Hebrews 1:1-4; 2:5-12

A Reading from the Letter to the Hebrews.

Long ago God spoke to our ancestors in many and various ways by the prophets, but in these last days he has spoken to us by a Son, whom he appointed heir of all things, through whom he also created the worlds. He is the reflection of God's glory and the exact imprint of God's very being, and he sustains all things by his powerful word. When he had made purification for sins, he sat down at the right hand of the Majesty on high, having become as much superior to angels as the name he has inherited is more excellent than theirs. Now God did not subject the coming world, about which we are speaking, to angels. But someone has testified somewhere, "What are human beings that you are mindful of them, or mortals, that you care for them? You have made them for a little while lower than the angels; you have crowned them with glory and honor, subjecting all things under their feet." Now in subjecting all things to them, God left nothing outside their control. As it is, we do not yet see everything in subjection to them, but we do see Jesus, who for a little while was made lower than the angels, now crowned with glory and honor because of the suffering of death, so that by the grace of God he might taste death for everyone. It was fitting that God, for whom and through whom all things exist, in bringing many children to glory, should make the pioneer of their salvation perfect through sufferings. For the one who sanctifies and those who are sanctified all have one Father. For this reason Jesus is not ashamed to call them brothers and sisters, saying, "I will proclaim your name to my brothers and sisters, in the midst of the congregation I will praise you."

Sermon

Wrestling with Doubt, Finding Faith

Everyone has doubts. Where is God when bad things happen? Does God hear our prayers? Is there a heaven? How can we know? Often, we treat such questions as the enemy of faith. But uncertainty doesn't mean our belief is lacking. Doubt can be a path to a deeper, richer encounter with God.

In *Wrestling with Doubt, Finding Faith*, join best-selling author and pastor Adam Hamilton as he discusses some of our most significant sources of doubt and shows how a steady trust in God can emerge from them.

Hamilton approaches these sources of doubt with honesty and insight, drawing on the rich wisdom of the Bible, Christian tradition, and his experience walking with thousands of people on their spiritual journeys. Though you may wrestle with doubt, you'll discover a faith that—rather than providing simple answers—includes belief and trust as well as uncertainty and mystery.

Music Notes

Alexandre Guilmant was a French organist, composer, and teacher from the late 19th century. He spent most of his career as organist of *La Trinite* in Paris, serving as *organiste titulaire* from 1871–1901. Many of the more famous Parisian organists of the time made a living concertizing, composing, and teaching, rather than just playing organ in the great cathedrals. You may be surprised to know that even the most prized organist positions in France, such as Notre Dame in Paris, hardly pay a living wage. This is true, even today.

In reviewing his biography, I learned that people remembered him for his kindness and his attention to detail. His most noted student was Marcel Dupré. Guilmant was a close family friend of the Dupré's, having actually been present for Marcel's birth, at which time Guilmant declared that Marcel would grow up to be an organist. Marcel Dupré began studying with Guilmant at age 11. From this time until his death, Guilmant mentored the young Dupré and helped to advance his career. Guilmant's house and home organ was also sold to Dupré.

Guilmant was a prolific composer, writing exclusively for the organ. For many, Guilmant's fame falls just under the radar of other French organists like César Franck, Charles-Marie Widor, Louis Vierne, and others. What I like about him is that he championed and mentored young organists, and he did it with kindness and attention to detail. We don't always think that a master teacher *could* be kind. In the "old school" of organ pedagogy, there are legendary stories of the ruthless and demanding nature of some of the world's most prominent teachers. At one of my organ lessons, early in my career, my organ teacher walked out of a lesson in a huff! He said, "When you're ready for a lesson, you know where my office is!"

Today you'll hear two examples of Guilmant's organ music. I'll draw your attention to the postlude, a demanding piece, but written as a kind gesture. It's a work that pays homage to J.S. Bach. How nice is it that someone would write a piece in the style of another composer! What an honor that would be to have someone mimic you. You might not want them to mimic your style, or your creative output (although that would be flattering). However, you might want them to mimic your goodness in the world, that would be more useful, wouldn't it?

It's not what Guilmant contributed to the world of organ music that's necessarily impressive about him, or that he taught some of the world's most famous organists. It's that he was admired and respected for *his* respectfulness. And he showed it in his music. The postlude is a piece in homage to another composer. That's a kind and respectful gesture, isn't it? Don't forget that it may not be what you contribute to humanity that makes you wonderful. It just might be that you treated other humans with respect and admiration that makes *you* wonderful. *Soli deo Gloria!*
