May those who sorrow find comfort; the weary, rest; the troubled, peace; the lonely, friends; the unhappy, joy; and may all find the sense of God's presence in this Holy Place. Welcome to Saint Andrew's Church in the city of Tampa. You are sharing in a tradition of worship that has been offered here since 1883, when a wood-frame building was erected on this site as Tampa's first Episcopal Church. The cornerstone of the present church was laid in 1904.

All Visitors and Newcomers are invited to complete the information card, found on the back of the pews, and leave it with an usher or in the offering plate. Please introduce yourselves to the clergy as you leave the church and come to coffee hour in the parish hall after the 10:30 a.m. service.

Each Sunday we celebrate The Holy Eucharist at 8 a.m. (Rite I, said); and at 10:30 a.m. (Rite I on the first Sunday of the month, Rite II on the other Sundays), with choir. Please note that page numbers in the Order of Service refer to The Book of Common Prayer 1979 (red) and that the service music and hymns are to be found in The Hymnal 1982 (blue).

At Your Service: Stay warm at Saint Andrews: Borrow a shawl from the basket at the back of the church. Shawl donations also welcomed!

Nathan said to the king, "Go, do all that you have in mind; for the Lord is with you." But that same night the word of the Lord came to Nathan: Go and tell my servant David: Thus says the Lord: Are you the one to build me a house to live in? I have not lived in a house since the day I brought up the people of Israel from Egypt to this day, but I have been moving about in a tent and a tabernacle. Wherever I have moved about among all the people of Israel, did I ever speak a word with any of the tribal leaders of Israel, whom I commanded to shepherd my people Israel, saying, "Why have you not built me a house of cedar?" Now therefore thus you shall say to my servant David: Thus says the Lord of hosts: I took you from the pasture, from following the sheep to be prince over my people Israel; and I have been with you wherever you went, and have cut off all your enemies from before you; and I will make for you a great name, like the name of the great ones of the earth. And I will appoint a place for my people Israel and will plant them, so that they may live in their own place, and be disturbed no more; and evildoers shall afflict them no more, as formerly, from the time that I appointed judges over my people Israel; and I will give you rest from all your enemies. Moreover the Lord declares to you that the Lord will make you a house. Your house and your kingdom shall be made sure forever before me; your throne shall be established forever.

Sermon

Nicene Creed (stand)

For in these last days you sent him to be incarnate from the Virgin Mary, to be the Savior and Redeemer of the world. In him, you have delivered us from evil, and made us worthy to stand before you. In him, you have brought us out of error into truth, out of sin into righteousness, out of death into life.

Commentary on Today's Lesson

Christmas is tomorrow. Today's Fourth Sunday of Advent reading is among the most significant passages of the Bible. Christian people believe that the coming of Jesus is the fulfilment of God's long-ago promises to King David and God's people.

When is a house not a house? And who will build a special house for whom? 2 Samuel 7 has a fascinating wordplay on the multiple meanings of one Hebrew word and one English word. The Hebrew word *bayit* (pronounced "BUY-it") appears 15 times in the chapter; the NRSV translates it as "house" every time. But, depending on the context, *bayit* actually means *palace, temple or dynasty* (elsewhere it can mean *clan, family or nation*, as in "the 'house' of Judah"). *Bayit* becomes *beth*- when it's immediately followed by a noun it's (technically speaking) "in construct with." *Beth*- is used as a part of place names, such as Beth-el ("the house of God" -- Genesis 28:15-19) and Beth-lehem ("house of bread" -- Genesis 35:19; Micah 5:2 = Matthew 2:6. Jesus is the bread of life -- John 6:32-35, 48).

King David had settled in his own *house*, a cedar *palace*. Now he wanted to build a *temple* for the Lord. At first the prophet Nathan agreed. But the Lord gave Nathan a more complex message to pass on to David. (Nathan was willing to let his first impressions be adjusted by God.) The Lord had never asked for a permanent temple, but had been quite content to travel around with and dwell with his people in a portable structure -- a tent-tabernacle. There, people had experienced God's glorious presence in "the ark of God" (v. 2), the ark of the covenant. The ark was a ceremonial chest (usually kept in the most holy place of the tabernacle and later the temple) which graphically showed both the Lord's powerful, frightening, comforting and protecting *presence* with his people and his *leading* his people on their journeys and into holy war.

Prior to 2 Samuel 7, David had conquered Jebusite Jerusalem and established "the city of David" as the centralized capital of Judah (the southern tribes) and Israel (the northern tribes), which he had somewhat united by being king of both. In 2 Samuel 6, he had brought the ark to Jerusalem and placed it in the tent.

Rather than having David build a house for the Lord, the Lord promised to build a house for David (v. 11b), meaning a *dynasty*, as verses 12 ff. make clear. David's line would last "forever" (*'olam --* vv. 13 and 16). It would be David's son Solomon who would actually build the *temple --* verses 12-13; 1 Chronicles 22:7-10; 1 Kings 7–8.

It is important to go beyond the lectionary reading to the rest of the chapter. Nine of 2 Samuel 7's 15 uses of *bayit* / house appear there. The dynasty might be threatened, but it would not be destroyed. David's prayer (vv. 18-29) makes clear that the well-being of God's people would be closely linked with God's promise to be with David and his descendants upon the throne (cf. 5:10, 12). God, whose own name was great (v. 26), promised David: "I will make for you a great name" (v. 9). The Lord also would provide for God's *people* by settling them now that God had given David rest from his enemies (vv. 1, 11).

The concept of covenant (Hebrew *berit* -- pronounced buh-REET) pervades much of the theology of the Hebrew Bible / OT. Among the many last words of David, see 2 Samuel 23:5: "Is not my house [*bayit*] like this with God? For he has made with me an everlasting covenant [*berit 'olam*], ordered in all things and secure" Covenant / *berit* can mean a treaty, agreement or arrangement. In theological settings, it delineates a mutual relationship, initiated and given by God.

The promises that God made to David and his successors would later be understood messianically, as each king was *anointed*. "Messiah" -- *mashiah* (hard "h") in Hebrew -- means "anointed one." NT writers believed that Jesus Christ, in the legal line of David, was the ultimate fulfillment of those dynastic promises to David (see Matthew 1:1-18a; Luke 1:30-33; 2:1-14; Acts 2:29-36; Romans 1:1-4; 2 Timothy 2:8; Revelation 22:16). God has, in grace, fulfilled his covenantal dynastic promises. "Jesus, Lord, at thy birth" (in "Silent Night") will come to be called not only "King of the Jews," but also "King of kings and Lord of lords" (the greatest king and highest lord) of all humanity. We receive God's Christmas Gift and trustingly follow him.
