (Rite I, said); and at 10:30 a.m. (Rite I on the first Sunday of the month, Rite II on the other Sundays), with choir. Please note that page numbers in the Order of Service refer to The Book of Common Prayer 1979 (red) and that the service music and hymns are to be found in The Hymnal 1982 (blue).\

A Reading from the Book of Genesis.

The servant said to Laban, "I am Abraham's servant. The Lord has greatly blessed my master, and he has become wealthy; he has given him flocks and herds, silver and gold, male and female slaves, camels and donkeys. And Sarah my master's wife bore a son to my master when she was old; and he has given him all that he has. My master made me swear, saying, 'You shall not take a wife for my son from the daughters of the Canaanites, in whose land I live; but you shall go to my father's house, to my kindred, and get a wife for my son.' I came today to the spring, and said, 'O Lord, the God of my master Abraham, if now you will only make successful the way I am going! I am standing here by the spring of water; let the young woman who comes out to draw, to whom I shall say, "Please give me a little water from your jar to drink," and who will say to me, "Drink, and I will draw for your camels also"-let her be the woman whom the Lord has appointed for my master's son.' Before I had finished speaking in my heart, there was Rebekah coming out with her water jar on her shoulder; and she went down to the spring, and drew. I said to her, 'Please let me drink.' She quickly let down her jar from her shoulder, and said, 'Drink, and I will also water your camels.' So I drank, and she also watered the camels. Then I asked her, 'Whose daughter are you?' Parish Building Refurbishment

Commentary on Today's Gospel

This week's gospel reading stretches over two separate pericopes in a section containing narratives that illustrate the authority claimed by Jesus (11:2-12:50). Each has a distinct message, and each shares some common concerns. Both of today's pericopes are within Matthew 11 -- a chapter devoted to answering a single question. In 11:2, the imprisoned John the Baptist sends his disciples to Jesus to ask, "Are you the one who is to come, or are we to wait for another?" Although Jesus' first response uses positive images, he soon begins to discuss the attitudes and outlooks of the generation that fails to see him as "the one who is to come."

Our text begins with the so-called "parable of the children" (vv. 16-17). These unusual verses seem to reflect both patterns of traditional children's behavior and gender roles in ancient Near Eastern culture, as well as subtly skewering adult behaviors and formalities. Jesus compares "this generation" -- that is, his own contemporaries -- to "children." Such a comparison hardly denotes a compliment.

The behavior these "children" are engaged in, however, adds further insult. They appear to be harassing one another for refusing to join in children's games: "We played the flute for you, and you did not dance; we wailed, and you did not mourn" (v. 17). The flute-playing and dancing are boys' games; both were part of men's celebratory activities at weddings. The "wailing" and "mourning" are part of another rite children could play-act. Women served as the official, sometimes even professional, mourners at funerals.

But Jesus' language also mixes up the behaviors of adults and children. It would be strange for children to be "sitting in the marketplace" while making these accusations at one another. Real children would be screaming and running around as they teased one another. Likewise the verb "calling" denotes a more formal style of "addressing" -- a decidedly adult style. "This generation," then, is most like adults who sit stiffly and look important -- but whose message is really little more than senseless childish ridicule.

Verse 25 in the second pericope contrasts the many who reject Jesus with the few who accept him. Those who hear Jesus' message and respond are called "infants," for theirs is a childlike faith (see Matthew 18:3, "Truly I tell you, unless you change and become like children, you will never enter the kingdom of heaven"). What these "infants" have had revealed to them is the knowledge that Jesus' miracles are not just isolated acts of wonder, but are inaugural signs of the approaching kingdom of God. Only those with childlike faith,

not those who boast great wisdom, are able to recognize these signs as true portents of the kingdom.
