Dear People of St. Andrew's,

Truit Gannon, pastor of a church in Georgia, tells of an incident in his boyhood. A man named Hugh, who worked for his father, owned a beautiful Harley Davidson motorcycle. Truit says it was his greatest thrill as a teenager to ride that motorcycle. One day he asked, "Hugh, can I ride your motorcycle again today?" Hugh's words have stuck with him ever since. "You can ride it anytime you want to," Hugh said, "anywhere you want to, and as often as you want to. Just remember to ride it like it was mine and not yours." Reflecting on that statement, Gannon says, "God has given us full and free use of this world. All He asks is that we use it like it was His and not ours. That's stewardship."

Each day we decide the question, "Shall I live for God or for myself?" This was the dilemma Adam and Eve faced in the garden and every person must face. Human beings must worship something. If we do not let God be God, then we will make something else into our God. It may be ourselves, our possessions, another person or some ideal or institution. Something will rule over our lives. Frank Sinatra sings, "I did it my way." It may be unrecognized by most folks, but this is the theme song of their lives. But our way is not God's way. Our way often leads into difficulty and heartbreak, but God's way leads into life and peace and joy. His way involves our letting Christ control and direct us in all things. He becomes the center of our lives and the One we worship.

Making Him Lord means using our possessions, our time, talents, influence and property for His glory. When He is Lord we recognize that we are stewards of everything, not just our possessions. We are stewards of life itself and all of life's experiences. The Christian steward makes Christ the Lord of all his life, for Christ must be Lord of all.

Leonard Sanderson, a Baptist pastor, tells how this was brought home to him by a layman that he came to know. They were visiting together during a revival meeting in Tulsa, Oklahoma. As they passed a new office building, Sanderson said, "That's a magnificent building." The young man replied, "Yes, that belongs to my father." "Sure enough?" Sanderson said. "You have every reason to be proud of that." He referred to some other nice property during the afternoon and each time the young businessman said, "That belongs to my father, too." It was beginning to get to Pastor Sanderson, so he said, "You're not pulling my leg, are you?" The young man replied, "No, I'm not kidding you, preacher. God is my father, and He owns everything."

The key scripture for understanding the Christian view of material things is Colossians 1:16 where Paul says, "All things were created by Him and for Him." God made us for Himself and gives us material things to fulfill His purpose and plan for the world. His purpose is that all persons come to know Christ and find fullness of life through Him and in the church. Whatever we have should be spent ultimately to that purpose.

Christians must discover and follow God's purpose in getting and spending. We have let materialistic values squeeze us into their mold. When Clare Booth Luce was appointed U.S. ambassador to Italy, she

rented a 17th century Italian villa. Soon she noticed she was not feeling well. She was tired, lost weight and had little energy. She got worse and worse. After intense medical tests, doctors determined that she was being poisoned by arsenic. All the staff in the villa were found to be trustworthy. Where was the poison coming from? Finally, the cause was located. The ceiling of her bedroom had carvings of roses, and those carvings, it was discovered, were painted with arsenic-laced lead paint. A fine dust fell from the roses. Completely unaware of what was going on, Mrs. Luce was being poisoned in her bed by this fine dust falling from the roses.

We, too, completely unaware of it, are in danger of being poisoned by a materialistic outlook. We can be tainted by materialism all about us without being aware until it is too late.

Following God's purpose in material possessions involves giving through His church.

"Freely we have received, freely we are to give." We give out of love and thanksgiving to the glory of God, as Paul points out. God loves a cheerful giver, he says, and a cheerful giver loves God and his fellow men more and more.

Our giving and our lifestyle ought to reflect that Christ is Lord. Our lifestyle should reflect that we can tell the difference between necessities and luxuries. A Christian steward's lifestyle and giving will reflect the responsibility he feels for the blessings God has bestowed upon him. And his lifestyle will show that he seeks contentment in doing God's will and fulfilling His purpose for the world.

Whitney Yeaple has paraphrased a Biblical verse in two ways. Which applies to you?

"Mr. Blank of the blank congregation so loved the world that he gave up what was dear to him so that the work of the Lord in his church might go forward. This he did that men might know of eternal life and not perish."

Or "Mr. Blank of the blank congregation so loved himself that he withheld all but a trifling amount of his money that he might gratify his own whims, caring little whether his Lord or his church could carry on. This he did in spite of the fact that he knew men would perish without the word of eternal life."

Remember, where your treasure is, there your heart will be also.

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September Vestry Meeting Highlights

RECTOR'S REPORT

As of 9/11/23, there was \$177,169 in ops account and \$86,283 in the parish reserve account.

As of 8/31/23, there was \$16,656 in the Foundation's checking account – monies available to the vestry.

Total available funds from Foundation principal for years 2020 thru 2023: \$332,690.

There was \$2,987,179 in the Foundation principal as of 8/4/23, as opposed to \$2,757,202 on 12/31/22 (an increase of \$229,979 for the year).

There is also approximately \$99,000 in the Dan Curtis fund fbo St. Andrew's within the Community Foundation of Tampa Bay. This fund is designated for church maintenance purposes. We spent the 2021 allocation of \$4,250 to pay TNT Roofing for repairs to the NW corner of church roof. We did not spend any of the 2022 allocation. Current amount available is \$8,981 (the allocations for 2022 and 2023).

Pictorial Directory – Pam is adding names to the new directory, which will be up and running very soon.

Church roof leaks – in north transept and NW corner of church are being addressed by a water intrusion company.

First Floor Restroom Renovations – are complete.

Deanery Convocation – for Diocesan convention delegates was on Wednesday, 9/6 at St. Mary's, Tampa. Our delegates are Barbara, Derrick, and Brad. The diocese informed us that property insurance costs will rise 28%-35% in coming year. Health insurance will increase by 7%. Our diocesan assessment for 2024 will be 5K higher than in 2023. The diocese taxes us at 10% of our operating income, based on a three-year rolling average.

2023 Stewardship Campaign – will launch at the end of the month. Thanks, Brad, for heading this up! As has been our custom, we will be looking for folks willing to stand up and give a 2-3 minute stewardship oration/plug at Sunday services in October and November. Brad will write the letter for the first pledge card mailing (end of September), followed by Senior Warden (end of October), Treasurer (end of November), and Rector (early January).

Halloween House – for the kids in on Saturday, 10/28 from 6PM to 8PM at St. Andrew's. Planning meeting is after the 10:30 service on 9/24.

Episcopal Visitation – Bishop Scharf will visit St. Andrew's on Sunday, 2/25/24 (the Second Sunday in Lent). Confirmation class for youth will start in the fall (during Sunday school hour) and for adults in January and February (on Tuesday evenings).

Senior Warden: Richard Ferlita thanked Richard Chapman for the awesome restroom renovation. Richard reported that the Booker family would like to come to St. Andrew's and see the piano they donated for the parish hall in use. We could then acknowledge their donation.

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Junior Warden: Richard Chapman reported that the first-floor restroom renovations will come in under budget. Final cost will be around 33K, rather than the 43K budgeted. Richard met with a waterproofing contractor to get background on finding the source of the leaks in the north transept of the church (by the chapel). They will systematically test walls, roof, and other potential areas for leaks. The Dan Curtis Fund would be the likely source of funds. It is believed that this will be the definitive exercise needed to detect these pesky leaks.

Richard Ferlita made a motion to approve engaging the Shield Coatings and Weatherproofing Company and pay them \$3,500 to detect the roof leaks, cost to be paid from the Dan Curtis Fund. Kathy Lawless seconded and the motion passed unanimously.

Richard discussed the renovation of the second-floor restrooms as discussed in previous meetings. This is an extensive undertaking involving all surfaces and fixtures in these rooms. These renovations would follow the décor found in the third and sixth floor restrooms. The work is estimated to cost up to \$48,000.

Richard Ferlita made a motion to approve the renovation of the second-floor restrooms, not to exceed \$48,000, to be paid for from Foundation funds. Brad Hall seconded the motion and it was approved unanimously.

Treasurer: Eric Hargens stated that we have a small deficit in the expenses because the electric bill has more than doubled. Other savings in expenses basically kept us in line. On the revenue side, contributions are a little below the budget and there has been a positive bump in parking revenue.

Committee Reports:

Outreach: Chris Capsambelis reported that \$1,065 was raised at the Octoberfest celebration on Sunday, proceeds to benefit Metropolitan Ministries. We had a lot of food and it was much enjoyed by attendees. Thanksgiving Boxes of Hope is the next project. That is scheduled for the Saturday before Thanksgiving. Our annual Fish Fry is coming up on November 12th. It was requested that we host a blood drive here. The drive would be on a Sunday. If we do the Fish Fry during the Blood Drive, that might be a way to keep our folks occupied while they wait to donate blood. Martha Cobb mentioned that elf shopping for Gabriel Giving Tree project is going to cost more than in previous years. She will make an announcement that all donations are welcome, but will explain parameters around what it will take this year to provide the usual complement of gifts. The Gabriel Tree will go up on November 5th as it was suggested that we allow more time for participants to select their child(ren) and shop for the gifts. The Gabriel Tree party is scheduled for the 9th of December.

Outreach Homeless Program: Kathy Lawless thanked Holly Clemmons for handling the calendar this month. Kathy reported that there were some new people who signed up for the Homeless Program during Rally Day. Kathy will be reaching out to parishioners for more socks and other items. Richard will make another request of Bombas, but we are on a rota with them. Kathy will put something in the bulletin.

Media: Paul Scheuer reported that he has a revised quote for the two church recording microphones in the amount of \$3,427.34. This amount is consistent with the amount the Vestry voted to approve at a previous vestry meeting. They invoice in advance because the expense is primarily for the hardware. The vendor, A.J. Layton, is available to install in mid-October.

Christian Education: Allison Besselieu reported that they are looking for volunteers to assist Alicia. Allison will solicit volunteers via a sign-up genius.
