Reverendly Speaking

Each of you must give as you have made up your mind, not reluctantly or under compulsion, for God loves a cheerful giver.

2 Corinthians 9:7

Dear People of St. Andrew's,

In the cartoon *Pontius' Puddle*, the pastor is shown giving Pontius a basket full of fruit, saying, "Here, Pontius. I'm giving food baskets to members who earn below the poverty line."

Pontius asks, "What makes you think my salary is that small."

The pastor responds, "I took your annual giving to the church and multiplied it by 10."

In his second letter to the Corinthians, the apostle Paul says, "The point is this: the one who sows sparingly will also reap sparingly, and the one who sows bountifully will also reap bountifully" (9:6). Whether you are growing melons or mission projects, Paul is absolutely right — you cannot expect significant results without making a significant investment. There will be no great harvest of pumpkins in the fields, or people in the pews, unless forward-thinking men and women are willing to sow bountifully by making significant investments of time and talent and treasure.

Researchers at Cornell University have conducted what they call "holier-than-thou" experiments to see just how generous people think they are, compared to how generous they think others are. Invariably, reports Julie Salamon in the book *Rambam's Ladder: A Meditation on Generosity and Why It Is Necessary to Give*, people judge themselves to be more generous than they really are, and they think others are less generous.

In one experiment, undergraduate students were given \$5 each, and then asked how much of this money they thought they would give to charity. On average, they thought they would give \$2.50, and their peers would give only \$1.80. In reality, the students gave \$1.53.

In *Robert Kennedy: His Life* (Touchstone, 2002), biographer Evan Thomas notes that Kennedy, a child of wealth and privilege, rarely carried cash, relying instead upon various members of his entourage to pick up his tabs.

One day Kennedy, a devout Catholic, attended mass with a friend, who dutifully placed a dollar in the collection plate on his behalf — only to hear the muttered protest: "Don't you think I'd be more generous than that?"

Which raises the question: If your neighbor was going to put in for you, how much would that neighbor put in?!

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As we move forward with our 2023 stewardship campaign, the words of Paul ring as true for us as they did for the people of Corinth.

When Paul writes that "God loves a cheerful giver" (9:7), what he says in the original Greek is that God loves a giver who is *hilaros* — the root of our English word "hilarious." What God loves is a *hilarious* giver, a person who gives with spontaneous joy and laughter.

So, when was the last time that you actually laughed as you sat down to write your check to the church? Maybe you're not giving at the level that will tip you over into hilarity. Or perhaps you're not focusing enough on the joy that God is feeling, and that needy people are feeling, as a result of your generosity.

Hilarious giving. That's the solution to the paradox that we are living with every day, the antidote to the unhappiness we are bound to feel as we spend our days in the middle of our self-obsessed secular society. We would all be better off if we were more grateful, more forgiving, and more spiritual.

We can capture a more hopeful view, but only by learning to give with joy and laughter. As we commit ourselves to Christian stewardship, both inside and outside the church, we will discover that God is truly able to provide us with every blessing in abundance (9:8). As we share our resources, we will find that we will be enriched in every way for our great generosity, and we will find ourselves filled with the "surpassing grace of God" (9:11-14). As we make sacrifices for others, we will come to see that money cannot buy happiness, but generosity can.

Who knows? We may even break out in laughter.

In a world that so often makes us feel rotten, hilarious giving is the key to contentment.

The Last Supper on the Moon: The Ocean of Space, the Mystery of Grace, and the Life Jesus Died for You to Have

Have you ever noticed that all throughout your life, the moon has been staring at you? Its presence in the sky is constant, yet impossible to fully grasp. The wonder of it caused David to write, "When I consider your heavens, the work of your fingers, the moon and the stars, which you have set in place, what is mankind that you are mindful of them?" (Psalm 8:3-4).

Centuries later, the pull of the moon led John F. Kennedy to make a declaration that the United States would send men to walk on its surface--a goal realized with the historic Apollo 11 mission. What's lesser known is that moments before leaving the lander, Buzz Aldrin partook of a special meal--the *Last Supper on the moon*. The lunar Last Supper was full of meaning, just as it had been when Jesus first took of the elements with his disciples.

In this five-session DVD study, author and pastor Levi Lusko journeys back in time and forward in hope, using the 1969 lunar mission as an analogy of God's mission of salvation. Along the way, he explores the wonder of God's love in sending Jesus from "outer space" to die for your sins--and how that incredible love has the power to transform your "inner space."


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September Vestry Meeting Highlights

RECTOR'S REPORT

As of 8/29/22, there was \$155,076 in ops account and \$76,283 in the parish reserve account.

As of 6/30/22, there was \$21,119 in the Foundation's checking account – monies available to the vestry.

Total available funds from principal for years 2018 thru 2022: \$328,011.

There was \$2,725,845 in the Foundation principal as of 6/30/22, as opposed to \$3,218,925 on 12/31/21 (a decrease of \$493,080 for the year to date).

There is also approximately \$99,000 in the Dan Curtis fund fbo St. Andrew's within the Community Foundation of Tampa Bay. This fund is designated for church maintenance purposes. We spent the 2021 allocation of \$4,250 to pay TNT Roofing for repairs to the NW corner of church roof.

Pictorial Directory – Pam & Lauri in office are working on this, it will be an online directory that can be continuously updated & shared electronically w/ parishioners. Pam is currently learning to operate Realm (which is the update for ACS, our current software system). Her goal is to then have the directory up & running by autumn.

Columbarium Project – Mosaic is a work in progress (we recently paid \$2,500 from the Foundation to kick start the project). We are currently advertising this giving opportunity parish-wide. As of 9/6, 47 donors have given \$15,225 for this project. Price quote from the artist is \$10,120 for the mural and \$1,840 for travel and installation (for a total of \$11,960). Mural has been shipped and should arrive on 9/12 or 9/13. Artist will install it the weekend of September 16-18. Dedication will take place after the 10:30 service on Sunday, 11/20, along with catered luncheon. The artist will attend church on the 18th of September.

Sexton on Vacation – Anguel makes his annual trip to Bulgaria 8/10 - 10/16. (He'll be paid for his vacation days accrued, but certainly not for the whole time he's away.) We'll use temp (David Dickinson from parishioner Mike Dickinson's Staff Source firm) during Anguel's absence. Financially, it should be a wash.

Leaks – Chapel Lobby leak is no more. However, we have a few new leaks in the church. (You may have noticed buckets in a couple of places there.)

Deanery Convocation – was on 9/7 at Ascension, Clearwater. Lori, Loueita, Brad, and yours truly attended. This was the prep meeting before diocesan convention.

Bishop Co-adjutor Situation – The Rev. Doug Scharf began work w/ the Diocese on 7/1. He will be consecrated/ ordained as a bishop on Sat, 9/24 at 11AM at the Van Wezel in Sarasota. Bishop Smith will retire at the end of this calendar year. Thus, the Diocese will be paying two salaries for a 6 month time period. Diocesan clergy will meet with the Presiding Bishop on Fri, 9/23 at 11AM at St. Boniface on Siesta Key.

Blessing of the Animals – will be on Saturday, 10/1 at 10AM in the courtyard. Bring your furry, feathered or scaly friend to the service.

Diocesan Convention – Saturday, 10/15 at the Punta Gorda Convention Center (with optional workshops on Friday, 10/14). Our delegates are Lori, Loueita, Brad, and yours truly.

Oktoberfest – Sunday, 10/16 in the Parish Hall after the 10:30 service, hosted by the Outreach Committee. *Brats und bier! Wunderbar!*

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Mosaic Dedication & Parish Luncheon – Sunday, 11/20, after the 10:30 service.

Planned Giving – The Foundation Board would like the parish to begin a serious effort at promoting planed giving. We could create a legacy society that would ask folks to include St. Andrew's in their estate planning. This could even be incorporated into the annual stewardship campaign, which needs to launch the end of September.

2023 Stewardship Campaign – will launch at the end of the month. Thanks, Gary, for heading this up! As has been our custom, we will be looking for folks willing to stand up to give a 2-3 minute stewardship oration/plug at Sunday services in October & November. Gary will write the letter for the first pledge card mailing (end of September), followed by Senior Warden (end of Oct), Treasurer (end of Nov), and Rector (early Jan).

SENIOR WARDEN'S REPORT: Richard Felita. He shared that we have \$15,825 to date for mural; the church is short \$3,200 for the project. The funds are for the mosaic, along with the food, tent and security on 11/20. The mural will be installed 9/15 to 9/17. Nancy Turner will speak at both Sunday services on 9/18 and introduce the artist to parishioners.

JUNIOR WARDEN'S REPORT: Richard Chapman. Richard C shared that he has fixed the faucet in the ladies restroom on the first floor and mulched the playground area. Richard C shared that the second-floor restrooms could be refreshed with new toilet partitions (which have not been changed since the 1960s) at a cost of \$6,100. Barbara B made a motion to accept spending \$6,100.00 on the update of the bathroom; the motion was seconded by Loueita Hargens. There was discussion on why we are doing a less expensive refresh rather than a total renovation. Richard C will research cost of replacing flooring in both restrooms and present those numbers at the next vestry meeting. The motion to spend the \$6,100 was withdrawn by Barbara B. Richard C stated we are still working on fixing the irrigation system around the parking lot perimeter. Kathy Lawless asked about the possibility of repairing the exterior light above the kitchen doors.

TREASURER'S REPORT: Lori Taplow stated that "I don't see anything noteworthy in the numbers, nothing atypical and we are down budget against actuals." There was discussion about various line items in the restricted accounts.

COMMITTEE REPORTS:

HOMELESS MINISTRY: Kathy Lawless. The ministry is going well, and Kathy thanked Pam Frost for helping with some administrative tasks. There is an event this week that provides vision, dental and medical call for those in need being held at the Convention Center and the ministry is giving out that type of information in flyers for the homeless. They are in the need of a volunteer to pick up and drop off sandwiches at St. Andrew's for every Monday in October. We are consistently serving 45 to 60 people.

PARISH LIFE. Pam Curry. On November 6th Parish Life will be hosting the reception in the Parish Hall after the choir concert. Loueita will coordinate this event for Pam, who will be out of town. Regarding the 11/20 luncheon and mural dedication, Pam noted that she and Richard are meeting on 9/21 with the catering company and the tent company on site to ensure that details are ironed out. Invitations to parishioners will be sent out by the third week in September. Vestry members must remind guests to RSVP in order to facilitate head count. There will be several reminders in the bulletin to RSVP. There will be a simple buffet lunch that day. Pam gave information about the tent set-up, which will be located in the parking lot. There was discussion about particulars regarding the dedication and luncheon.

HELPING HANDS: Barbara Brotherton. No report.

MEDIA MINISTRY: Paul Scheuer. Paul expressed thanks for Doug Rubottom and Jan Smith for volunteering to run the livestream on Sunday mornings. Ryan and Coleman had previously posted some fine video sessions on the St. Andrew's YouTube channel that included organ music and info about St. Andrew's. Paul spoke to them about doing more of those type of videos on behalf of St. Andrew's. Paul is researching the possibility of replacing the two recording microphones that hang in the front chandeliers of the church.

OUTREACH: Chris Capsambelis. Chris reminded us about Oktoberfest after the 10:30 service on Sunday, 10/16. In support of Metropolitan Ministries, turkey packing will start in November and collections and delivery will be on Saturday, 11/19. Recommendation is to put up the Gabriel Giving Tree by 11/20. On Sunday, 12/4, Outreach will have the Fish Fry after the 10:30 service.

STEWARDSHIP. Gary Cotter. Gary shared that the Episcopal Network for Stewardship has bulletin inserts for stewardship that relate that Sunday's gospel with the stewardship concept. Gary recommends that those be printed and put into the bulletins for the next several Sundays. Father agreed to do that.
