Dear People of St. Andrew's,

The Super Bowl will be played this Sunday. If viewing habits are typical, more than 120 million viewers will tune in. Some people will watch in bars, while others will attend a neighborhood Super Bowl party. Most will probably be at home watching the game in the family room, perhaps with a friend or two.

The food will be plentiful. You can't watch a game without munchies. Pizza, popcorn, buffalo wings, nachos, pigs-in-a-blanket, spinach artichoke dip, meatballs, deviled eggs, sliders and, of course, chips. There are *always* chips.

The thing about munchies is that you find yourself eating them not because you're hungry but because the last chip you had didn't satisfy. And this phenomenon is at the heart of a new understanding of our unhealthy eating habits. The hypothesis is called the "Dorito Theory," so-named after Doritos, the nation's most successful snack with a market-leading share of \$1.5 billion in annual sales in the United States alone. The theory attempts to explain why we fall into toxic patterns in life, whether we're talking about food, relationships or spending habits.

You reach for "chip after chip," writes one observer, "when consuming a bag of Doritos ... because you are only enjoying the moment in which you taste the unhealthy snack, and not actually because your body is being nourished or satisfied by the act of eating them."

It's a modern Doritos version of the Pauline Dilemma of Romans 7:14-25, which goes roughly like this: "For I find it to be a law that when I want to do good, a bowl of chips and guac lies close at hand. For I delight in the idea of healthy eating as an inner principle, but I see that my taste buds are at war with my healthy ideals. This battle makes me a captive to my chip cravings, and it's driving me crazy. I'm such a goofball. How can I ever escape from the clutches of my cravings? It is going to be the death of me!"

Scripture views the heart as the center of a person's thoughts, intentions and will. It is where decisions are made and intentions are formed. When such a locus is deceitful, then even our reasoning and decisions can be flawed and self-serving.

But the Bible considers the heart to be even more. It is the moral and spiritual core of a person. It's where one's true character and motivations lie. So, this is what the Bible means by "heart" — the center of our being that includes our emotions, thinking, will, a moral compass and our spiritual core.

The delusional nature of the heart can manifest itself in a variety of forms.

For example, the delusion might be self-deception. Our emotions and thought processes can deceive us by making us believe that our desires and actions are justified when they clearly are not to any dispassionate outward observer (and certainly to God). We can rationalize wrong behavior, convince ourselves that we are doing good when we are not, and overlook our own faults. But it doesn't pass the smell test.

The devious nature of the heart might also be seen in our susceptibility to sin. This inherent clumsiness means that our moral judgments can be compromised, and we can easily stray from the straight and narrow. Often, we

simply don't understand why we do the stupid things we do. We don't understand why we reach — again — for another Dorito. We're stymied.

In utter despair, the apostle Paul asks: "Wretched man that I am! Who will rescue me from this body of death?" (Romans 7:24). Paul's answer is: "Thanks be to God through Jesus Christ our Lord!" (Romans 7:25).

This, then, is good news. Knowing that our emotions, thoughts and will tend to be self-serving and devious, there are checks and balances to safeguard our moral center and spiritual core.

The need for periodic introspection is like a regular wellness check. It is good advice concerning our physical body as well as our spiritual one. This might seem self-evident because the great thinkers of human history agree. But we tend to forget. Socrates, for example, is reputed to have said that "the unexamined life is not worth living."

Benjamin Franklin — the famous ambassador to Paris, politician, raconteur and author of *Poor Richard's Almanack* — said: "There are three things extremely hard: steel, a diamond, and to know oneself."

Self-examination is good practice. If we regularly examine our heart and motives, we will do ourselves a great service.

It would also be helpful to establish some spiritual disciplines to strengthen your inner life. These exercises might include, but not be limited to, daily Bible reading, praying, meditation and devotional reading. You may need to carve out daily quiet time, or find a place to do centering work, just as an athlete sets up a regular schedule at the gym to get in some reps. If we immerse ourselves in prayer and the study of Scripture, we will find it easier to identify those moments when our heart is not being honest with us. After all, God's word "is a lamp to my feet and a light to my path" (Psalm 119:105). It helps us discern truth from deception.

Be sure to surround yourself with a community of believers who can offer support, encouragement and accountability. Share your struggles and seek guidance from those who are walking faithfully with the Lord.

Finally, we should learn to find contentment not only with our relationship with Christ, but with the material things we have. Some people — and probably many thousands — will always have more than we have. Why not find our level and be satisfied? Paul the apostle puts it this way: "Not that I am referring to being in need; for I have learned to be content with whatever I have. I know what it is to have little, and I know what it is to have plenty. In any and all circumstances I have learned the secret of being well-fed and of going hungry, of having plenty and of being in need. I can do all things through him who strengthens me" (Philippians 4:11-13).

The Dorito Theory serves as a strong reminder of the deceitfulness of our hearts and the need for God's guidance in our lives. Just as we might struggle to stop at one Dorito, we struggle to find satisfaction and direction without the benefit of good spiritual practices.

Let's turn our hearts toward God, finding contentment with what we *have* while seeking to improve upon who we *are*. Let's not be afraid to be accountable and disciplined, and may we not fear self-examination. Getting a wellness check is a good thing. We might be surprised at what Dr. God finds and tells us.

One would hope that God looks at our MRIs and blood work, and rather than saying we need to lay off the chips, the Divine Physician gives us a good bill of health and sends us out into the world to be agents of change and blessing.

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December 2024 Vestry Meeting Highlights

RECTOR'S REPORT

As of 12/9/24, there was \$143,688 in operating account and \$68,995 in the parish reserve account.

As of 11/30/24, there was \$31,762 in the Foundation's checking account – monies available to the vestry.

Total available funds from principal for years 2021 thru 2024: \$299,541.

There was \$3,368,398 in the Foundation principal as of 12/2/24 (as opposed to \$3,092,638 at the end of 2023, an increase of \$275,760 for the year).

There is also \$119,139 in the Dan Curtis fund fbo St. Andrew's within the Community Foundation of Tampa Bay. This fund is designated for church maintenance purposes. Current amount available is about 3K. (We spent \$9,582 from this fund to repair leaks in the church roof this year. Sutter Roofing came out on 8/14 to address the remaining leak in the NW corner of the church. Sutter came out again recently to repair some damaged roof tiles. This visit will be paid from the remaining 2024 funds.)

2025 Annual Stewardship Campaign – was launched at the end of September. Thanks, Don, for heading this up! Don wrote the letter for the first pledge card mailing (end of September), followed by Senior Warden (end of October), Treasurer (end of November), and Rector (early January). As of 12/9, we have 98 pledges for 461K (compared to 105 pledges for 344K as of this time last year).

There are still 56 pledgers who pledged 126K in 2024 whom we have not heard from for 2025. With that in mind, you will receive names and phone numbers of such people at the vestry meeting on Monday.

Diocesan Convention – was Thursday, 12/5 at 7PM. It was a virtual meeting. Our delegates were Allison, Martha, Wayne, and Piers (alternate).

Thanksgiving Eve Service – was on Wednesday, 11/27 at 7PM. It was a thankful little group.

Anchor Ball – was Saturday, 12/7 at the Pepin Center. Proceeds benefited Seafarers' Ministry at the Port of Tampa.

Gabriel's Giving Tree – Many thanks to all those who participated in this great outreach effort, especially Martha Cobb, Linda Busby, and a bunch of other terrific volunteers!

New Railings – New railing installed on steps under church tower.

Hurricane Impact on St. Andrew's Rectory - Garage was flooded during Helene, water rising about 16 inches there. Fortunately, water did not get into the house. Appropriate amount of drywall in garage has been torn out and was replaced. Small tree fell in yard on side of house during Milton – was removed. Final hurricane expenses for rectory total about \$5,000. It was \$200 to fix garage door sensors, \$545 to replace garage door opener, \$200 to replace hot water heater, \$300 for electrician to properly re-connect hot water heater after plumber improperly connected wires, \$350 to remove downed tree in yard, and \$600 for new drywall and door that connects garage to back storage room. Wonderful neighbor/friend did all the drywall-work gratis! This saved the church thousands of dollars. I have authorized (from my discretionary fund) a

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Lowe's gift card in the amount of \$500 for this very kind fellow. It cost \$1,000 to hang the new storage room door and install all the new molding in the garage and storage room. Last thing was painting the renovated walls and molding. Painter charged \$1,230 for that and completed it during Thanksgiving Week.

The Diocese reports that 14 congregations have suffered damage and will be making insurance claims (which means each of those churches has many thousands of dollars in damages). The Diocesan House at DaySpring suffered sewer water intrusion and will have to be mitigated. Staff (including the Bishop) have relocated elsewhere on the DaySpring campus.

SENIOR WARDEN'S REPORT

• Foundation is doing well. We had a good year in the markets. Will de-risk some of the portfolio. Confident in Northern Trust.

Incoming pledges look really good. Attendance is also good and tells us we are healthy. Hoping for a surplus budget so make sure to make the calls.

JUNIOR WARDEN'S REPORT

- * Completed the post- Milton church roof repairs at a cost of \$2,517, to be paid from the Dan Curtis fund. Group doing the repairs (Sutter) takes a good photographic record of the repairs.
- * Fixed the broken rail on Southwest corner of the church around \$650.
- * Only proposed improvement are the church steps we were sued over:
 - * One way is to put rails back on. About \$1,300
 - * Remove steps for \$1,450 and put landscaping there. Optimistic budget, so would ask for up to \$2,500 for project.
 - * Nicole Carr moved that we take up to \$2,500 from the Foundation to remove the steps and make the necessary repairs. Barbara Brotherton seconded. Motion was approved unanimously.

TREASURER'S REPORT

- * Slightly above on revenue, mainly due to non-pledge offerings. Parking is down but Santa Fest should help.
- * Power bill was lower.
- * Restricted accounts looks like there's an error for Outreach. Pam is looking into it.
- * Sunday was better than all of last month for pledges.

COMMITTEE REPORTS

Parish Life

- * Allision is getting organized for Lesson and Carols on Sunday. Lori and Doug are hosting coffee hour in the courtyard to make room for lessons and carols.
- * Parish Picnic we don't have a location yet for 2025. We will need to pick a date in March. Picnic Island is a possibility.
- * February 15 for the wine tasting with Chris Sherman.


