Reverently Speaking

Listen, I will tell you a mystery! We will not all die, but we will all be changed, in a moment, in the twinkling of an eye, at the last trumpet. For the trumpet will sound, and the dead will be raised imperishable, and we will be changed. —1 Corinthians 15:51-52

Dear People of St. Andrew's,

We are about to move into Holy Week, where we focus on the passion and crucifixion of our Lord Jesus Christ. Death and dying are not easy to figure out, but three things can help you with it: a carrot, an egg, and some coffee.

Take the carrot and put it into boiling water. Do the same with the egg and the ground coffee. Let them boil in the very hot water for twenty minutes. Then shut off the stove and take out the carrot. You will find that the carrot was very hard and firm when you put it into the water, but very soft when you took it out. Some people are like carrots. They go through life hard and tough, always keeping a stiff upper lip, a bit emotionally detached, thinking they can handle everything themselves. When death happens to a loved one, though, and they get boiled, the carrot people soften up and allow God to work inside of them, realizing that they cannot make it without God.

Then take a look at the egg you boiled for twenty minutes. It is now a hardboiled egg. Before you put the egg in, it would have been all runny if you had broken it, but now it was firm. Some folks go through life as eggs, flexible and useful, doing so many things (since they can be sunny side up, poached, fried, scrambled, or over easy). Life is good because God has blessed them in so many ways. But when death comes to a loved one, they totally change and harden up. They become angry at God and wonder why death had to intrude on their lives. And, from that point onward, they live a hard-boiled existence.

Finally, look at the coffee and put it in a cup. It smells wonderful and tastes great. It, too, had been in the boiling water but, instead of being changed like the carrot and egg, it changed the water. That's the way I think most of us would like to be. We want to be part of the change and be with God through the whole process of dying. In dying we become rich because we are now a part of God's kingdom, something God has planned for a long time. Being part of the change means talking with God in prayer, sharing our lives with our friends, and putting away all of our fears of death. Death is the natural way that God calls us from this world to the new world.

Remember, Good Friday was not God's last word. Things looked bad on that Friday, but Sunday was coming. After death, there was life – resurrection life. And God promises that we, too will experience that same resurrection life Jesus enjoyed on that first Easter Day.

God does not want us to go through life as a carrot or an egg. It is best to be like coffee and be part of the change, welcoming it while working with God. And the nice thing about coffee is that there are lots of different blends – there isn't just one flavor.

For there is indeed life after death – abundant life. So come and join us for Holy Week: the palms, the bread and wine, the cross and cemetery, and, finally, the empty tomb and resurrection. See you in church!

So What Does Sorrow Teach Us?

1. Patience – Sorrow allows us to exercise this often-neglected moral muscle.
2. Empathy – Our own pain helps us to recognize the pain in others' lives more readily.
3. Tolerance – When we experience deep pain, smaller stuff becomes easier to tolerate.
4. Humility – In life's trials, we come to realize we are not almighty or self-sufficient.
5. Inner Strength – As we persevere and endure, we discover inner strength we did not know we had.
6. The Importance of Laughter – Laughter, at any time, is great medicine.
7. The Importance of Friendship – When a friend stays with us through our trials, we realize the depth and sacredness of friendship.
8. The Importance of Family – When friends cannot be there for us, family usually is. In our darkest days, the importance of family can suddenly transcend the memory of fights and contention, offense and rivalry.
9. The Importance of Being Surrounded by Positive People – Just one negative pessimist can pull us down when we're most fragile. So it's important to surround yourself with positive people.
10. The Importance of Positive Thoughts – When things look dark and foreboding, it is imperative to have a positive attitude with a good dose of optimism. That's because dark periods often elicit the darkest moods; no reason to exacerbate it.

11. Compassion – We can very quickly learn to appreciate the decency of others and, in turn, behave the same way toward them.
12. Gratitude for the Small Things – When life is at its bleakest, a flower blooming from a crack in the sidewalk takes on new significance, meaning, and beauty.
13. Life is Too Precious to Waste on Petty Resentments – When crippling life circumstances threaten everything, the little things we store up in our hearts can suddenly seem as ridiculously trite as they usually are to begin with.
14. The Small Stuff Doesn't Matter Much – See Number 13.
15. The Big Stuff Does Matter – Family and friendship, God and character, love and courage, compassion and forgiveness suddenly seem more important than they ever did before.
16. The Importance and Power of Touch – When life is churning around us, a hand, hug, caress or touch can be magical.
17. Perseverance – When the pain never seems to end and hope begins to fail, it is perseverance that helps us take that next step anyway.
18. Life is Fragile – As we feel crushed by our challenges, we can gain a better appreciation for just how easily life can slip away. And this can lead us to live life with more passion and joy.
19. Time Matters – Being ill for days or enduring a lengthy period of unemployment has a way of focusing our attention on the issue of time. This can lead us to value the seconds that tick away in frivolous pursuits so much more, to the point that we can finally start filling that time with greater meaning and significance.
20. Prevention is a Good Investment – There is nothing more instructive of the need to brush your teeth than the loss of them.
21. Procrastination Does Not Work – Putting off the inevitable does not change its inevitability and usually makes what was already inevitable much worse than when we first noticed the need to take care of it.
22. The Importance of Living Every Day with Purpose, Joy, and Meaning – We need to remember that we are children of God endowed with gifts and talents. We should use them as God intended.
23. God is Always There for Us – The Lord is our constant companion and walks with us, no matter how dark and deep the valley may be (see Psalm 23). And we know that we will dwell with him in his house forever.

The Way: Walking in the Footsteps of Jesus

This six-week DVD study, hosted by Methodist pastor Adam Hamilton, uses video shot on location, including the Jordan River, the Judean wilderness, the ruins of ancient Capernaum, the mountain of the Sermon on the Mount, the Sea of Galilee, and Jerusalem. Creed: What Christians Believe and Why – Exploring the Apostles' Creed

We're used to answers popping up on a screen right in front of us. Pastor Adam Hamilton believes that powerful answers to many of our complicated questions are contained in the Apostles' Creed, an early statement of foundational Christian beliefs. In *Creed*, he explores not only what Christians believe, but also why they believe, and why it matters, which in turn leads readers to confront and examine their own core beliefs and go beyond reciting the Creed's familiar words. Each week we will watch a video segment of 12-15 minutes, featuring Adam Hamilton in an informal setting with a group of seekers and believers. We will then discuss it among ourselves.

February Vestry Meeting Highlights

RECTOR'S REPORT:

- As of 2/27/17, there was \$194,186 in ops account. We have \$131,467 in the parish reserve account. There is \$78,501 in the Foundation's checking/CDs – monies available to the vestry. We also have \$37,783 available from the Foundation principal as a result of the 2.25% spending allocation designated by the Foundation Board for 2015. We have another \$43,324 available from the Foundation principal as a result of the 2.5% spending allocation designated by the Foundation Board for 2016 at their meeting on 2/8/16. We have another \$53,473 available from the Foundation principal as a result of the 3% spending allocation designated by the Foundation Board for 2017 at their meeting on 2/21/17. And there was \$1,865,855 in the Foundation principal as of 12/31/16 (up \$141K from 12/31/15). There is also \$94K in the Dan Curtis fund *fbo* St. Andrew's within the Community Foundation of Tampa Bay, with \$8,070 in grant money available for 2017. (The Curtis fund is restricted to being spent on building maintenance).
- 2017 Stewardship Campaign – So far, 175 pledges for \$424K as of 2/22. There are still 20 outstanding pledges for \$44K out there (meaning those 20 families pledged 44K in 2016). Attaching the current pledge summary for this year's campaign: 26 units decreased their pledges for 2017, 83 families increased their pledges, and 48 kept their pledges the same. We also have 18 new pledging families for 2017!
- Diocesan Rebate – we received \$3,858 from Diocese as a “mission and ministry dividend.” As per our last meeting, half of the funds went to Outreach and the other half was designated for the youth choir.
- Property Insurance Premium Decrease – The diocese has discovered we can reduce our annual property insurance payment to Church Insurance Corp. to the tune of \$13,015 (We budgeted \$58K for it this year). Attached is the diocesan letter explaining this opportunity.
Richard Ferlita made a motion to accept the Diocesan recommendation that lowers our annual premium by \$13,015.00. Al Getz seconded and, after no discussion, the motion passed.
- Parochial Report – Pam sent this out along with the regular monthly packet of financials. We must approve it and remit to the Diocese NLT 3/1.
Jim Morgan made a motion to approve the parochial report and remit it to the Diocese. Brad Hall seconded and, after no discussion, the motion passed.
- Annual audits – We need someone to chair (and form) the audit committee that will conduct internal audits of both the parish financials and the Foundation financials.
Al Getz and Brad Hall volunteered to chair the committee. Richard Ferlita will assist.
- Gasparilla Pirate Parade – Saturday, January 28. Youth made \$1,100 while selling parking spaces to revelers.
- Al Getz, Gary Cotter and George Levy agreed to serve as delegates to the Diocesan Convention in October. Jeff Coleman will serve as alternate.

JUNIOR WARDEN'S REPORT – George Levy:

George thanked Wallace Dixon for sponsoring the remodel of the restroom in the church, and Richard Ferlita for getting the railing next to the lectern installed, with the cost of the railing provided by two anonymous parishioners.

- In the church, George observed what appeared to be sawdust from a ceiling on the south aisle. *(continued)*

One exterminator company said it did not appear to be from termites but George will get a second opinion from Terminex. He reported a proposal from a plumbing company to eliminate the sewer gas odor in first floor women's restroom. The cost would be between \$1,200 and \$1,400. He discarded that proposal and will approach the plumber for a new proposal. He reported two roof leaks in the church, both on south aisle side. He will contact a roofer to address the issue.

George gave a detailed report regarding the painting of the Parish Building. He presented the proposals of three contractors with similar guarantees and quality of paint to be used. It was agreed the proposal from Al Leach Painting and Restoration was the best of the three for price, quality, and guarantee.

Al Getz made a motion to accept the bid from Al Leach Painting and Restoration and to have the work paid by the Foundation in the amount of \$53,276 with an additional \$1,000-\$1,500 for wood repairs around the first floor windows. Al included that the price may be somewhat higher if we can include cleaning of the windows. Cate Hammer seconded and, after discussion, the motion passed unanimously.

George discussed the restoration of the 127 plaques on the south wall of the Parish Building. It was agreed the plaques needed to be done at the same time as the painting. A proposal was presented by AGG Restoration to restore the plaques and rehang them at a cost of \$80 per plaque, a total of \$10,160.

Richard Ferlita made a motion to accept the bid from AGG in the amount of \$10,160.00 and to have this paid by the Foundation. Gary Cotter seconded and, after no discussion, the motion passed unanimously.

SENIOR WARDEN'S REPORT – Jeff Coleman:

Al Getz will coordinate with Day Spring to facilitate the Vestry Retreat for 2017. Jeff will have further details for the Annual Mutual Ministry Review for new vestry members.

TREASURER'S REPORT – Gary Cotter

Nothing yet to report from Gary as he is just receiving the details for the treasury position. Fr. Reese mentioned January spending was higher due to singers being paid for December in January and the entire yearly fee for CGM maintenance on the A/Cs being paid in January.

CHRISTIAN EDUCATION REPORT- Jim Morgan

Confirmation class will start March 5, 2017 using the book My Faith, My Life with the theme being to confirm, not conform. Jim reported the Cornerstone Dinner was well attended.

OUTREACH REPORT – Loueita Hargens

Loueita reported the last meeting had eleven attendees, but no new members. They reviewed the plans for the year, including the annual fiesta to be held May 7, 2017, and called Siete de Mayo. Mentioned the report from Martha Cobb regarding the check to B.C. Graham and that the social worker there, Ms. Doyle had just spent \$250 on uniforms and that the check for \$436 was truly timely and would come in handy. Pictures of the children receiving the new uniforms will appear in the March Call.

“I want them to say, ‘Look, he’s moving!’”

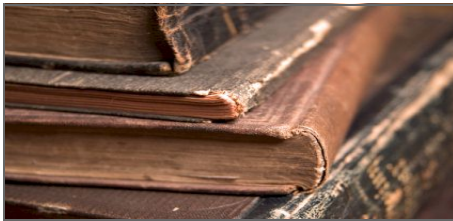


**Columbarium niches
