Reverendly Speaking

Jesus sat down opposite the treasury, and watched the crowd putting money into the treasury. Many rich people put in large sums. A poor widow came and put in two small copper coins, which are worth a penny. Then he called his disciples and said to them, "Truly I tell you, this poor widow has put in more than all those who are contributing to the treasury. For all of them have contributed out of their abundance; but she out of her poverty has put in everything she had, all she had to live on."

Mark 12:41-44

Dear People of St. Andrew's,

Back in 1984, the press disclosed the generosity of all the candidates in the presidential campaign. In the year before the campaign, Gary Hart gave a total of \$140 to all charitable causes. The Reverend Jesse Jackson, an advocate for the poor, gave a total of \$500 to charity, even though his taxable income was well over \$100,000. Ronald Reagan, who advocated that private citizens should pick up the slack of slashed welfare programs, gave only \$2,000 to all charitable causes, this on an income of several hundred thousand dollars. The highest giver was Walter Mondale, who gave around \$13,500 to benevolences, out of an income of \$500,000.

Some people were outraged that misers and hypocrites were running for public office. Perhaps they shouldn't have been surprised. The giving patterns of these politicians are typical for most Americans. Many of us calculate what it takes to live each week and then donate a little piece of what's left. We give a portion of what we think we can afford. Then we want the IRS to take note of every cent.

But a nameless widow in the Gospel of Mark sees her contribution differently. She gives her money, but not in order to receive some service in return. Her contribution has nothing to do with getting a tax break. She does not calculate the monthly budget and then decide what she can afford to give out of what's left. Rather she gives it all, and then she has to figure out how she is going to live. She is committed beyond all calculation. That is troubling, for it reveals a faith so sacrificial that it scares us to death.

Calling the disciples together, Jesus pointed and said, "Look at that widow. Take a good, hard look." She was the kind of person the world ignores, because she had so little. Yet she was the kind of person Jesus noticed, because she gave so much. Perhaps he saw in her something of what he has always tried to get his followers to see. Here was a woman who refused to play it safe; and neither did Jesus ever play it safe. She did not, could not, hold anything back from God; neither would he. She gave away all she had; and according to the Gospel of Mark, within a few days of leaving that temple, Jesus himself would give everything away. "Look at her," he said. "Take a good, hard look ... because her sacrifice is a picture of what you're going to see God do in me."

Charity is not something that we wish to do, not some means toward an end. Rather, charity is an obligation laid upon us by the nature of God. We are charitable because we have learned that this is the way the world is now that God has entered the world in Jesus Christ. We are not charitable in order to rid our

selves of guilt, since we know we are guilty and that our guilt is not rid through our puny actions. Rather we are charitable because it is in being charitable that we are most like the extravagant God who has been charitable to us.

Commitment beyond calculation. That's what God shows us in Jesus Christ. Whenever we celebrate the central mystery of faith, we affirm a mystery that is the essence of generosity. Christ has died: he has given everything he had, all he had to live on. Christ is risen: he gives us the power to stand free from all the false attachments of this age. Christ will come again: he will complete the generous acts that he has begun.

In Jesus Christ, we have seen a God who gives his very life to us. God continues to give us this gift of life, so that we can become the kind of people who give our lives for others. In the meantime, God will do whatever he can to get our attention.

In one of his Lake Wobegon stories, Garrison Keillor tells about a Sunday morning in Lake Wobegon Lutheran Church. The sermon has been droning on far too long, and Clarence Bunsen has checked out early. He realizes it's almost time for the offering, so he quietly reaches for his wallet. Upon opening his wallet, Clarence discovers he has no cash. He takes out his pen and hides the checkbook in the middle of his Bible, next to one of the psalms. He begins to scratch out a check for thirty dollars, because he almost had a heart attack that week, and because somebody in the church will count the offering and he wants them to see he gave thirty dollars.

He tries not to be obvious, but a lady to his right sees him. Clarence can tell she thinks he's writing in the pew Bible, so he doesn't look at what he's doing. She gives him a funny stare, and turns back to the sermon. Clarence tries to quietly rip the check out of the checkbook, with limited success, still not looking at what he's doing so the lady in the pew won't know he has written out a check in church. The offering plate comes by, and Clarence proudly puts in the check, only to realize a moment too late that he has just written a check for three hundred dollars. He accidently wrote three-zero-zero on two different lines when he wasn't looking.

What could he do? On the one hand, he couldn't go downstairs after church and find the people counting the collection and say, "Fellows, there's been a mistake. I gave more than I really wanted to." On the other hand, he gave all he had in the checking account and a little more. Perhaps he and his family will have to eat beans and oatmeal for the rest of the month, Clarence thought, even though the contribution was going to a good place. One thing was for sure, notes Keillor. In that moment, Clarence felt fully alive for the first time all day.

Commitment beyond calculation. That's what God-in-Christ is watching for. The Lord has been so generous in providing every gift we need. Every day he watches to see what we do with what he has given us. We can learn something from that nameless widow. She did not merely give her money. Instead, she first pledged her heart to God, and the money went with it.

A lot of people will say, "I don't have much to give. I can't afford to be generous. I really don't have anything to offer." Yet the promise of the gospel is sure. The Lord can do a lot with a little when he has it all.

Words of Life: Jesus and the Promise of the Ten Commandments Today

What if the Ten Commandments were not just a set of ancient rules, but a guide to experiencing the good life today?

Nearly everyone has heard of the Ten Commandments, the list of "thou-shalt-nots" found in the Bible. Jesus saw these commandments not as onerous burdens, but as guideposts to help us experience a good and beautiful life.

In *Words of Life*, Pastor Adam Hamilton brings modern eyes to the most important set of ethics in history. He considers the commandments in their historical context, exploring the meaning of each commandment in Hebrew, unpacking how Jesus reinterpreted them, and showing how every thou-shalt-not was intended to point to a life-giving "thou shalt." He also looks at how the latest research in science and psychology illuminates these commandments, rightly understood, as a way of ordering one's life beautifully in the present day. In a culture marked by workaholism, materialism, and social media-driven envy, God has given us a time-tested path that leads to gratitude, confidence, and peace.

This ten-week DVD series features Adam Hamilton teaching from locations in Egypt.

Light of the World: A Beginner's Guide to Advent

In *Light of the World: A Beginner's Guide to Advent*, author and biblical scholar Amy-Jill Levine shows how the Gospel narratives connect to the Old Testament; highlights the role of women in first-century Jewish culture; and emphasizes the importance of Mary's visitation, the census, the stable, the star of Bethlehem, and the flight to Egypt. Amy-Jill Levine is Professor of New Testament at Vanderbilt Divinity School.

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September Vestry Meeting Highlights

As of 9/13/21, there was \$190,531 in ops account and \$83,507 in the parish reserve account.

As of 9/13/21, there was \$33,222 in the Foundation's checking account – monies available to the vestry. After a 5K advance payment to Done Right Roofing for the new rectory roof, we still owe \$17,530 for the rest of that project (which is due upon completion of the work, which finished up on 9/9). Total cost for project is \$22,530. We also owe 3.6K to Redhawk for their water intrusion detection of the leak at Children's Chapel lobby roof (just completed) and 3.2K to Alvaro Cruz for the Columbarium paver project (yet to be done).

Total available funds from Foundation principal for years 2018 thru 2021: \$253,667.

And there was \$3,143,596 in the Foundation principal as of 7/13/21, as opposed to \$2,929,677 on 12/31/20 (an increase of \$213,919 for the year to date).

There is also approximately \$99,000 in the Dan Curtis fund fbo St. Andrew's within the Community Foundation of Tampa Bay, with \$4,371 in grant money available for 2021. This fund is designated for church maintenance purposes.

On Sundays, there is Christian Education for children and adults at 9:30AM on the third floor. There is nursery care from 9:30AM until noon. Alicia has in-person Children's Chapel at 10:30AM. She is also doing a monthly youth activity off-site.

Confirmation Classes – Youth sessions will be during Sunday School at 9:30AM on Sunday mornings, beginning on 9/12 and running through 11/14.

Adult Inquirers' Class will be on Tuesday evenings at 7PM, 10/5 through 11/16 (seven sessions). Confirmation is on 11/21 at 10:30 service.

Sesquicentennial Celebration – St. Andrew's has turned 150 in 2021. Here is a list of possible events for the rest of the year:

Choral Evensong – All Saints' Sunday, 11/7 at 5PM (with reception hosted by Parish Life)

Bishop's Visitation & Confirmation – Sunday, 11/21 at both services (with reception catered, overseen by Parish Life)

Christmas Lessons & Carols – Sunday, 12/19 at 5PM (reception hosted by Parish Life)

Banquet – sometime next year?

Pictorial Directory – Pam and Lauri in office are working on this, it will be an online directory that can be continuously updated and shared electronically with parishioners. Hope to have this published by end of the year.

Newcomers' Dinner – Perhaps sometime early next year, depending on the Covid (hosted by the vestry at the rectory).

Chapel Lobby Ceiling Leak – Redhawk has used infrared and found the source of the leak. George will have a full report on where we go from here.

Church Leak – in NW corner of church, just to the right of the main entrance to the church from the court-yard. Rusty the Roofer will handle this.

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Columbarium Project – Awaiting start of project. We will pay Alvaro Cruz \$3,200 to remove all pavers from columbarium grounds, cut back on tree roots, and re-install the pavers. We also have parishioners willing to donate shrubbery, benches, and a fountain for this beautification project.

2022 Stewardship Campaign – will launch at the end of the month. Thanks, Gary, for heading this up! As has been our custom, we will be looking for folks willing to stand up and give a 2-3 minute stewardship oration/plug at Sunday services in October and November.

Pet Blessing – in church courtyard on Saturday, 10/9 at 10AM.

Virtual Diocesan Convention – will be on Saturday, 10/16. Delegates (Kathy, Paul, and Gray) will gather in the Parish Hall to partake in the virtual festivities. FYI: Diocesan apportionment for us for 2022 will be \$63,107, as opposed to \$63,666 in 2021.

Rector Vacation Dates -9/30 thru 10/4, 10/15 thru 10/17. Fr. Stadel will fill in during that time.

SENIOR WARDEN'S REPORT – Gray Sanders – Absent

JUNIOR WARDEN'S REPORT – George Levy- Rectory roof was completed, however, it failed inspection due to some wood missing. The repairs were completed, and the subsequent inspection passed. George found the Redhawk consultant to be useful. He found the source of the leaks in the chapel lobby roof, and George will start work on rectifying the problem. Some of the solutions will be put in place immediately, and others will be addressed at a later date, on an ongoing basis. The current roofer (TNT) will take care of the immediate repairs at his cost. There is an additional small leak over the NW corner of the church. George has a proposal for \$4500 to be considered.

Sue moved to accept the proposal for the roof work for \$4500 with funds coming from the Dan Curtis Fund. Richard seconded the motion. Motion passed.

TREASURER'S REPORT – Richard Ferlita- Richard delivered his financial report. Among incoming monies, we received a check from 717 Parking for \$4,500 for the month.

OUTREACH: Lori Taplow regarding Parish Life: The Tea that Parish Life planned to host will be postponed until the next Evensong in the spring. Parish Life will do something else for the 11/7 Evensong reception. Lori and Kathy attended the Rally for LOVE In the Name of Christ. She found it very enlightening as to the needs and where we can help. They highlighted the issues of new mothers that are in need. They outlined how there are different ministries to help various needs, and we can choose where to participate. They have an extensive comprehensive program for helping families and individuals in need that includes their participation and efforts to better their lives, along with education programs to help them with budgeting, parenting and money management.

HOMELESS: Sue MacIsaac: Metropolitan Ministries is now setting up The Brigade at 8:30 am until 11:00 am on Fridays.

Kathy Lawless reporting on 150 Celebration Dinner: Followed up with Palm Ceia – holding January 14th as a possible date for the Dinner.

Update on the Columbarium: Richard said that 3 beautiful benches are being donated by Ashley Carl, 2 for the Columbarium, and 1 additional bench for the south garden. Next Vestry Meeting will be Monday, October 18th, at 5:30 pm.
