1 John 1:1-2:2

A Reading from the First Letter of John.

We declare to you what was from the beginning, what we have heard, what we have seen with our eyes, what we have looked at and touched with our hands, concerning the word of life—this life was revealed, and we have seen it and testify to it, and declare to you the eternal life that was with the Father and was revealed to us-we declare to you what we have seen and heard so that you also may have fellowship with us; and truly our fellowship is with the Father and with his Son Jesus Christ. We are writing these things so that our joy may be complete. This is the message we have heard from him and proclaim to you, that God is light and in him there is no darkness at all. If we say that we have fellowship with him while we are walking in darkness, we lie and do not do what is true; but if we walk in the light as he himself is in the light, we have fellowship with one another, and the blood of Jesus his Son cleanses us from all sin. If we say that we have no sin, we deceive ourselves, and the truth is not in us. If we confess our sins, he who is faithful and just will forgive us our sins and cleanse us from all unrighteousness. If we say that we have not sinned, we make him a liar, and his word is not in us. My little children, I am writing these things to you so that you may not sin. But if anyone does sin, we have an advocate with the Father, Jesus Christ the righteous; and he is the atoning sacrifice for our sins, and not for ours only but also for the sins of the whole world.

When it was evening on that day, the first day of the week, and the doors of the house where the disciples had met were locked for fear of the Jews, Jesus came and stood among them and said, "Peace be with you." After he said this, he showed them his hands and his side. Then the disciples rejoiced when they saw the Lord. Jesus said to them again, "Peace be with you. As the Father has sent me, so I send you." When he had said this, he breathed on them and said to them, "Receive the Holy Spirit. If you forgive the sins of any, they are forgiven them; if you retain the sins of any, they are retained." But Thomas (who was called the Twin), one of the twelve, was not with them when Jesus came. So the other disciples told him, "We have seen the Lord." But he said to them, "Unless I see the mark of the nails in his hands, and put my finger in the mark of the nails and my hand in his side, I will not believe." A week later his disciples were again in the house, and Thomas was with them. Although the doors were shut, Jesus came and stood among them and said, "Peace be with you." Then he said to Thomas, "Put your finger here and see my hands. Reach out your hand and put it in my side. Do not doubt but believe." Thomas answered him, "My Lord and my God!" Jesus said to him, "Have you believed because you have seen me? Blessed are those who have not seen and yet have come to believe." Now Jesus did many other signs in the presence of his disciples, which are not written in this book. But these are written so that you may come to believe that Jesus is the Messiah, the Son of God, and that through believing you may have life in his name.

Sermon

Nicene Creed (stand)

We believe in one God. the Father, the Almighty, maker of heaven and earth. of all that is, seen and unseen. We believe in one Lord, Jesus Christ, the only Son of God, eternally begotten of the Father, God from God, Light from Light, true God from true God, begotten, not made, of one Being with the Father. Through him all things were made. For us and for our salvation he came down from heaven: by the power of the Holy Spirit he became incarnate from the Virgin Mary, and was made man. For our sake he was crucified under Pontius Pilate: he suffered death and was buried. On the third day he rose again in accordance with the Scriptures; he ascended into heaven and is seated at the right hand of the Father. He will come again in glory to judge the living and the dead, and his kingdom will have no end. We believe in the Holy Spirit, the Lord, the giver of life, who proceeds from the Father and the Son. With the Father and the Son he is worshiped and glorified. He has spoken through the Prophets. We believe in one holy catholic and apostolic Church. We acknowledge one baptism for the forgiveness of sins. We look for the resurrection of the dead. and the life of the world to come. Amen.

Give us grace to do your will in all that we undertake; *That our works may find favor in your sight*.

Have compassion on those who suffer from any grief or trouble, especially the people of Ukraine, Israel and Gaza; *That they may be delivered from their distress.*

Give to the departed eternal rest; *Let light perpetual shine upon them.*

We praise you for your saints who have entered into joy; *May we also come to share in your heavenly kingdom.*

Let us pray for our own needs and those of others.

For yours is the majesty, O Father, Son, and Holy Spirit; yours is the kingdom and the power and the glory, now and for ever. *Amen*.

For the sake of your Son Jesus Christ, have mercy on us and forgive us; that we may delight in your will, and walk in your ways, to the glory of your Name. Amen.

The people kneel. The Celebrant continues

Holy and gracious Father: In your infinite love you made us for yourself; and, when we had fallen into sin and become subject to evil and death, you, in your mercy, sent Jesus Christ, your only and eternal Son, to share our human nature, to live and die as one of us, to reconcile us to you, the God and Father of all. He stretched out his arms upon the cross, and offered himself in obedience to your will, a perfect sacrifice for the whole world.

On the night he was handed over to suffering and death, our Lord Jesus Christ took bread; and when he had given thanks to you, he broke it, and gave it to his disciples, and said, "Take, eat: This is my Body, which is given for you. Do this for the remembrance of me." After supper he took the cup of wine; and when he had given thanks, he gave it to them, and said, "Drink this, all of you: This is my Blood of the new Covenant, which is shed for you and for many for the forgiveness of sins. Whenever you drink it, do this for the remembrance of me."

Sanctify them by your Holy Spirit to be for your people the Body and Blood of your Son, the holy food and drink of new and unending life in him. Sanctify us also that we may faithfully receive this holy Sacrament, and serve you in unity, constancy, and peace; and at the last day bring us with all your saints into the joy of your eternal kingdom.

All this we ask through your Son Jesus Christ. By him, and with him, and in him, in the unity of the Holy Spirit all honor and glory is yours, Almighty Father, now and for ever. *AMEN*.

The Gospel of Mark: A Beginner's Guide to the Good News

St. Andrew's Homeless Ministry

Most of you know about our church ministry which provides lunches and hygiene supplies to the members of our homeless community. What you may <u>not</u> know is that we do not have a budget for this ministry. We distribute bagged lunches <u>Monday through Friday</u>. These lunches are provided to us from Metropolitan Ministries. However, supplemental food items, cases of water, and TRAVEL SIZE hygiene supplies (soap, washcloths, toothbrushes, toothpaste, deodorant, shampoo, and razors) are purchased with money that is donated from you, our caring and generous volunteers, and parishioners!

We are nearly out of all of our hygiene supplies at this time. We are once again reaching out to you all in hopes that you will support this critical ministry. You can help in one of two ways. If you would like to purchase items to be distributed, we are in the greatest need of the following: Travel Size Soap; Thin dark washcloths, and Travel size deodorant (men's and women's). We are exploring buying supplies in bulk, so, if you'd like to get the best bang for your buck, please consider donating money towards this endeavor. Music Notes

What a glorious Holy Week and Easter! We've sung so much music, I can hardly keep track of it all. Next week, I'll return to my usual commentary about specific pieces, but today I'd like to express my general gratitude for the choir, for their hard work, and for all their dedication over the last few weeks. I'll specially make mention of Coleman, who has been a lifesaver!

I often say that we could not do the kind of music that we do without singers who have musical ability, dedication, and a good work ethic. Not only is our music challenging, but it often splits into multiple parts (sometimes 6, 7, or 8!). With so few singers, one must be independent and be able to carry a single line if necessary. There have also been times where several people have called in sick on a Sunday, and we've had to scramble at the last minute to make sure parts are covered. You may not be aware of this, but on more than one occasion, we've had singers jump onto other parts at the last minute to make it work for Sunday morning.

Only once in the last five years have I had to change an anthem due to unforeseen circumstances. Not only is it hard to believe that I've been here for almost five years, but it's also hard to believe that we've had such consistency of quality in the choir, even with a pretty hefty turnover of staff singers.

It just goes to show that we don't necessarily need *specific* people in our lives to make things work. The power of God is such that it transcends circumstances – even when people get sick or when there is great change like turnover or other "inconveniences." Quality can ascend despite variables. This always amazes me. It reminds me that there really are no obstacles, only people not willing to adapt and adjust. When you're malleable, nimble, and eager, despite your circumstances, God can prevail.

God is prevailing in our music ministry. Yes, we have had a great deal of consistency over the years, but like all patterns, the specific group of singers changes almost *every* Sunday. Rarely do we have everyone here on a given Sunday, yet we always seem to manage swimmingly. That's the power and peace of God. It truly does surpass understanding (and circumstance), and I'm so grateful to be a part of the unfolding miracle of music we have here at St. Andrew's. *Soli Deo Gloria!*
