Reverendly Speaking



God's word came to John son of Zechariah in the wilderness. John went throughout the region of the Jordan River, calling for people to be baptized to show that they were changing their hearts and lives and wanted God to forgive their sins.

Luke 3:2-3

Dear People of St. Andrew's,

Is there anything so exciting as a touchdown? It's football season! What makes football so exciting is the struggle, the raw energy, initiative, and strategy it takes to maneuver down the field toward the goal. Each time the home team gets another first down, a cheer of glee rises from the stands.

People will pay a lot of money and spend a good deal of time paying attention to who will make it through that jungle of bodies and equipment in order to win the game.

Perhaps nearly as popular has been the advent of survival shows. "Survivor" began back in 2000 and has survived for 47 seasons. Adventure, wilderness terrain, survival challenges, struggle – these things somehow thrill us. The thought of being alone on a desert island, out on the open seas, or in a dangerous jungle may set our teeth on edge, but it also gives us an adrenaline rush as we get in touch with our inner "wild thing," our primal humanity.

Each step, whether on the football field or in the survivor's wilderness, challenges us to think instinctively and creatively in order to make decisions that will not only get us ahead but keep us alive and uninjured. What is it about that super-hormonal rush that gives us such satisfaction? We truly are as humans in some ways just slightly above our animal friends. Games, whether video games or television or sports, allow us to get in touch with our wild place inside.

Advent too is about wild space. It's the time when God touched down right here on earth and started a movement that would reverberate throughout the planet. And it all started in the wilderness. In fact, if you look at the scriptures, every significant God moment happens somewhere in a wilderness place.

God always touches down in our wilderness place –the place in which we feel most alone, most barren, most despairing, most lost. It is in this place that we hear God's voice and feel God's presence calling us out, nourishing us, and giving us new direction. The wilderness is a place of change.

Think about space. Or flow. What happens when you interrupt that space or flow? It changes everything about it. Think about a still pool of water. Imagine in your mind that pool, whether it's the pool in your backyard or a basin on your table, or a pond in nature, or a birdbath. Imagine water that has no movement. It's just still. Now imagine a droplet falling into that water. Or if you're thinking about a larger body, a pouring of water. What happens next?

The water forms rings and they start expanding outward more and more until the entire body of water is changing and moving. It has changed direction. It has started into motion. The sand beneath has been rearranged. That one drop has changed everything about that pool of water.

Ever take a tour of a cave? Ever notice those amazing rock formations? We call them stalactites and stalagmites. They form long spikes and formations just from dripping water. Consistently dripping water. It's an amazing phenomenon. Even change that seems as slow as molasses can effect huge changes even in something as hard as rock over a period of time.

Time matters. Change matters. That's in a sense what happened when God touched down in the wilderness long ago in the desert place outside of Judea in the region of the Jordan River. God "interrupted" time and space, human culture and context, the earthly realm as we know it, and changed everything. There in that wild space, God began a movement that began with the prophet John and continued with the birth of Jesus.

The scriptures tell us, "God's word came to John son of Zechariah in the wilderness. John went throughout the region of the Jordan River, calling for people to be baptized to show that they were changing their hearts and lives and wanted God to forgive their sins" (Luke 3:2-3).

The "voice crying out in the wilderness" is the proclamation that God has appeared and that God's amazing plan for human and world salvation has been put into motion. Many folks didn't see that initial "drop of water" that began that colossal change. But John saw it. God made sure that John saw it. And the proclamation was born.

Advent is a time of what we call "repentance." Repentance sometimes gets a bad rap, as though we have been horribly bad people and must fall prostrate and ask for forgiveness. The kind of repentance John is talking about is a repentance we all need—a cleansing of the soul, a re-commitment to God as our sovereign and Lord, a removing of the debris of guilt and shame that we carry with us day to day and year to year, a renewal of our spirit. Just as that drop of water reverberates through the pond, God's salvation energy reverberates through each and every one of us, reminding us that God is near, God is active in the world, God is making change, and God wants to make that kind of change within us.

Repentance is a time when we remember our baptism and recommit our lives to Jesus. In a sense, God gets in touch with the wildest place in our soul and interrupts our lives in order to change our hearts, our minds, our intentions, and our actions for the future. God's touchdowns are always places where covenants are formed, whether in the desert or in the desert of our hearts.

This Advent, I invite you into an "immersion" experience with God, in which God can enter into the wildest part of your soul, the most primal part of you, and re-form you into a new creature, one that is at peace with the earth, with yourself, with your neighbors, and with God. God can begin in you a process, whether slow as a stalagmite or fast as a tsunami, that will change your heart and your life, so that you can go on to change the hearts and lives of others.

God can do all of this in your wilderness place. For God is the King of Touchdowns. God always wins. Let God interrupt your life and set you in a new direction. Happy Advent!

St. Andrew's plays a big part in our community in a variety of ways. The homeless are fed daily and receive medical and other services through our partnership with Metropolitan Ministries. Some of them join us for Sunday services, often sitting in the back of the church near the street entrance.

Children and youth receive a foundation in God's word through Sunday School, Youth Group, and Vacation Bible School. Inner city kids receive school supplies to help them start the school year. Others have a Christmas celebration compliments of Gabriel Tree.

Marriages, baptisms, confirmations, and funerals are provided for many. Shut-ins are ministered to in their homes and hospital rooms. God's word is taught to us at Sunday services (both virtual and live), Bible Study, and Lenten programs. Even pets are blessed.

October Vestry Meeting Highlights

RECTOR'S REPORT

As of 10/7/24, there was \$133,932 in operating account and \$76,959 in the parish reserve account.

As of 9/30/24, there was \$26,763 in the Foundation's checking account – monies available to the vestry. (\$9,929 of this will pay Oasis for the landscaping around the perimeter of the parking lot, thus reducing the balance to \$16,834.)

Total available funds from principal for years 2021 thru 2024: \$332,459.

There was \$3,376,554 in the Foundation principal as of 9/30/24 (as opposed to \$3,092,638 at the end of 2023, an increase of \$283,916 for the year).

There is also \$119,139 in the Dan Curtis fund fbo St. Andrew's within the Community Foundation of Tampa Bay. This fund is designated for church maintenance purposes. Current amount available is about 3K. (We spent \$9,582 from this fund to repair leaks in the church roof this year. Sutter Roofing came out on 8/14 to address the remaining leak in the NW corner of the church.)

Pictorial Directory – Is now up and running on the parish web site.

Rally Day – was Sunday, 9/8 after the 10:30 service. We had several folks sign up for various ministries.

Oktoberfest – was on Sunday, 9/22, after the 10:30 service. We filled the parish hall! Food was great - many thanks to the Outreach Committee.

2025 Annual Stewardship Campaign – was launched at the end of September. Thanks, Don, for heading this up! As has been our custom, we will be looking for folks willing to stand up and give a 2 -3 minute stewardship oration/plug at Sunday services in October and November. Don wrote the letter for the first pledge card mailing (end of September), followed by Senior Warden (end of October), Treasurer (end of November), and Rector (early January).

Blessing of the Pets – was Saturday, 10/5 at 10AM in the church courtyard. Lots of canines and three felines as well.

Diocesan Convention – was supposed to be on Saturday, 10/12 at the Punta Gorda Convention Center (with optional workshops on Friday, 10/11). But it has been postponed until a future date TBD. Bishop says it will be a combination of in-person and virtual. Our delegates are Allison, Martha, Wayne, and Piers (alternate).

Hurricane Impact on St. Andrew's – No damage at church. No leaks in church. Ceiling tiles in Children's Chapel Lobby wet from storm. Not a drop of water anywhere in the Parish Building. Many thanks to the Scheuer family, Paul Henley, Craig Polley, and Janet Norona for cleaning up debris at church on Friday, 10/11!

Rectory garage was flooded during Helene, water rising about 16 inches there. Fortunately, water did not get into the house. Appropriate amount of drywall in garage has been torn out and will be

replaced in about two weeks. Small tree fell in yard on side of house during Milton – waiting for that to be removed. Current hurricane expenses for rectory stand at about \$2,200. It was \$200 to fix garage door sensors, \$545 to replace garage door opener, \$200 to replace hot water heater, \$300 for electrician to properly re- connect hot water heater after plumber improperly connected wires, \$350 to remove downed tree in yard, and \$600 for new drywall and door that connects garage to back storage room. Wonderful neighbor/friend is doing all the drywall work gratis! This saves the church thousands of dollars.

The Diocese reports that 14 congregations have suffered damage and will be making insurance claims (which means each of those churches has many thousands of dollars in damages). The Diocesan House at DaySpring suffered sewer water intrusion and will have to be mitigated. Staff (including the Bishop) have relocated elsewhere on the DaySpring campus.

The Anchor Ball is coming up on December 7th, 2024, at 5:30 pm at the Pepin Center. The Bakers have purchased three seats, and Saint Andrews will purchase an additional five seats for \$1,000 with finds from the Outreach foundation. All proceeds will benefit the Seafarers' ministry at the port. Richard moved to approve the motion, and Barbara seconded. The motion was approved unanimously.

SENIOR WARDEN'S REPORT

Piers will launch planned giving by utilizing the newsletter for promotion. Planned giving allows Saint Andrew's to continue to support our church, it's ministries, and remain a welcoming home for its parishioners. Piers hopes to bring a trusted estate attorney to speak and answer questions after the 10:30 service in November.

Book club will begin soon, led by Raymond Vince. The first book to be discussed is the short story "Snows of Kilimanjaro" by Ernest Hemingway.

JUNIOR WARDEN'S REPORT

Richard reports the parking lot is completed, and the mulch is done around the perimeter. No leaks in the church following the hurricanes, and no major damage. Problems at the rectory (see above) are being addressed. One of two air conditioners on the second floor of the parish building will need to be replaced within the next week. Richard proposed a motion to replace the second floor air conditioning unit using money from the Foundation, pending a quote. Barbara moved to approve the motion, and Brad seconded. The motion was approved unanimously.

TREASURER'S REPORT

Eric reports expenses are under budget. Pledges are behind. At the year to date, from contribution revenue, we are 15 percent under, and expenses are 3.6 percent over the budget due to increased insurance this year. In October of 2023, insurance increased from \$70,000 to \$97,000. In October 2024, insurance will increase to \$110,000. Attendance is at a post-COVID high, as are plate offerings.

COMMITTEE REPORTS

Helping Hands – Barbara reports there are two funerals in the next two weeks. The funeral for Helen Gilbart will be Saturday, 10/26/24. She was a great supporter of the Florida Orchestra. A string quartet from TFO will perform, and conductor Michael Francis will attend, along with about 150 people.

Outreach – Derrick reports he is having a committee meeting on Sunday, 10/27, after the 10:30 service. Next events for Outreach are the Fish Fry, on 11/17/24, and Gabriel's Giving Tree, which Martha and Linda Busby will organize. For the fish fry, needs are potato salad, chips, iced tea, coleslaw, set-up, including roping off the area near the playground for the frying station, and clean-up. Thank you to Holly Clemmons for enlisting her nephew to fry the fish.

Parish Life – Will host the Evensong reception on 11/3. There is an e-mail circulating to organize the food, and we have plenty of helpers.

The meeting adjourned at 6:08 pm.
