Dear People of St. Andrew's,

It's been a while since we marked the celebration of Easter on the church's calendar. It's an even longer time until the seasons of Advent and Christmas return. It seems that the hot, humid days of summer are the time of year we set aside not only to get a break from school or take a vacation from our job, but also as a time when we take a little "time off" from God.

The fluidity of summertime schedules means that more families are out of town, and Sunday morning attendance drops. It's a bad time of year to schedule important meetings or to make any great future-shaping decisions. Everyone, it seems, is ready for a break, a change, a chance for a little well-deserved "personal time."

If we are perfectly honest with ourselves, however, we must admit that we have already segmented our lives into "God's time" vs. the "rest of our lives." So much of our days evaporates into grocery shopping, staff meetings, budget-crunching, commuter traffic snarls, refereeing sibling squabbles, "environmental science" (a.k.a. housecleaning and yard work), writing reports, keeping coworkers informed, keeping bosses informed, filing reports, preparing meals and preparing for tomorrow's onslaught, that we struggle to "find time" for God. At best, we schedule a few minutes of prayer here and there, and a scant hour of "worship" once a week.

The problem with this attitude is that we can't segment life into "God times" vs. "god-less times." Christians don't find time for God. We find God's time in all our time. If we are truly "in Christ," then Christ's Spirit fills us at every moment of our day. In everything we do, we must be finding God and serving God.

Christians don't take "time off" from being Christians any more than our hearts can take "time off" from beating. On a sticky summer day, we are as fully immersed in God's time as we are singing "Silent Night" on Christmas Eve or proclaiming "Christ is risen" on Easter morning.

In his book *Breakfast at the Victory*, James Carse writes, "The highest achievement of the spiritual life is within the full embrace of the ordinary. Our appetite for the big experience, sudden insight, dazzling vision, heart-stopping ecstasy is what hides the true way from us." It is the extraordinary in the ordinary that can become prayer. In the Buddhist tradition there is an expression, "Chop wood; carry water," which is a way of saying that spiritual meaning can be found in the smallest, most ordinary functions of the day.

What daily tasks of yours correspond to a "chop wood; carry water" mindset/spirit-set?

Can you recognize God's time while participating in a tense, humorless confrontation between coworkers?

Can you recognize God's time while attempting to prepare dinner?

Can you recognize God's time while holding a meeting on the phone?

Can you recognize God's time while trying valiantly to find the bottom on your "In" box?

Can you recognize God's time while you are logged on?

Can you recognize God's time while stretching out in the hot summer sun?

It is clear that sometimes we do have to take care of the self, so that we can then continue to do God's work with renewed energy and improved vision. But allowing our engines to idle for a while is different from completely shutting down all our systems. If we are genuinely "not making time for God," but rather seeing all time as God's time, we should be prepared to be surprised by God even when we are at rest.

For Christians who live always fully immersed in "God's time," moments of rest and relaxation don't constitute "downtime." Rather this is "uptime," the time we take to refresh our spirits and breathe in more deeply the presence of the Divine.

Are you busy scheduling your vacation plans this summer? Don't find time for God. If you are living a life of discipleship and faith, God is already in all the time you have. Summer is not the time to "wind down." It is our special time to "rev-up" our engines for the challenges ahead.

"Downtime" is "uptime" if it's God's time!

A Bible Study on the C.S. Lewis Book The Screwtape Letters

The Screwtape Letters provides unique insight into the battles that are being waged in the spiritual world. The story is told through a collection of letters from Screwtape, an undersecretary in the lower hierarchy of Hell, to his incompetent nephew, Wormwood. Wormwood is a junior devil who has just been given his first human, a young man, to corrupt and secure for eternity. The story takes place in England during the tumultuous years of World War II with the man contemplating Christianity.

As we walk through each letter, we will hear questions that bring out turns and twists in the thoughts and emotions that we each experience and that Lewis wanted us to recognize. Each session is self-contained, so you need not worry if you cannot attend all the sessions! If you do not already have a copy of the book, it can be purchased on-line for under \$10.

April Vestry Meeting Highlights

RECTOR'S REPORT

As of 4/8/24, there was \$235,611 in ops account and \$76,959 in the parish reserve account.

As of 3/31/24, there was \$26,814 in the Foundation's checking acct – monies available to the vestry.

We have \$32,918 remaining from the Foundation principal as a result of the 3% spending allocation designated by the Foundation Board for 2020 at their meeting on 2/4/20. (On 1/11/24, \$40,000 of the \$72,918 allocated for 2020 was transferred from the principal to the checking account.)

We have \$81,371 available from the Foundation principal as a result of the 3% spending allocation designated by the Foundation Board for 2021 at their meeting on 3/3/21.

We have \$89,343 available from the Foundation principal as a result of the 3% spending allocation designated by the Foundation Board for 2022 at their meeting on 3/23/22.

We have \$89,058 available from the Foundation principal as a result of the 3% spending allocation designated by the Foundation Board for 2023 at their meeting on 5/3/23.

We have \$90,687 available from the Foundation principal as a result of the 3% spending allocation designated by the Foundation Board for 2024 at their meeting on 3/20/24.

Total available funds from principal for years 2020 thru 2024: \$383,377.

There was \$3,143,296 in the Foundation principal as of 3/15/24 (as opposed to \$3,092,638 at the end of 2022, an increase of \$50,658 for the year).

There is also \$119,139 in the Dan Curtis fund fbo St. Andrew's within the Community Foundation of Tampa Bay. This fund is designated for church maintenance purposes. Current amount is \$12,896.

Lenten Series – We averaged 18-20 for the service and 30-35 for the dinner. Many thanks to Ryan Hebert for insightful presentations.

Holy Week Services – Palm Sunday attendance (214) was up 10% from last year (194), other services that week were about the same as in the past.

Easter Day – was fabulous. Attendance of 436 was up from 380 last year (a 15% increase) and the church was full for the 10:30 service. Parish Life/Vestry hosted a terrific coffee hour after the 10:30 service. We had dozens of kiddos for the Easter Egg hunt in the courtyard.

Foundation Board – met on 3/20 at 5PM and designated this year's allocation as 3%, which amounts to \$90,687 (range is 2% to 4% of principal based on a three-year rolling average, as per Foundation by-laws).

Parish Picnic – Sunday, 4/28 starting at 12:30PM at the home of Earl & Jan Smith. Parish life will head this up. Many thanks to the Smiths for being willing to host once again!

Cinco de Mayo - luncheon will be on Cinco de Mayo, Sunday, May 5th after the 10:30 service. Many thanks to the Outreach Committee for hosting this event.

Vestry Retreat – is Saturday, 9/7 at DaySpring. Plan on meeting from 9AM until 3PM.

Parish & Foundation Audits – Barbara and Allison will conduct the parish audit, Victoria and Don will handle the Foundation audit.

New Nursery Attendant – Abby Lorren is our new attendant.

Overflow Parking – is no longer possible across the street. The law firm is under new management and the gate code has been changed.

Sunday morning security guard – SentriTech has been hired to provide a guard on Sundays from 7:30AM until 12:30PM at the cost of \$31 per hour. They began on 3/24. So far, so good.

Sexton Away – Anguel is away for his annual trip to Bulgaria from 4/3 through 6/10. We will pay him the vacation time due him, but not pay him for the rest of the time away. Richard Connar, our former sexton, is filling in three days per week while Anguel is gone.

Senior Warden: Piers Curry on a work trip to VI.

Junior Warden:

- Updated parking lot spreadsheet. Based on conversations he believes we should just pave the asphalt using Alto. More expensive, but will have thicker paving that will last longer.
- Will need to hear from Don Crawford about the number of spaces required by 717 in order to decide if we can make spaces wider.
- Fr. Reese brought up the hedges harboring rubbish from the unhoused population.
- Derrick asked about when it would start. It would be on a Monday thru Saturday.
- Brad Hall moved that we approve \$48,965 from foundation funds to have Alto repave the parking lot. Nicole seconded. The motion was approved unanimously.

Roof repairs were completed. Waiting for a photographic report and an invoice. Will be paid from the Dan Curtis fund. Also looking at LED exterior lights for the stained glass windows behind altar so those windows can be illuminated during evening services.

Treasurer:

Small surplus for the month. Pledge revenue is below budget but expenses are also below budget.

Helping Hands Committee:

Two funerals coming up.

Parish Life:

- Easter went well. Might add an extra platter because food went quickly.
- Picnic is coming up. Lots of helpers signed up. Martha and Richard are supplying food and extra supplies. Could use an extra pop-up tent.

Outreach:

Had a meeting yesterday. Looking at events for the rest of the year. Cinco De Mayo planning was the main focus. Also looked at upcoming Operation Smart Start (collecting various back-to-school supplies) and identified Dunbar as the school to focus on this summer.

Homeless Ministry:

Had a meeting yesterday with volunteers. Went really well. Received a large donation.

The meeting was adjourned at 6:01 pm.

The next regular vestry meeting will be on Monday, May 20th at 5:30p.m.
