A Reading from the Book of Exodus.

Moses came down from Mount Sinai. As he came down from the mountain with the two tablets of the covenant in his hand, Moses did not know that the skin of his face shone because he had been talking with God. When Aaron and all the Israelites saw Moses, the skin of his face was shining, and they were afraid to come near him. But Moses called to them; and Aaron and all the leaders of the congregation returned to him, and Moses spoke with them. Afterward all the Israelites came near, and he gave them in commandment all that the Lord had spoken with him on Mount Sinai. 2 Corinthians 3:12—4:2

A Reading from the Second Letter of Paul to the Corinthians.

Since, then, we have such a hope, we act with great boldness, not like Moses, who put a veil over his face to keep the people of Israel from gazing at the end of the glory that was being set aside. But their minds were hardened. Indeed, to this very day, when they hear the reading of the old covenant, that same veil is still there, since only in Christ is it set aside. Indeed, to this very day whenever Moses is read, a veil lies over their minds; but when one turns to the Lord, the veil is removed. Now the Lord is the Spirit, and where the Spirit of the Lord is, there is freedom. And all of us, with unveiled faces, seeing the glory of the Lord as though reflected in a mirror, are being transformed into the same image from one degree of glory to another; for this comes from the Lord, the Spirit. Therefore, since it is by God's mercy that we are engaged in this ministry, we do not lose heart. We have renounced the shameful things that one hides; we refuse to practice cunning or to falsify God's word; but by the open statement of the truth we commend ourselves to the conscience of everyone in the sight of God.

Holy Gospel Luke 9:28-36

Priest The Holy Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ according to Luke.

Jesus took with him Peter and John and James, and went up on the mountain to pray. And while he was praying, the appearance of his face changed, and his clothes became dazzling white. Suddenly they saw two men, Moses and Elijah, talking to him. They appeared in glory and were speaking of his departure, which he was about to accomplish at Jerusalem. Now Peter and his companions were weighed down with sleep; but since they had stayed awake, they saw his glory and the two men who stood with him. Just as they were leaving him, Peter said to Jesus, "Master, it is good for us to be here; let us make three dwellings, one for you, one for Moses, and one for Elijah"—not knowing what he said. While he was saying this, a cloud came and overshadowed them; and they were terrified as they entered the cloud. Then from the cloud came a voice that said, "This is my Son, my Chosen; listen to him!" When the voice had spoken, Jesus was found alone. And they kept silent and in those days told no one any of the things they had seen.

Sermon

The Grace of Les Miserables

Victor Hugo's *Les Misérables* is a truly epic story. Whether you've read the novel, seen the Broadway musical, heard its soundtrack, or seen the several screen adaptations, you already know the power in the story. In this six-week video study, Pastor Matt Rawle of Asbury UMC in Bossier City, Louisiana, dives into six ideals found in the story—grace, justice, poverty, love, revolution, and hope—each represented by a character in Hugo's story. As these imperfect and relatable characters interact, we can see how these ideas work together (perhaps even in spite of each other) out in the world. Rawle brings us to the intersection of Church and Pop Culture by drawing parallels between the iconic story and musical and our Christian calling, inspiring us to both understand our faith and live it out in our daily lives.

Good News of Freedom / The Lenten Series 2025

The Spirit of the Lord is upon me, because he has anointed me to bring good news to the poor.

He has sent me to proclaim release to the captives and recovery of sight to the blind, to let the oppressed go free, to proclaim the year of the Lord's favor (Luke 4:18-19 NRSV)

esus in Luke 4 describes the mission of the Messiah using the words of Isaiah, chapter 61. He claims that this scripture is now fulfilled in him, that he himself would bring good news to the poor, release to the captives, sight to the blind, and freedom to the oppressed.

Stations of the Cross: Fridays in Lent 12:10pm

Come and join us for this 30-minute devotional, observed on Fridays in Lent at 12:10pm running through Good Friday on April 18th. Our Stations of the Cross, a gift from Nathan & Jane Simpson, are a series of pictures representing certain scenes in the Passion of Christ, each corresponding to a particular incident. Formerly the number of stations varied considerably in different places but fourteen are now generally acknowledged. The object of the Stations is to help the faithful to make in spirit, as it were, a pilgrimage to the chief scenes of Christ's sufferings and death. It is carried out by passing from Station to Station, with certain prayers at each and devout meditation on the various incidents in turn. It is very usual, when the devotion is performed publicly, to sing a stanza of the "Stabat Mater" while passing from one Station to the next.

Music Notes

"Jean, that was awful. It wasn't good. Sounded like a bunch of noise." These famous words were spoken by my father in a conversation I overheard him having with my mother, the first time I was ever on the organ bench for a service. Mom's response, "Honey, we *must* give him a chance." I began making music in church at the age of 11. My mother was the first to encourage me. When I started playing hymns on the piano, they were God-awful. When I started playing hymns on the organ, it was a *complete* disaster. But that disaster turned out to be yours truly because *someone* gave me a chance. I'm still a disaster. Just the other day, I played the wrong service music. Last Sunday, I forgot to turn a loud stop off during an anthem and nearly ruined Amanda's solo.

One day, shortly after my 11th birthday, I asked if I could try out the pipe organ at an 8:30 service my mother played for. So, with about 20 minutes to spare before the service, we asked our minister if we could give it a whack – and a whack it was! "Sure," he said without flinching. Where's the on switch? What do these buttons do? What happens if I push this pedal? There we were, me and mom at the organ, two ignoramuses making quite a fuss in the chancel before the service. A loving mother and an innocent kid making noise while Mr. and Mrs. Snootypants judged us from their pew, eyebrows raised in their "suffering" during their quiet time. Other onlookers understood, dazzled by a young kid *trying*. They were eager to give me a chance.

Imagine seeing a boy trying to breathe life into a box of whistles for the first time. The pipe organ is a box of whistles. Sure, we ruined someone's pre-service reflection. We disturbed sanctity. We interrupted God. We defiled solemnity. But imagine the sprouting love of music in a kid and a doting mother, eager to see him grow. "Honey, we must give him a chance," was mom's way of saying what Jesus said, "Be merciful, just as your Father is merciful." "Let the children come to me and do not hinder them." My first experiences on the organ were disasters. And they still are. Did you come from an era where kids were to be seen and not heard? A prominent organist once said, "I leave the organ unlocked, hoping to walk in on some kid exploring it." Organs are like kids, meant to be seen and not heard, I suppose. What a shame, because out of the noisy disaster rises a beautiful "adult" creature, who in their heart of hearts is still an innocent kid.

Do you know how much "noise" I have made over the years? The choir has fallen on its face more times than I care to admit. They sing out of tune and out of sync most every Sunday. The mighty Fisk is out of tune. So much noise. So much "disruption." But I thank the merciful ones, the ones dazzled to see youth "up there" front and center, giving it a try. Thanks, choir. Thanks Lucas and CC for *trying* and for being eager to play hymns. Thanks Coleman, for leading with love and enthusiasm. We've got some noisy kids up there!

To my mother, *nothing* I did was noise because my intention was loving. "Make a joyful *noise*." Before we pray, we might have to be tolerant of a little noise, to make special room for the young ones to grow. Kids are "disruptive." So am I. Thanks, merciful friends, for your patience, a *real* virtue. Criticism isn't a virtue. As for Mr. and Mrs. Snootypants, how can I comfort you? Kids are hopelessly loving and innocently noisy. I never wanted to grow up like Mr. Snootypants. I wanted to be a dazzled one. Thanks, mom, for giving me a chance. A little space was all I needed to dazzle. *Soli Deo Gloria!*
