Dear People of St. Andrew's,

Those of us who remember the 1970s and 1980s can recall that two of the greatest innovations in technology were the microwave oven and the VHS recorder. We no longer had to wait 45 minutes for a TV dinner, nor did we have to be in front of the TV at the time our favorite show was airing. We were no longer slaves to the TV Guide schedule and our frozen vittles could be ready to eat in just a few minutes. Good times, good times.

Our current revolution in the sphere of technology is, of course, the smart phone. Naturally, some phones are smarter than other phones, but that's all part of Samsung's and Apple's master plans to increase sales in perpetuity.

Some folks would argue that technology has become our master. But smartphones, like all techie thingies, can provide a wonderful service.

So I am not urging you to 'un-plug.' While my son accuses me of being a technological Luddite, I actually enjoy using my semi-smart phone, along with my computer. For me, staying wired in, tuned in, plugged in, in touch, connected and online when it is appropriate is not only a huge benefit; I happen to like it and appreciate it.

Some folks say that Jesus unplugged. They say that Jesus went to the garden alone to pray. (Well, actually, he didn't. He took his friends, but they fell asleep.) They claim that Jesus went to the wilderness alone to pray (but only because the Spirit "drove" him into the wilderness, not because he wanted to go off by himself). They argue that Jesus went into the mountains across the lake to get away from the crowds and to renew his spiritual reserves (but with those crowds, who can blame him?).

That was then. Jesus didn't have a smartphone. I do. Jesus didn't have a computer. I do. So don't try and tell me what Jesus would do today or wouldn't do today. How can we know?

In any case, I am certainly not Jesus. And I do not feel the need for a technology fast. I am not in search of a juniper tree in the wilderness perchance to hear the "still, small voice" of the divine presence while dining on bread and water.

Clearly, turning off technology is no virtue unless we're turning on to something else even more valuable. Perhaps, many of us do not know what that is. So, I turn off my phone and leave my laptop at home. Now what? What will I do? What should I do? There's no particular virtue in simply disconnecting. It's silly to suggest otherwise. Here's what you might do:

Plan your summer vacation time with enthusiasm. What books are you going to read? Where are you going to read them - on the beach, on a dock, in a forest glade? Are you going to write? How many words? Are you going to visit museums? What do you hope to learn?

See what I mean? Plan your time away. Get excited! And don't worry about whether you're going to take along the tech gadgets. Of course you are. Thank God for these marvelous devices. Woo-hoo! And you will turn them on, and turn them off, according to your good pleasure and on your own terms, after reflecting on how your gadgets will best serve your purpose and intentions.

Technology has a power-off button. And the wisest of us know when to use it.

New Assisting Priest

The Rector is pleased to announce that The Rev. Ralph M. Campbell II will be joining the staff as Assisting Priest, effective July 1. Fr. Rick will be with us each Sunday morning, will preach about one Sunday per month, and provide pastoral care and visitation of the homebound and shut-ins.

Fr. Campbell was raised in Ohio and graduated from Ohio University in 1969 with a BA in history. Responding to the Lord's call, he attended The General Theological Seminary in New York and received a Masters of Divinity degree in church history in 1973. He was ordained a priest on November 30th, 1975.


Fr. Campbell served in the Diocese of Oregon from 1974 to 2005 and was Rector of St Timothy's, Salem, for 26 years. He developed a comprehensive prayer-book based Christian formation process from pre-school to adult using Episcopal resources - Godly Play for children, Journey to Adulthood for teens, the Catechumenate for adults preparing for Holy Baptism, and Cursillo. During his tenure at St Timothy's, Fr. Rick brought the parish to self-supporting status, and guided the parish in a \$500,000 building expansion.

In 2006 Fr. Campbell became Rector of St Ann's Parish, Sayville, Long Island, retiring in 2010 and moving to Florida in 2011. He is licensed to serve not only in the Diocese of Long Island, where he is a canonically resident priest in good standing, but also in the Diocese of Ohio and the Diocese of Southwest Florida, where he has served as a supply priest.

Fr. Rick is honored to be called as assisting priest at St Andrew's. He believes it is a privilege to serve all of you. He looks forward to a fulfilling ministry at St Andrew's through worship, teaching, and pastoral care.

As an aside, Fr Rick last served at St Andrew's Parish, Long Island. His oldest son's baptismal name is Andrew, as is the patron saint of Scotland. And he was ordained priest on St Andrew's Day, November 30th. It seems fitting that he is now called to serve at St Andrew's, Tampa, the mother church of the Diocese of Southwest Florida.

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St. Andrew's Choir in Guatemala: Music with a Mission

I embarked on this trip as "the person who has been to Guatemala twice already," as "the trip planner," as "the designated interpreter," as "the crazy girl who thought of bringing her choir to a third world country," and lots of other titles, both self-imposed and given to me by others. I wanted to see what the Anglican Communion had to offer a visiting choir in a country where its presence is recent (last century), as opposed to the country that is the cradle of the church. I don't mean to say that traveling to England and singing at one of the many beautiful cathedrals in the summer is not a worthy, fulfilling trip. Preparing for, and then singing, nightly Evensong for a week is hard work. That, interspersed with touring opportunities can be a source of great camaraderie for a choir. I recommend that every Episcopal church choir member participate in such a trip, at least once in their life, if their choir is ever offered the opportunity. However, this trip to Guatemala, which I had envisioned as just "something different, but still Episcopal" was so much more than I could ever have anticipated.

In looking back, I can now compare this trip not only to my experience at Winchester Cathedral with the Choir of St. Andrew's in 2014, but also to my experience in the Dominican Republic doing "traditional mission work" (construction/painting) through the Diocese of Southwest Florida in the summer of 2013. I initially would not have thought to compare this trip to my week in the Dominican Republic, but it was actually much more similar to that, than to the UK trip. Our interactions with the Dominicans on that trip were in order to aid them to experience a fuller worship experience by helping them to finish building their church, and by spending time to get to know them as people. Our assistance was seen as vital so that they could complete their construction project and have a solid church to serve as a house of worship, a storm shelter, and a place for community and fellowship.

What I did not realize until we were in the midst of the trip, was that a choir can also bring something vital to a growing, newer Episcopal Church: a choir can bring its spirit and the great gift of the vast and beautiful heritage of church music. Everywhere we interacted with Episcopalians, they yearned for the gifts we brought; gifts we truly did not realize we were bringing until after they were given. In Guatemala City, the congregants were expatriates who yearned to hear music sung in four parts, as they remembered it from churches past in the U.S., Canada, Europe or elsewhere in the Americas. In Chuguexa, the congregants could neither read nor write, but had learned the melody line to hymns from our hymnal by rote, and were truly amazed and astonished to hear those same hymns sung in FOUR PARTS. They had never heard music sung in four parts before! To them, it was a sound brought to them from God, shared by brothers and sisters that did not look like they did, but who shared a communion table with them, equal before God. In Antigua, the audience at our concert was made up of expatriates, indigenous locals, Catholics, Episcopalians, and probably those who worshiped at other churches or none at all. They were brought together by the common language of music, and the need for beauty to decorate and enhance their daily lives. Finally, to the congregation at St. Alban's mission where we sang for Sunday services in a small room in a commercial building, which the church rents for use on Sundays, where we outnumbered the congregation, and we all sat around in a circle for an intimate and moving service in the heat, we brought music from their past, or music they had never heard at all. 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It was such a simple gift to give, and didn't require hammers, nails, paint, experience working with rebar, or concrete, or any of the other skills associated with "mission work." We didn't bring medical supplies or food (although we did bring t-shirts to the children in Chuguexa, and instruments to the children of the Orquestina). We brought ourselves, the gifts we give our own congregations every single Sunday. That gift, alone, the gift of our time and talent (not our treasure), was what was valued the most by every person with whom we interacted on this trip. I hope I have been able to provide you all with at least a glimpse of the gratitude for our TIME and our TALENT we witnessed from each person with whom we interacted throughout our trip. We are not world-renowned recording artists. We are a church choir. Perhaps not every church choir can sing our repertoire, but every church choir speaks the language of music. Every church choir has a gift to bring to the people in developing Episcopal communities and countries. Every church choir will grow and learn as people and as a choir from their experience of sharing these gifts with those who yearn to share the language of music with them.

I want to share some words from Fr. Ricardo Frohmader in Guatemala City:

Please relay these few words to all of the participants in the Saint Andrew's choir visit to Guatemala. At Saint James we feel we have been blessed by your presence and your voices. We loved your singing. It brought us closer to the divine dimension we strive to reach. We were also happy to have fostered a worship experience for you with a Mayan K'ich'é group of Episcopalians. The good folk at San Mattías will not soon forget your visit.

Also, a few words from Bishop Armando Guerra:

I join Fr. Ricardo, in telling you how much we appreciate your contribution to our life as the Episcopal Church of Guatemala.. God bless you all.

I learned so much about myself and about what I value as an Episcopalian, as a Christian, and as a musician on this trip. I hope I have ignited a spark in a least one or two other people who will want to reach out to congregations in other countries to engage in a musical mission. Finally, I also learned that successful blogging is best defined as frequent but very SHORT blogging! Thank you, my readers, for your patience. I plan to put this knowledge to use on the next one, which I hope will be soon! Until then...

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April Vestry Meeting Highlights

Rector's Report:

- As of 4/4/16, there was \$224K in ops account. There is \$135K in the Foundation's checking/CDs monies available to the vestry. We also have \$38K available from the Foundation principal as a result of the 2.25% spending allocation designated by the Foundation Board for 2015. We have another \$43K available from the Foundation principal as a result of the 2.5% spending allocation designated by the Foundation Board for 2016 at their meeting on 2/8/16. We have \$67K in the parish reserve account. And there was \$1,724,209 in the Foundation principal as of 12/31. There is also \$90K in the Dan Curtis fund fbo St. Andrew's within the Community Foundation of Tampa Bay, with \$3,794 in unused grant money available from 2015 and approximately \$3,400 in grant money to be made available to us for 2016 (these monies are restricted to being spent on building maintenance).
- Easter Day All went well with good attendance at all three services. Great job on the coffee hour food there was plenty of it and it tasted great! Thanks, vestry folk!
- Bach Bash on Thursday, March 31, at 6:30pm beginning at Sacred Heart, then moving to St. Andrew's. Great organ and choral music of Johann Sebastian, followed by Bach birthday cake in our parish hall.
- Church office computers Our computer guru, Jose Remon, did our Windows 10 upgrade on March 30 and April 5. The church now has Wi-fi as well.
- Choir Trip to Guatemala half the choir will be in Central America for two Sundays (April 17-24). We wish them well on this goodwill tour!
- Mother's Day Brunch will be on Mother's Day, Sunday, May 8 after both services. All men are
 invited to help with preparing the food.
- Parish Picnic on Sunday, May 15 at 1:30pm at the home of Earl and Jan Smith in Lutz. Once again, the Smiths are opening their lovely home site to the parish. Please plan to stop by that afternoon. Parish Life will provide the drinks, burgers, and weenies.
- Vestry Reduction perhaps the fact that we had only 4 nominees for vestry this year is a sign from above that we should shrink the vestry down to 12 members.
- Rector Away on Sunday, April 3. Fr. Rich filled in while I was in Charlotte for the youth travel team ice hockey national championship tournament.
- Possible Tenants for upper floors Emailed Fr. George Corrigan, pastor of Sacred Heart, on March 15. They are still interested in leasing 4th and 5th floors to use as Sunday School space even though we are not interested in building a gargantuan parking garage on our lot. He wrote, "I am just trying to get the right people together to look, given there would be a great deal of visioning and remodeling needed. We will definitely get back to you." (continued)

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Senior Warden's Report-Jeff Coleman:

Junior Warden's report-George Levy:

George said some small repairs had been done. Church microphone was fixed: it only needed the connection tightened. George has all contracts signed for church repairs and the contract contains wording to include the southeast corner for the cricket repair. We are tabling roofing repairs until after known leaks are repaired. Alex Ritzheimer of Painting by Ritz requested deposit. Loueita will send a letter to request funds from the Foundation.

Treasurer's report-Peter Baker:

Revenue from parking slightly below expenses, just about even.

Peter Baker moved the previous minutes be corrected to reflect the Foundation is paying for the \$5K deposit to Painting By Ritz. Irene Baker seconded. Motion carried unanimously with no discussion.

Irene Baker moved that the 3K gutter repair would be paid from the Dan Curtis fund. Motion was seconded by Peter Baker. Motion carried unanimously with no discussion.

Outreach report-Loueita Hargens:

Collected \$350 for Easter Boxes of Hope. Added \$50 and delivered check to Metropolitan Ministries for \$400. Primero de Mayo fundraiser for May 1 is going well and on target.

Helping Hands report-Irene Baker:

Calling for volunteers to be on call when group goes to Guatemala.

Parish Life report-Amy Ramirez:

Long discussion regarding Facebook and the fact there are two different pages representing St. Andrew's. One is automatically generated by Facebook when users post what they are interested in, and is not affiliated with or endorsed by anyone associated with the topic. Parish Picnic is coming up. All are requested to bring a dish.

Old Business: Scott Silverman reported the old copier company is in bankruptcy. Discussed getting rid of it. Al may know of a recycler that will take it.

New Business: Al Getz reported that the Diocesan Vestry Retreat on May 7 is set. Carpool discussed. Jeff Coleman asked about communication and could there be a committee for that; Amy Ramirez reported Parish Life is the logical site for that along with other marketing ideas and an online presence. Signage for the church was discussed.


