In the morning, while it was still very dark, Jesus got up and went out to a deserted place, and there he prayed.

Mark 1:35

Dear People of St. Andrew's,

Even if you are not a "senior," whether you're in prepubescence, adolescence, middlescence, elderescence, or senescence all of us experience "senior moments."

You intentionally set out on a mission to get something — forgotten car keys, replacement printer paper, a fresh cup of coffee — and suddenly you get waylaid by some wayward distraction. Someone texts you, while another someone arrives at your desk, and simultaneously the phone rings, all in the same moment.

After dealing with these interruptions, you find yourself standing in a room with no idea why you are there.

What were you after? What was your agenda? In the hallowed ivy-league tradition of absent-mindedness, you just had a "senior moment." You pointedly and purposefully search your mind and reassemble your thoughts in order to figure out why you are standing where you are and what you were intending to do.

"Senior moments" are reset moments. And busy, bustling lives require reset, reassessment moments. We need to take the time to reconfigure and reconsider just exactly what it is we are pursuing and why we are pursuing it.

One of the most famous of the U2 songs is "I Still Haven't Found What I'm Looking For." Sometimes, when we are looking for Jesus, we are not sure what it is that we are looking for. Are we searching for meaning, or a new mortgage? Are we searching for redemption, or a new and better relationship? Are we searching for forgiveness, or a way out of a bad relationship? When we address Jesus, are we addressing God or are we dressing our ego?

The ego is the part of our psyche that takes care of our personal lives. Our ego is important, it must be healthy, just as our blood pressure must be at a good rate, and our blood sugar must be within normal bounds. But unlike those medically measurable variables like blood pressure and blood sugar, our ego rates are not so easily accounted for.

Our ego can give us confidence and the power to move through the obstacles that life sends us. But our ego can also block us from the greatest power we might possibly access. Kenneth Blanchard, a CEO/leadership guru is known for his moral disqualification of the CEO EGO. As a Christian, Blanchard has also proclaimed that the greatest ego faux pas is to "Edge God Out:" "E-G-O".

Prayer time is essential for Christians. For Jesus, and for all his disciples, prayer is not a time to "hide out." Instead, it is a time where our own ego gets jettisoned and instead of "Edging God Out" we "Engage God Only." Our select, singular, "senior" time with God is the time we get rid of our ego — our "edging-God-

out" tendencies and temptations — and instead open ourselves to "Exalting God Only."

This is a new kind of ego, a Jesus ego, a God-concentrated and committed ego that "exalts God only." A bad ego edges God out. A good ego exalts God only. God has exalted Jesus to God's right hand. Or as the Apostle's Creed puts it, he is "seated at the right hand of the Father." An "ego" that "exalts God only" is an ego that is constantly pointing to Christ, not to itself; an ego that boasts and brags about Jesus only, not about oneself; an ego that turns the eye of the camera on others, not just takes selfies; an ego that lives the power of the risen Christ, not tries to live out of its own strength; an ego that lives these exalted words "Lo, I am with you always, even to the end of the world" and "Receive the Holy Spirit."

A New York business executive had a good collection of paintings in his office, one of them being the Leaning Tower of Pisa, which hung over his writing desk. For a long time he noticed that it persisted in hanging crooked despite the fact that he straightened it every morning.

At last, he asked the night office-cleaner if she was responsible for its lopsided position each morning that he came to his office. "Why, yes," she said. "I have to hang it crooked to make the tower hang straight."

"God writes straight with crooked lines," goes an old Portuguese proverb. My crooked lines, the crooked lines of your life, God can turn into a narrative that leads straight to goodness, beauty and truth. The story of the Bible is the story of God writing straight with some very crooked lines: "you meant it for evil, but God turned it to good" (Gen.50:20). The story of St. Andrew's is the story of God writing straight with some very crooked lines. The story of your life is the story of God writing straight with some very crooked lines: God can make all things, even the crooked things, "work together for good for those who love God" (Romans 8:28).

But first you have to turn your crooked lines over to Him. Have you had that "senior moment" when you've reset your life and reassessed who's in charge of your life? Has that "senior moment" led you to trust your life to a power greater than anything you can grasp or think? Turn over to God your crooked ego that "edges God out" with scribbles and watch God scribe something straight and true and beautiful with an ego that "exalts God only."

Stations of the Cross: Fridays in Lent 12:10pm

Come and join us for this 30-minute devotional, observed on Fridays in Lent at 12:10pm running through Good Friday on March 29. Our Stations of the Cross, a gift from Nathan & Jane Simpson, are a series of pictures representing certain scenes in the <u>Passion of Christ</u>, each corresponding to a particular incident. Formerly the number of stations varied considerably in different places but fourteen are now generally acknowledged. The object of the Stations is to help the faithful to make in spirit, as it were, a pilgrimage to the chief scenes of Christ's sufferings and death. It is carried out by passing from Station to Station, with certain prayers at each and devout meditation on the various incidents in turn. It is very usual, when the devotion is performed publicly, to sing a stanza of the "Stabat Mater" while passing from one Station to the next.

Restored: Finding Redemption in Our Mess

Often we make a mess of our lives and wonder if there is any redemption. In this six-week video series, pastor and author Tom Berlin helps us see our mess through the eyes of Christ to find redemption and restoration. Using Scripture, devotional tools, and the writings of Ignatius of Loyola, John of the Cross, St. Augustine, John Wesley, Evelyn Underhill, and others, Berlin encourages reflection and meditation through our own brokenness. December 2023 Vestry Meeting Highlights

A warm welcome was extended to Victoria Klug, who has agreed to serve Chris Capsambelis' unexpired term on the vestry. Chris has moved to Madeira Beach.

RECTOR'S REPORT

As of 12/11/23, there was \$140,919 in ops account and \$86,283 in the parish reserve account.

As of 11/14/23, there was \$32,000 in the Foundation's checking account – monies available to the vestry. Total available funds from principal for years 2020 thru 2023: \$332,690.

There was \$2,819,012 in the Foundation principal as of 10/18/23.

There is also approximately \$99,000 in the Dan Curtis fund fbo St. Andrew's within the Community Foundation of Tampa Bay. This fund is designated for church maintenance purposes. We spent the 2021 allocation of \$4,250 to pay TNT Roofing for repairs to the NW corner of church roof. We did not spend any of the 2022 allocation. Current amount available is about 8K

Pictorial Directory – Pam is adding names to the new directory, which will be up and running very soon.

Planned Giving – The Foundation Board would like for the parish to begin a serious effort at promoting planned giving. The Board met on 8/9 and plans to personally ask some folks to put St. Andrew's in their wills. They plan on putting out planned giving brochures to all parishioners and would like to have an estate attorney come and address the parish in the fall. A legacy society can then be established from the people who have named St. Andrew's in their wills.

Second floor restroom renovation – is a work in progress. Richard C. will update us on it. Ditto for repairing roof leaks in church.

2024 Stewardship Campaign – launched on 10/1. Many thanks to Brad, Allison, and Derrick for speaking. Brad wrote the letter for the first pledge card mailing (end of September), followed by Senior Warden (end of October), Treasurer (end of November), and Rector (early January).

As of 12/14, we have 105 pledges for 344K (compared to 112 pledges for 349K as of this time last year). *See attached pledge update.*

There are still 62 pledgers who pledged 163K in 2023 whom we have not heard from for 2024. With that in mind, you will receive names and phone numbers of such people at the vestry meeting on Monday. I will send sample copies of how to make your phone calls. *Please make every effort to attend Monday's meeting!* Another pledge mailing will go out in early January.

Vestry members selected the names of 2023 pledgers who we haven't heard from to call and inquire as to their plans for 2024.

Tree trimming – The crepe myrtles at the courtyard entrance are in desperate need of a haircut. We have a proposal from LS Gardens to do just that.

Anchor Ball – was Saturday, 12/2 at the Pepin Center. Barbara will report on this. Proceeds benefited Seafarers' Ministry at the Port of Tampa.

Barbara Brotherton, who was in attendance at the Anchor Ball, reported that the event was fun and successful in its fundraising.

Gabriel's Giving Tree – Many thanks to all those who participated in this great outreach effort, especially Martha Cobb, Linda Busby, Lori Taplow, and Pam Curry, et al.

Christmas Lessons & Carols –is on 12/17 at 5PM in the church. Reception afterward hosted by Parish Life. Christmas Eve services will be on Sunday, 12/24 at 5:30PM and 9PM, with pre-service music beginning 30 minutes prior to each service.

Christmas Day service will be on Monday, 12/25 at 10:30AM.

Sunday morning services as usual on 12/31.

Annual Meeting Reports – please start working on those reports. Lauri can send you last year's report to use as a guideline. Just give her a buzz at the office.

Annual Meeting – Sunday, 2/4/24 after 10:30 service – includes vestry election.

Episcopal Visitation – Bishop Scharf will visit St. Andrew's on Sunday, 2/25/24 (the Second Sunday in Lent). Confirmation class for youth picks back up on 1/7 in preparation for Bishop's visitation.

Adult Inquirers' Class – will be Thursday evenings at 7PM, 1/11 through 2/22 (seven sessions), also in preparation for Bishop's visitation.

Senior Warden: Richard Ferlita explained that we have a proposal from LS Gardens to trim the 5 crepe Myrtle Trees at the entrance to the courtyard, in the amount of \$2,500. It was determined that we need to trim a sixth tree as well. Richard thanked the Reeses for a great Rectory Christmas party.

Richard Ferlita made the motion to include an additional \$500 to trim a sixth tree and allocate \$3,000 to trim the six crepe myrtles, to be paid out of the maintenance/reserve fund. The motion was seconded by Barbara Brotherton and was approved unanimously.

Junior Warden: Richard Chapman reported that the timer on the columbarium light has been replaced. The gutter repair has been done. The demolition on the 2nd floor restrooms is complete. The drywall had to be replaced, which was an unforeseen expense but should not impact the budget. Installation of the countertops is underway and should be finished tomorrow. The plumber has started his work. The partitions are on back order. Richard is still seeking the right vendor for the church roof repair.

Treasurer: Eric Hargens reported that any anomalies in the numbers were strictly timing issues. Folks are catching up on their pledges and we were pleased to receive an unexpected donation.

Committee Reports:

Visual Committee: Paul Scheuer informed that the new microphones have arrived at the vendor. He is unsure of when they will be installed but likely after Christmas. Issues with the supply chain held them up. We will live-stream the 5:30PM Christmas service only if there are no video folks available to provide coverage for the 9:00PM service.

Parish Life: Richard Ferlita reported in Pam Curry's absence that feedback on the Christmas Party, following Lessons and Carols, was that the food, attendance, and reviews were all very favorable.

Outreach Homeless Program: Kathy Lawless explained that we will not serve on Christmas Day. Portico will serve a hot meal. Tampa Family Health Center is working with us now to provide medical attention to lower income families. Their first visit was a successful one. Vaccines and medical prescriptions were arranged for several clients. They will schedule dental visits as well. The Tampa Bay Times newspaper is going to cover our lunch ministry this week. A plan is underway to get the closet under control. Another church has approached Kathy. They don't have a permanent location but they have a hot dog truck to provide meals. They drive around looking for homeless. They have asked if we would allow them to park in our parking lot on Tuesday evenings. We might consider replacing our lunches one day a week with the hot dog truck instead.

Outreach: Derrick reported that this has been a successful year for fundraising and Outreach events. The number of children served by the Gabriel Tree project stretched the volunteers quite a bit this year. In order to ensure success, it was determined that 100 children will be our limit next Christmas.
