

Then Philip began to speak, and starting with this scripture (Isaiah 53), he proclaimed to him the good news about Jesus.

Acts 8:35

Dear People of St. Andrew's,

Change is difficult. It's a challenge in families, in businesses, in churches, in communities and in entire countries. In fact, the only person who really likes change is a baby with a wet diaper.

Throughout history, people have been afraid of innovation. The list includes:

German writer Johann Georg Heinzmann, who warned people in 1795 about *reading*. He said that consuming words leads to a "weakening of the eyes, heat rashes, gout, arthritis, hemorrhoids, asthma, apoplexy, pulmonary disease, indigestion, blocking of the bowels, nervous disorder, migraines, epilepsy, hypochondria and melancholy." Be careful about reading!

In 1854, author Henry David Thoreau criticized the construction of a magnetic *telegraph* from Maine to Texas. He said, "But Maine and Texas, it may be, have nothing important to communicate."

In 1906, composer John Philip Sousa lamented that *phonographs* were causing "deterioration in American music."

In 1926, the Knights of Columbus warned that the *telephone* would "break up home life and the old practice of visiting friends."

About the same time, a dean at Princeton observed that *cars* were becoming a threat to America's young people. "The general effect of the automobile," wrote Howard McClenahan, "was to make the present generation look lightly at the moral code." He worried that youths with cars would begin to drive all over the place on Sundays ... everywhere but church.

And finally, in year 2008, *The Atlantic* magazine asked the question, "Is Google making us stupid?" The jury is still out on that one.

Resistance to change is a constant in human life, even around innovations that have proved to be beneficial: Reading, telegraphs, phonographs, telephones, cars and the Internet. Yes, there are problems associated with each, but, on the whole, they've been a huge help to people around the world.

In the eighth chapter of Acts, an angel of the Lord challenges a Christian named Philip to innovate. "Get up and go toward the south to the road that goes down from Jerusalem to Gaza." This is, the Bible tells us, a wilderness road (v. 26). The angel is ordering Philip to leave the city of Jerusalem, and to go in a new direction off the beaten path.

As he begins his journey, Philip meets "an Ethiopian eunuch, an important official in charge of all the treasury of Candace, queen of the Ethiopians" (v. 27, NIV). This man has two strikes against him from a religious point of view: First, he is a foreigner, and admittance to the assembly of the Lord is generally reserved for the Israelite community. Second, he is a eunuch, and the Torah is explicit that a eunuch cannot be admitted to the assembly of the Lord.

But the Ethiopian believes in the God of Israel, and he has just made a long and difficult journey to worship in Jerusalem. He is now on his way home, and is reading Isaiah 53.

At this point, the Holy Spirit gives Philip another innovative order. "Go over to this chariot and join it," says the Spirit, even though the man is an Ethiopian and a eunuch (v. 29). This is a change from what Philip has been doing in Jerusalem and in Samaria. But it doesn't seem to bother Philip that God would take him from Jerusalem where he's having huge revival meetings, performing many miracles, bringing many to Christ, and send him out to a desert to talk to one man, a foreigner at that!

The angel of the Lord said, "Get up and go" (v. 26), and Philip got up and went. Simple. God says "Get up," we get up. God says "Go," we go.

Philip moves in a new direction by joining the Ethiopian eunuch and helping him to understand Scripture. That's precisely what we need to do today - to take steps to sit beside and to guide.

So what happens when we sit beside and guide? We give straight answers to tough questions. The Ethiopian eunuch asks, "About whom, may I ask you, does the prophet say this, about himself or about someone else?" (v. 34).

Philip doesn't answer, "I think you need to undertake a careful examination of present-day studies in biblical history in order to assess their diverse orientations and different methodologies, while, at the same time, not neglecting the risk that the exclusive use of one methodology runs vis-à-vis a comprehensive understanding of the biblical testimony and of the gift of God given in Christ."

No, Philip simply says that the prophet is talking about Jesus. He proclaims "to him the good news about Jesus" (v. 35). He tells him that Jesus died on the cross like a sheep led to slaughter, to demonstrate just how far he will go to show his love for us. This sacrifice brings us forgiveness of sin and the restoration of a right relationship with God, whether we are American, Ethiopian, man, woman or eunuch. And then, to prove that death is not the end, God raised Jesus from the dead and raises us as well.

That's the Jesus story, as simple as can be. It's what the Ethiopian eunuch needed to hear, and what the outsiders of our society need to hear as well. It's a story we can tell - if we are willing.

So go ahead – sit beside and guide. Give straight answers to tough questions. And bring some folks the good news.

Acts: Catching Up with the Spirit


Learn to walk more closely with God with the boldness and the zeal of the apostles.

March Vestry Meeting Highlights

.RECTOR'S REPORT

As of 3/8/21, there was \$235,748 in ops account and \$85,344 in the parish reserve account.

As of 3/10/21, there was 21,651 in the Foundation's checking account – monies available to the vestry.

We have another \$6,473 available from the Foundation principal as a result of the 3% spending allocation designated by the Foundation Board for 2017 at their meeting on 2/21/17. (NB: \$47,000 has already been transferred to the Foundation checking account from the 2017 allocation, which totaled \$53,473).

We have another \$75,659 available from the Foundation principal as a result of the 4% spending allocation designated by the Foundation Board for 2018 at their meeting on 2/21/18.

We have another \$63,718 available from the Foundation principal as a result of the 3% spending allocation designated by the Foundation Board for 2019 at their meeting on 2/27/19.

We have another \$72,918 available from the Foundation principal as a result of the 3% spending allocation designated by the Foundation Board for 2020 at their meeting on 2/4/20.

We have another \$81,371 available from the Foundation principal as a result of the 3% spending allocation designated by the Foundation Board for 2021 at their meeting on 3/3/21.

And there was \$2,965,582 in the Foundation principal as of 2/25/21, as opposed to \$2,929,677 as of 12/31/20.

There is also approximately \$99,000 in the Dan Curtis fund fbo St. Andrew's within the Community Foundation of Tampa Bay, with \$4,371 in grant money available for 2021. This fund is designated for church maintenance purposes.

There is Adult Christian Education at 9:30AM in the third floor library. There is no nursery or coffee hour. Alicia launched a 9:30AM Zoom Sunday school class for youth that started on 2/14. Alicia had an outdoor youth retreat on 2/28 at St. Leo's. Nineteen kids and adults attended. She will try and resurrect in-person Children's Chapel on Sundays at 10:30.

Annual Stewardship Campaign – is now concluded. As of 3/10/21, we have 159 pledges for 420K, which is 5K less than last year at this time.

SENIOR WARDEN'S REPORT – Gray Sanders

JUNIOR WARDEN'S REPORT – George Levy

George presented 2 proposals for the repair/replace/restoration of the church fence.

First bid Ornamental Designs for \$1600, and Best Made for \$1050. George is recommending that we use Best Made for the repair, as we have history with the vendor, and their scope of work does not involve removing the section of the fence from the property. The repairs would be made onsite.

George made a motion to accept the proposal from Best Made for \$1050 and proceed with the repairs, with the funds coming from the reserve account. The motion was seconded by Richard, and passed unanimously.

The second scope of work regarding repairs to the fence involves treating the rust and painting the entire fence. George presented 4 bids for \$5,460, \$6,940, \$18,100 and \$27,584. The bid of \$5,460 was submitted by Leach Painting, which performed the work on the interior of the sanctuary, and George has confidence in their work. Leach suggested adding to the work, painting the railings in the courtyard, for an additional \$400, for a total of \$5,860.

George made a motion to proceed with the work on the fence painting with Leach Painting for a total cost of \$5,860 with funds coming from the Foundation. Jennifer R seconded the motion, and it passed unanimously.

A project for refurbishing nine plaques inside the church is being proposed. Also, the memorial plaques on the courtyard wall are filling up, so the heading 'In Memoriam' needs to be moved up higher on the wall in order to be able to add future plaques. There are a few new plaques that need to be hung and some current plaques that need to be relocated on the wall. Father is proposing we use Metal Refinishing, the firm that refurbished the brass in the sanctuary. Costs would be \$3,000 for the interior plaques + \$3,500 for the outdoor plaques. Father will investigate further, and present a formal proposal at the next vestry meeting..

TREASURER'S REPORT – Richard Ferlita

Parishioners have been very generous. There was discussion regarding E-giving, and several Vestry members praised its existence. Recent expenditures have included the quarterly maintenance fee for the elevator, and replacing some fire extinguishers and emergency lights. Pads in the church pews will be refurbished, with the expense being entirely covered by a parishioner. Pledges are up \$32,000 since we adopted the deficit budget, bringing us closer to a balanced budget.

COMMITTEE REPORTS

OUTREACH:

Easter Boxes of Hope are underway.

HOMELESS MINISTRY:

Sue reported that 2 generous donations were received from a parishioner and the Daughters of the King. The program is doing well.

HELPING HANDS:

Lynn is planning for the upcoming kitchen cleanup and inventory on Friday, March 19th from 12-4. Volunteers from Daughters of the King will be helping.

AUDIT COMMITTEE:

Lynn stated they would proceed with the parish audit in late June.

MEDIA COMMITTEE:

Paul reported that he was able to help a parishioner navigate and resolve their difficulty in connecting to streaming our services on Sundays.

OLD BUSINESS:

George is looking for ways to clean the top of the reredos (the marble wall behind the altar). The ash from the wicks on the candelabras are causing soot to form. He suggested fashioning a tall cleaning pole to clean the high marble. Richard suggested we look into using a different, smokeless oil, and Jennifer R suggested we look into switching to cartridges. Richard will investigate.

Paul proposed adding videos to our streaming to commemorate and acknowledge our 150th Anniversary. Richard will send Paul slides with the 150th template design to be added to our website, and include it in all the streaming videos and the bulletins. Ryan is proposing putting on a large concert (which would also be streamed) to showcase the church. It was suggested that we reach out to the Tampa Bay History Center. Richard will follow up with Paul to show him where the archived photos are in the church.


Pam wanted to give accolades to Alicia for the St. Leo Youth Outing, and all the activities she organized for the youth. She thought she did an excellent job.
