Reverently Speaking

You are the salt of the earth; but if salt has lost its taste, how can its saltiness be restored?

—Matthew 5:13

Dear People of St. Andrew's,

Did you know that Jesus was a member of the world's oldest profession? No, not *that* profession! The truly oldest profession was declared by God in Genesis 2:15 when the first human being was put in the garden and divinely ordered to “tend and till the garden.” So the world's oldest profession is gardening.

Gardening remains the passion of millions of Americans (75 million of us, making gardening America's #1 leisure activity). Nowadays, most tillers of the soil have an awareness of our ecological connections. In gardening organics are definitely “in”, the “cides” (pesticides, herbicides) are “out.” Instead of stocking up on toxic sprays, savvy gardeners are picking up sacks of lady bugs, bats and praying mantis. Even those who make their living from contained chemical warfare have tried to resculpt their image. Lawn care specialists have exchanged names such as “ChemLawn” for more environmentally friendly monikers, such as “Ecoscape.”

Just as the First Adam was called to be a gardener, so too was Jesus, the Second Adam. (Remember: In what form did Jesus first appear after his resurrection? Why did Mary fail to recognize him? Who did she think he was?) Jesus constantly used agricultural images. He talked more like a gardener than a rabbi. There is a definite “earthiness” to all of his sayings. When Jesus called his disciples to be “the salt of the earth,” he was comparing their role in the world to the role the dungheap played in the agricultural practices of his day. Salt, like manure, was not of any use when clumped together by itself. Salt and manure were meant to be worked into the soil - enriching the productivity of the whole field with their presence.

Christians are called to stimulate the growth of truth and righteousness - to increase the production of goodness in the world. The church, the body of Christ, is the salt - the dungheap, the compost pile, the manure that must find its way into and fertilize the barren soil of lonely, hopeless souls.

Like a pinch of leaven in the dough; like a sprinkle of salt or a shovelful of manure in the flowerbed; or even like a single simple carpenter's son wandering within a tiny, primitive country, God has always had a way of making a little go a long way.

Salt is a doubly descriptive image of this principle at work. As well as being a kind of soul-enriching fertilizer, salt also makes us thirsty. Bars know that by putting out free snacks like salty peanuts and pretzels they will increase patrons' thirst and thus their drink (*continued*)

sales. In the same way the church as salt should stimulate the thirst of others for the good things of God, for the amazing things of the Spirit.

Jesus loved images of growth. The “good seed,” the mustard seed, the dying seed - all are gardening parables of growth. After Pentecost, when the church was called into being by the presence of the Holy Spirit, it was designated as a growing thing - the body of Christ. Thus we are all called to be gardeners - no matter what else we may be doing. And what do gardeners do? Gardeners grow things. As members of the body of Christ, we are called to grow a life, grow a soul, grow a community.

A cartoon in *The New Yorker* showed a preacher in one of those open, wrought-iron pulpits much like the one at St. Andrew’s. The preacher, visible head-to-toe, is highly exercised. In one of the front pews, a child is bending to his mother and saying: “Mommy, what will he do if he gets out of there?”

Being salt, fertilizing postmodern cultural barrenness, means getting deep beneath the hard-baked surface. It requires mixing things up, turning the top to the bottom again and again until all the old stratifications in the soil have been destroyed. Preachers permanently perched in their pulpits, and congregations glued to their pews, are useless sterile clumps.

The rediscovery of organic substances and methods for growing rich, healthy crops underlines the way God would have the “salt of the earth” work in the midst of this Christ-starved culture. We are not to artificially impose attitudes that will stimulate unnatural growth in one part of the body while damaging another. The spirit of God is manifest in liberal and conservative, Protestant and Catholic, male and female, black and white, rich and poor. Fertilizing the soil will bring forth a variety of crops, not just one. God has always been a great proponent of both biodiversity and spiritual diversity.

Is St. Andrew’s ready to exchange its stained glass image for a more “earthy,” more “salty” one? The honored place which the church has been called to inhabit is in the midst of the world's dungheaps, as salt for the earth.

The Almighty and Francis of Assisi: A Conversation

FRANCIS: They cut down trees and grind them up to make the mulch.

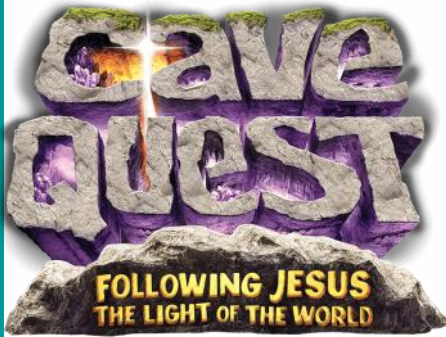
GOD: Enough! I don't want to think about this anymore. Saint Catherine, you're in charge of the arts. What movie have you scheduled for us tonight?

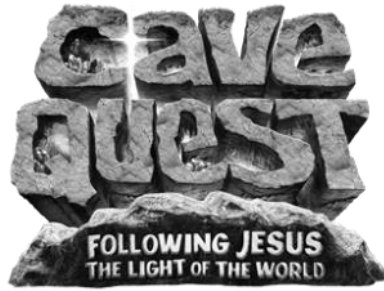

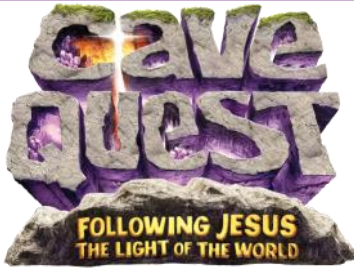

Hollywood Jesus: A Small Group Study Connecting Christ and Culture

Matt Rawle, Pastor of The Well United Methodist Church in Ponchatoula, Louisiana, is on a mission. He sees Christ all around him - in books, movies, TV shows, rock music - and he wants to share what he sees. As Matt says, "God offers the raw ingredients, and 'culture' is whatever we cook up." *Hollywood Jesus* is Rawle's study of Jesus and Christ figures in films including *Cool Hand Luke*, *The Lion King*, *The Truman Show*, and *One Flew Over the Cuckoo's Nest*. Explore what happens when script meets Scripture, when pop culture encounters the King of kings and Lord of lords. *Hollywood Jesus* is a four-week study that explores some of cinema's most famous Jesus movies, as well as movies that have nothing to do with Jesus but teach important truths about our faith, in order to discover what we can learn from the Jesus of Hollywood and how film can be a medium for spreading the Gospel message.

Here we see how the powerful forces of evil can be and are being overthrown through the victory of Jesus the Messiah and the consequent costly victory of his followers.

March Vestry Meeting Highlights

Rector's Report – Fr. Reese:

- As of 3/14/16, there was \$223K in ops account. There is \$135K in the Foundation's checking/CDs – monies available to the vestry. We also have \$38K available from the Foundation principal as a result of the 2.25% spending allocation designated by the Foundation Board for 2015. We have another \$43K available from the Foundation principal as a result of the 2.5% spending allocation designated by the Foundation Board for 2016 at their meeting on 2/8/16. We have \$69K in the parish reserve account. And there was \$1,724,209 in the Foundation principal as of 12/31. There is also about \$89K in the Dan Curtis fund fbo St. Andrew's within the Community Foundation of Tampa Bay, with \$3,794 in unused grant money available from 2015 and approximately \$3,400 in grant money to be made available to us for 2016 (these monies are restricted to being spent on building maintenance).
- Stewardship Campaign – We currently have 182 pledges for \$453,959 (as compared to 174 pledges for 438K in 2015). So we have about \$16K more in pledges for 2016 as compared to 2015 – that's a 4% increase. This should ensure a balanced budget for 2016.
- Bach Bash – on Thursday, March 31, at 6:30pm beginning at Sacred Heart, then moving to St. Andrew's. Great organ and choral music of Johann Sebastian, followed by Bach birthday cake in our parish hall.
- Parish Picnic – on Sunday, May15 at 1:30pm at the home of Earl and Jan Smith in Lutz. Once again, the Smiths are opening their lovely home site to the parish. Please plan to stop by that afternoon. Parish Life will provide the drinks, burgers, and hot dogs.
- Church office computers - Our computer guru, Jose Remon, will do our Windows 10 upgrade right after Easter.
- Possible Tenants for upper floors – Emailed Fr. George Corrigan, pastor of Sacred Heart, on March 15. They are still interested in leasing 4th and 5th floors to use as Sunday School space – even though we are not interested in building a gargantuan parking garage on our lot. He wrote, "I am just trying to get the right people together to look, given there would be a great deal of visioning and remodeling needed. We will definitely get back to you."

Senior Warden's Report – Jeff Coleman:

Discussed taking time at the upcoming retreat to talk about welcoming newcomers—sending letters, doing follow-up. Noted that Fr. Reese has the key to the new glassed-in bulletin board in the parish hall which can possibly serve to promote newcomers. A request was made that when the office software is upgraded after Easter, that wi-fi be made available in the narthex. Jeff also spoke about the St. Pete Times doing a story on the upcoming Guatemala trip, and suggested others contact newspapers with newsworthy type events

A motion was made by Irene Baker to spend the \$1K for wi-fi. Jim Morgan seconded. After no further discussion, the motion passed.

Funds matched the pledge for last year and exceeded it, looking forward to a good year. The parking lot across the street will be available for Easter this year. Scott Silverman offered to man the lot this year.

Committee Reports:

Christian Ed: Jim Morgan

Discussed the Easter Egg Hunt and a different way Alicia had planned to do that this year.

Parish Life: Amy Ramirez

Facebook- St. Andrew’s has a Facebook page that is password protected and she is trying to get that password because she wants to be able to post updates, responses etc. She passed around a sign-up sheet for goodies for after the 9:30am service Easter Day. Also suggested the column/post in the parish hall be divided among four of the various committees to pin up items of interest for that committee. Suggested various committee members speak about their committees during a service to let parishioners know more about what it is and how they could volunteer if interested.

Helping Hands: Irene Baker

Would like a series of volunteers to be responsible for one month out of the year for funeral services. Would like the notice regarding shawls be put closer to the beginning of the weekly bulletin.

Outreach: Holly Clemmons

Noted this is the last Sunday for Easter Boxes of Hope so will request a check be made out for delivery to Metropolitan Ministries. Discussed the “Primero de Mayo” event coming up, all is nicely on schedule there. Brought up the subject of reviving St. Andrew’s participation in the Dominican Project and discussed the various ways to participate.

Junior Warden’s report – George Levy:

George presented proposals regarding the scope of work and the costs for the repair of the church building’s exterior and stucco remediation. It was noted that estimates generally take at least a month, and time is getting short to get the necessary work done before the summer rains. The proposal by Painting by Ritz included pressure cleaning, installing proper sealants, re-caulking areas as needed, patching of cracks and voids, replacement of stucco where needed, repairing and repainting cracks at three entry steps and landings and more. The cost of this work is \$42,400.00 and has a 7-year labor plus material warranty.

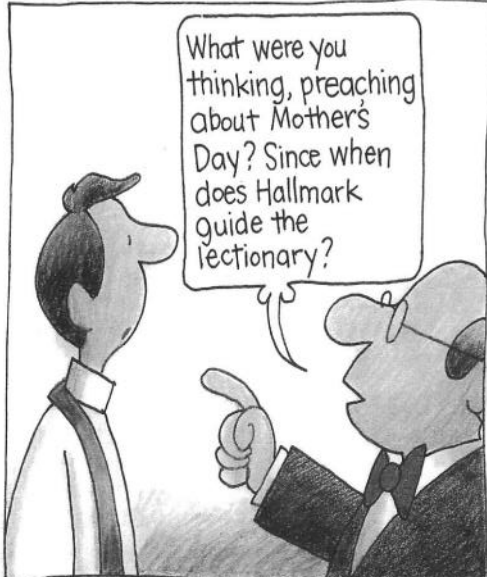
