For you are like whitewashed tombs, which on the outside look beautiful, but inside they are full of the bones of the dead and of all kinds of filth. So you also on the outside look righteous to others, but inside you are full of hypocrisy and lawlessness."

Matthew 23:27-28

Dear People of St. Andrew's,

Jon Stewart once said, "If you don't stick to your values when they're being tested, they're not values. They're hobbies."

Many of us live lives filled with "Compartmentalization." We allow various aspects of our lives to have their own principles of behavior — principles that sometimes conflict with our values in other areas of our lives. A classic example is a person who openly supports high moral behavior but is cheating on their spouse. Another is the mobster who never misses Mass.

Many of us tend to compartmentalize, often without thinking about it. There are people who work for world peace but allow their broker to invest their funds in armaments companies. There are people who sing hymns on Sunday but are ruthless in business dealings on Monday. There are environmentalists who drive gas-guzzlers. There are parents who preach healthy living to their children but practice unhealthy habits themselves. There are Christians who say, "God loves everybody" but they still harbor deep prejudice against people of a different color.

Compartmentalization is a spiritual problem, but it is also a term used in psychiatry. It's defined as taking things that are properly related and putting them in separate compartments in our minds, so they don't have to rub up against each other and cause us pain, stress, or tension.

In psychiatry, the opposite of compartmentalization is "integration," which means pulling the various aspects of our lives together so that we are working from the whole picture.

The word integration comes from the noun "integer," which is a mathematical term for whole numbers (as opposed to fractions). "Integrity" comes from the same word. The same words can apply to Christianity, too. Recall that Jesus said the great commandment is to "love the Lord your God with all your heart, and with all your soul, and with all your mind, and with all your strength." In other words, don't compartmentalize God.

We generally don't set out to isolate our faith from other facets of our lives. Some of it happens because compartmentalization is a psychological defense mechanism that helps isolate conflicting thoughts and feelings, and thus spares us some emotional pain.

Integration is not nearly as comfortable as compartmentalization. There's always the chance that something won't pass muster when we run our behavior at work and play past our spiritual and moral values. That cre-

ates internal stress — at least until we resolve the issue by letting Christ fully into the formerly walled-off places.

On the other hand, compartmentalization causes its own kind of discomfort. Some compartments in our lives develop as a result of wrongdoing or because of some issue we do not want to face. We put those matters in a separate room, but we lock it up and put a "no admittance" sign on the door. If wrongdoing is inside, it may be there because we really don't want to admit that it is wrong. But the secrecy of the room yields guilt, and guilt can spawn symptoms that can upset our lives.

On balance, whether speaking of our mental, emotional, or spiritual health, we are better to tear down the compartment walls.

A public figure was making a speech about conservation and the environment. Then he said, "I now call upon the Christian part of myself. ..."

Really? Is Christianity just for a part of ourselves? Perhaps the speaker meant that statement as a transition to acknowledge that some of his views on the environment were shaped by his faith. But taken at face value, it sounds like an awareness of internal compartmentalization. Committing ourselves to Jesus means that we *don't* divide ourselves into Christian and non-Christian parts. Yes, we operate in a culture that is not expressly Christian, and some of us work in jobs that require honoring the rules of church-state separation, but Christ belongs in each part of us.

In the end, this can be a subject of our prayers, and in that regard, the words of the devotional hymn, "Dear Jesus, in whose life I see," will serve us well:

Dear Jesus, in whose life I see All that I would, but fail to be, Let Thy clear light forever shine, To shame and guide this life of mine.

Though what I dream and what I do In my weak days are always two, Help me, oppressed by things undone, O Thou whose deeds and dreams were one!

Stations of the Cross: Fridays in Lent 12:10pm

Come and join us for this 30-minute devotional, observed on Fridays in Lent at 12:10pm running through Good Friday on April 7. Our Stations of the Cross, a gift from Nathan & Jane Simpson, are a series of pictures representing certain scenes in the <u>Passion of Christ</u>, each corresponding to a particular incident. Formerly the number of stations varied considerably in different places but fourteen are now generally acknowledged. The object of the Stations is to help the faithful to make in spirit, as it were, a pilgrimage to the chief scenes of Christ's sufferings and death. It is carried out by passing from Station to Station, with certain prayers at each and devout meditation on the various incidents in turn. It is very usual, when the devotion is performed publicly, to sing a stanza of the "Stabat Mater" while passing from one Station to the next.

Why? Making Sense of God's Will

Where is God when tragedy and suffering strike?

When the ground shakes, and a poor nation's economy is destroyed; when the waters rise, washing away a community's hopes and dreams; when a child suffers neglect and abuse; when violence tears apart nations, where is God? If God is all powerful, and if each one of us is a beloved child of God, then how can God allow tragedy and suffering to mar his creation?

In the DVD series *Why*?, Pastor Adam Hamilton brings fresh insight to the age-old question of how to understand the will of God. Rejecting simplistic answers and unexamined assumptions, he lays out core ideas for comprehending God's plan for the world, including:

God will not take away our free will, even when we use it to grieve him.

God will never abandon us, especially in the midst of our suffering.

December 2022 Vestry Meeting Highlights

RECTOR'S REPORT

As of 12/12/22, there was \$157,363 in ops account and \$86,283 in the parish reserve account.

As of 12/14/22, there was \$32,755 in the Foundation's checking acct – monies available to the vestry.

Total available funds from principal for years 2019 thru 2022: \$287,352.

There was \$2,816,005 in the Foundation principal as of 11/25/22, as opposed to \$3,218,925 on 12/31/21 (a decrease of \$402,920 for the year to date).

There is also approximately \$99,000 in the Dan Curtis fund fbo St. Andrew's within the Community Foundation of Tampa Bay. This fund is designated for church maintenance purposes. We spent the 2021 allocation of \$4,250 to pay TNT Roofing for repairs to the NW corner of church roof.

Pictorial Directory – Pam and Lauri in office are working on this, it will be an online directory that can be continuously updated and shared electronically with parishioners. Pam is currently learning to operate Realm (which is the update for ACS, our current software system). Her goal is to then have the directory up and running sometime in the new year.

Planned Giving – The Foundation Board would like the parish to begin a considerable effort at promoting planned giving. We could create a legacy society that would ask folks to include St. Andrew's in their estate planning.

2023 Stewardship Campaign – launched the first week of October (pledge cards were mailed out on 10/5.) Thanks, Gary, for heading this up! Gary lined up eight speakers to advocate for stewardship at Sunday services this autumn. Gary wrote the letter for the first pledge card mailing, which was followed by Senior Warden letter (mailed out first week of November), then Treasurer (early December), and Rector (early January).

As of 12/14, we have 112 pledges for 349K (compared to 111 pledges for 324K as of this time last year). We are about 80% to where we want to be.

There are still 49 pledgers who pledged 90K in 2022 whom we have not heard from for 2023. With that in mind, you will receive names and phone numbers of such people at the vestry meeting on Monday. I will send sample copies of how to make your phone calls. Each one of the vestry members was asked to commit to calling approximately 4 members who had given in the past. Another pledge mailing will go out in early January.

Columbarium Mosaic Project and Dedication – Overall cost for mosaic & luncheon was 22K. Richard F will have a full report. Costs were covered by the 23K in donations to the project. Over 150 people attended the luncheon following the service on 11/20. A plaque has been installed next to the mosaic. Many thanks to Richard F, Pam C, & Nancy Turner for all the work they did for this grand event!

Thanksgiving Eve Service – was on Wednesday, 11/23 at 7PM. Attendance was 26% higher than last year's Thanksgiving Day service (58 as opposed to 46).

Foundation Meeting -11/30 at 5PM. No changes made in investment strategy with Northern Trust.

St. Andrew's Fish Fry – was Sunday, 12/4 after the 10:30 service. Proceeds from this outreach event went to support the Giving Tree Party on Saturday, 12/10. A special thanks to Bobby Pastorius for donating (and frying) the grouper!

Gabriel's Giving Tree – Many thanks to all those who participated in this great outreach effort, especially Martha Cobb and Linda Busby.

Diocesan Convention – was on Saturday, 12/10, at the Cathedral in St. Petersburg. Our delegates were Derrick, Loueita, Brad, and yours truly. Various elections were held, the 2023 diocesan budget was approved, and Bishop Scharf became the ordinary, meaning he is now the VI Bishop of Southwest Florida and Bishop Smith has entered retirement.

Rectory Christmas Party – on Friday, 12/16, beginning at 6PM. Was very well-attended.

Vestry Nominations – Currently there are 5 people who are ready to run for vestry.

Annual Meeting - Sunday, 2/5/23 after 10:30 service - includes vestry election.

SENIOR WARDEN'S REPORT: Richard Ferlita. Richard F distributed the numbers from the mosaic. He shared that at the last minute we got a really nice pledge from a member taking us to \$22,931.00. Richard presented a spread sheet that described all of the associated costs; in the final report the church was ahead financially by \$1,025. There are no other bills coming in. Richard noted that the Foundation wants the Vestry to establish a committee—starting in the beginning of the year—to solicit members to consider St. Andrew's in their estate planning. This is important for the church and for our growth. This would enable us to do more programs and perhaps expand the staff. Discussion on how to give to the church ensued. Richard shared some ideas for the Legacy Fund.

JUNIOR WARDEN'S REPORT: Richard Chapman. Richard reported that we finally got our irrigation contractor back; he noted that if this one is not responsive, he has another option. He is waiting for the finished selections (floor tile colors, toilet partition colors, and countertops) for the first and second floor restrooms. Pam asked Richard for information on the availability of items. Richard recommended that Pam and Jennifer go to Floor and Décor. Kathy asked about kitchen door replacement. Richard shared that the door for the kitchen is a peculiar size and he has had a challenging time finding someone to take on this project. He has requested a price on an all-aluminum door.

TREASURER'S REPORT: Lori Taplow stated that she did not see anything unusual in the numbers. She noted "the ops account is at \$179,000 which is headed in the right direction." Pam Frost believes we will end the year in a strong position.

COMMITTEE REPORTS:

HOMELESS MINISTRY: Sue MacIsaac. The ministry is going very well, and she shared a story with the Vestry regarding an unplanned donation. Love TONIC, a Virginia organization, connected with Darius Stallworth (a Tampa city employee who helps coordinate services for the homeless population), who directed them to bring their U-Haul filled with new tennis shoes, gloves, and beanies to St. Andrew's on a weekday morning. These items were then given to our lunch program participants. Sue shared that it is good that the city of Tampa knows about the homeless ministry that we are doing. Sue noted that she has thanked those who have given donations. Kathy shared that a parishioner gave a significant donation the past Sunday that was earmarked for the purchase of blankets.

PARISH LIFE. Pam Curry and Loueita Hargens. Pam noted that there have been two parties in 30 days. For Lessons and Carols, Pam estimated that we had 100 guests for the reception. We have new silverware, and Pam noted that it was good to have things matching. Pam purchased new linens for the tables. Pam thanked everyone, especially Linda McGhee, James Carmichael, and Richard Ferlita. It is important to remember how much they do for us.

OUTREACH: Chris Capsambelis. He reported that the fish fry was not as well attended as Octoberfest; we raised \$650, which helped pay for the Gabriel's Giving Tree party. Gabriel's Giving Tree supported 30 families, but it was a disappointing number of families that attended the party. Members of the vestry noted that lack of transportation and parents working additional hours due to the holidays may have affected the number of participants. Richard F notes that the craft table was "jammed," and children had fun. It was noted that the families were very complimentary of our efforts.

YOUTH MINISTRY: Jen reported that yesterday was a great Christmas pageant; the youth party was on the 6th floor. Regarding Rock the Universe Christian music festival at Universal Studios in Orlando, there would be 12 youth and 3 adult chaperones. Parking is \$27 per vehicle. Jen also wants a small food budget for each youth. It is on Saturday, January 28th. In terms of money, it is \$140 per person for tickets. She noted that we should spend about \$2,500 for tickets, parking, and food for the kids. **The motion was made by Jen R to spend up to \$2,500 for participation in Rock the Universe to be taken** from the Foundation from a line indicating youth spending; Pam Curry seconded the motion. The motion was accepted by a unanimous vote of the vestry. The clerk will make the request to the Foundation. **St. Andrew's Episcopal Church** 509 East Twiggs Street


