Dear People of St. Andrew's,

We first met in the church courtyard on a warm evening in September 2013. We hit it off immediately. She was devastatingly attractive and had pretty green eyes that could see right through to my soul. Sure, there was quite an age difference, but that did not matter to either of us. We bonded so well in that first chance encounter that I decided to take her home with me that evening. My wife was a bit shocked when I introduced her to the new love of my life, but decided to allow the new girl to move in with us anyway. She purred like a kitten because, well, she *WAS* a kitten (about four months old, it turns out). I named her Carly. I discovered that she and I had much in common. We both loved to eat numerous times each day and take naps. I favored the sofa while Carly frequented the kitchen chairs and the big family room easy chair. We both enjoyed catching some rays on the backyard patio. We both had our doctors tell us to lose weight.

Carly was a bit of an unusual cat in that she actually liked having her belly rubbed. As you rubbed her fluffy, chubby, white tummy, she would stretch out as far as her little body would allow and then smile. Yes, you could see her little face smirking while she was being petted. Carly liked nothing better than to be petted and petted and petted some more.

Carly was a clean cat who preferred to keep her black fur black and her white fur white. She was also quite amenable to keeping me clean as well, licking my hands and fingers just as vigorously as she cleansed herself.

We both had a penchant for the *St. Petersburg Times*. Each evening I would sit down in my recliner, grab the newspaper, then have Carly arrive in my lap so that the two of us could catch up on the news together. She loved to nuzzle and would often bury her head between my neck and two chins.

Carly would help with just about any task, from decorating the Christmas tree to doing the taxes to conducting research on the computer.

Unlike me, Carly was a mighty hunter. She prowled daily in the wilds of the backyard. Her most common prey were the various lizards and skinny snakes that lived out back. On really good days, she would bring home a mouse or squirrel. She proudly displayed her trophies on the back door step, then promptly ate them (unless we intervened and buried the little critters). She also had a knack for 'roaching.' Just put her in a dark garage and she would invariably find any and all cockroaches within a matter of minutes. She didn't eat those, however. 'Roaching' was just for sport.

Also unlike me, Carly was a deft tree climber. While she favored species of a smaller variety, she was not averse from scaling the mighty oaks. She had no trouble extricating herself from such lofty heights and was always looking for a new challenge.

Carly was also a keen observer of the geckos that live in the column on our front porch. She would spend warm evenings waiting for the geckos to appear and traverse the walls and ceiling of the porch, hoping for a chance to pounce if one of them should dare come close to ground level.

Carly and I were best friends. We were both creatures of habit that were perfectly content with our daily routine, much of which involved each other. She was always there to give me unconditional love and wise counsel after a long day at church. She never complained (at least as long as I kept to her regular dining schedule) and was always there to boost my morale. No matter what was weighing me down, an evening with Carly guaranteed that the load would be lifted. That's because a true friend loves always and is there for you in times of adversity (as Proverbs 17:17 notes). It seems that Carly knew her Scriptures and lived a life full of love and friendship.

Carly was hit by a car and killed on February 13th. I shall miss her very much. A slightly altered version of a poem I read called *The Mile* sums it up well:

Kitties come into our lives and walk with us a mile.


And then - because of circumstance - only stay a while.

Tuesday Evening Lenten Series A Brief Overview of Islam

What is the origin of Islam? Who was Mohammad? What does the Koran say? What are the required practices of Muslims? What is Jihad?

For six Tuesdays in the season of Lent (**February 9, 16, 23, & March 1, 8, 15**) we will have Holy Eucharist in the Children's Chapel at 5:30pm, followed by a pot-luck supper at 6:00pm in the Parish Hall and the Lenten program from 6:30 to 7:30pm. Fr. Ed Rich will present a short course on Islam. We will gain an historical perspective, consider the relationship among the three great monotheistic religions, the spread of Islam from a tiny desert village in Saudi Arabia to a world-wide religion, touch briefly on the Crusades, the Barbary Pirates, and the recent events in the Middle East, Yemen, Syria, Iraq, Iran, and Muslim migration into Europe. At the end of each class there will be time for questions. Please join Fr. Rich for this series on a very timely issue. (*Alicia Schmid will lead a program for children on the 6th floor each week during Fr. Rich's presentation.*)

Stations of the Cross: Fridays in Lent 12:10pm

Come and join us for this 30-minute devotional, observed on Fridays at 12:10pm running through Good Friday on March 25. Our Stations of the Cross, a gift from Nathan & Jane Simpson, are a series of pictures representing certain scenes in the <u>Passion of Christ</u>, each corresponding to a particular incident. Formerly the number of stations varied considerably in different places but fourteen are now generally acknowledged. The object of the Stations is to help the faithful to make in spirit, as it were, a pilgrimage to the chief scenes of Christ's sufferings and death. It is carried out by passing from Station to Station, with certain prayers at each and devout meditation on the various incidents in turn. It is very usual, when the devotion is performed publicly, to sing a stanza of the "Stabat Mater" while passing from one Station to the next.

Adult Christian Education

John: The Gospel of Light and Life

The Gospel of John is the most deeply spiritual of the four Gospels. It includes some of the loftiest and most loved verses in all the Bible: "And the Word became flesh..., "For God so loved the world...," "You who are without sin cast the first stone...," "I am the resurrection and the life...," "I am the way, and the truth, and the life." The writing is filled with rich images and profound truths, but John notes that his aim in writing the Gospel is that his readers will not only believe in Jesus Christ, but that they "may have life in his name."

This Lent, join Adam Hamilton and experience a season of spiritual growth and life-changing renewal while reading the entire Gospel of John. In these 10-15 minute videos, Hamilton shares insights with a group of 15 people, then answers their questions. Each week, we will watch the video, then have our own period of discussion. Hamilton is pastor of The United Methodist Church of the Resurrection in Leawood. Kansas.

The Faith of a Mockingbird A Small Group Study Connecting Christ and Culture

Pastor and author Matt Rawle is on a mission. He sees Christ all around him-in books, movies, TV shows, rock music—and he wants to share what he sees. As Matt says, "God offers the raw ingredients, and 'culture' is whatever we cook up." In The Faith of a Mockingbird, based on Harper Lee's To Kill a Mockingbird, Rawle uses Lee's beloved characters to explore Christian faith, theology, and ethics. Join Scout, Atticus Finch, Boo Radley, and Tom Robinson in this four-week study considering God's world and what it all means. Each week we will view a short DVD focusing on a particular character from the book, then have discussion.

Here is the line-up:

April 3 — Using the song of the mockingbird, Rawle describes how cultural movements affect the church and church life challenges culture, like the movements of a Spirit-inspired dance.

April 10 – Rawle uses Atticus Finch to describe the difference between a hero and a saint, and how Christ calls us to put aside our heroic aspirations for a saint's holy calling.

April 17 – In order to explain the difficulty of recognizing systemic racism, Rawle uses how a choir stays in tune to show how easy it is for a system to miss the mark.

April 24 – Using the mystery of Boo Radley, Rawle explains how the more we practice God's will, the more our holy imagination can capture who God is and what God is doing in the world.

Many regard Revelation as the hardest book in the New Testament. It is full of strange, lurid, and sometimes bizarre and violent imagery. As a result, people who are quite at home in the Gospels, Acts and Paul find themselves tiptoeing around Revelation with a sense that they don't really belong there. But they do! This book offers one of the clearest and sharpest visions of God's ultimate purpose for the whole creation. Here we see how the powerful forces of evil can be and are being overthrown through the victory of Jesus the Messiah and the consequent costly victory of his followers.



The result is a profoundly moving tale of loss that is also a joyful, and often humorous, celebration of life: Will's love letter to his mother, and theirs to the printed page.

Choral Evensong and Pot-luck Supper on March 6

St. Andrew's Choir will offer a service of Choral Evensong on March 6, the Fourth Sunday in Lent, at 5:00 p.m. Dr. Haig Mardirosian will accompany the choir in John Ireland's most celebrated anthem, "Greater Love." The choir will also sing the *Preces and Responses* of William Byrd and Orlando Gibbons' *Short Service* Magnificat and Nunc Dimittis. A wine-and-cheese reception in the courtyard will follow the service.

Parishioners are also invited to join members of the Tampa Chapter of the American Guild of Organists for a pot-luck supper at 6:30 p.m. in our parish hall. After supper Dr. Mardirosian will give a talk entitled "An Organist's Profiles in Courage":

In 1957, then-Senator John F. Kennedy (actually Theodore Sorenson) wrote a Pulitzer Prize book outlining the brave and sometimes defiant acts of eight Senators through American history. Much of that book was about defiance and those taking a stand in the face of justice, unity, ethics, and bravery. These were formative individuals in American political identity (at least in the context of the noble profession of politics as it existed 50 or more years ago).

Borrowing upon that notion, Dr. Mardirosian will reflect on a similar group of figures in the organ world in the United States, many of whom he knew, who contributed mightily to the ascendency of the pipe organ to a position of prominence in the past 50 years. "These biographical reflections will compose a narrative of the many threads of thinking and practice that have informed our profession and our tastes even to the present day."

January Vestry Meeting Highlights

Rector's Report:

- As of January 19, there was \$217K in ops account. There is 140K in the Foundation's checking/CDs monies available to the vestry. We also have \$38K available from the Foundation principal as a result of the 2.25% spending allocation designated by the Foundation Board for 2015. We have \$70K in the parish reserve account. And there was \$1,724,209 in Foundation principal as of December 31 (a drop of \$33K for 2015). There is also \$89K in the Dan Curtis fund fbo St. Andrew's within the Community Foundation of Tampa Bay.
- Christmas Pageant during 10:30am service on Sunday, December 20 (we had two dozen kids in this and it was a great pageant Alicia did a fine job)
- Hanging of the Greens after the 10:30am service on Sunday, December 20. Many hands made for light work. We finished up in record time! Jan Smith did a great job in heading this up.
- Christmas Lessons & Carols at 5:00pm on Sunday, December 20, followed by Christmas party in the Parish Hall hosted by Parish Life. Attendance was great (116). We should do this again come December.
- Christmas Services at 5:30pm and 11pm on Christmas Eve (with pre-service music beginning at 5:00pm and 10:30pm), and 10:00am on Christmas morning. Overall, attendance was great. We packed the 5:30, as usual, and had a nice increase in attendance at the other two services over last year.
- Stewardship Campaign Pledge cards were mailed out on November 2. A second mailing went out on November 23, with a third mailing on December 14. Vestry members received names of outstanding pledgers at vestry meeting on December 21. A postcard mailing was done in early January. We currently have 155 pledges for \$397K. We have yet to hear from many families. There are 40 outstanding pledging units who pledged \$75K in 2015 that we have yet to hear from for 2016. Pledge cards were mailed to those families on January 20. The 2016 budget will be relying on receiving at least \$50K out of that outstanding \$75K in order to meet 2016 expenses (which will only be 1% more than last year). We started this campaign late (early November). Next year, it would behoove us to send out the first mailing in early October.
- Vestry Nominees Once again we have five nominees for the five slots. Thus, another Communist election looms, with the proletariat basically voting 'da' or 'nyet.' But Richard tried hard, asking 39 people to run that's right, 39. Thus, we were turned down by 34 folks.
- Foundation Board Nominees Richard Ferlita and Martha Cobb are willing to run for the two slots, which are for three-year terms. (Nancy Turner and Wes Tibbals are rotating off the board.) This election takes place at the annual meeting.
- Annual Meeting on Sunday, January 31 at noon.
- Shrove Tuesday Pancake Supper on February 9 at 6:00pm, preceded by 5:30pm service in Children's Chapel. Lenten Series begins that evening at 6:30pm, with The Rev. Ed Rich leading a six-week series on Islam. Each successive Tuesday, February 16 through March 15, we will have service at 5:30pm in Children's Chapel, pot-luck supper at 6:00pm, and the program from 6:30-7:30pm. Alicia will offer a program for children on the sixth floor during that same hour each week.

- Ash Wednesday on February 10 with services at 7:30am, 12:10pm, and 7:00pm (with choir). All services will have imposition of ashes.
- 2016 Proposed Budget is under separate attachment, along with the 2016 pledge report. We will need to finalize and adopt a 2016 budget at our Monday meeting. Review of line items increase of 1% from previous year's budget.

A motion was made by Ms. Baker to add a \$6,000 line item to the 2016 budget to fund the Easter and Christmas guest musicians. Ms. Borsch seconded the motion and, after lengthy discussions, the line item addition was unanimously approved as presented.

Possible Tenants for upper floors - Rojo, the architects who did the plans for our renovations in 2008/2009, came by to look at the upper floors on Wednesday, December 16. They provided us with a proposal on January 14, which amounts to \$46K. The lateness of the proposal, coupled with the high cost, indicates that Rojo has plenty of work and does not need our business. We should probably get another architectural opinion.

We also need to think about costs involved. Richard Chapman provided some guesstimates on a build-out (he can only guess since we do not have any architectural renderings or mechanical drawings. Ballpark figures (and I stress, these are ballpark figures) reveal that it will probably cost \$250K each to renovate 4th and 5th floors, \$150K to refurbish 6th floor to meet Proximiti's needs. (Proximiti can stay in their present location until the end of the year, thereby giving them more time to consider where they will re-locate.). Plus, add in the \$46K (or so) for architect fees.

If you can think of other possible scenarios, please bring them to the table at the meeting on Monday. There was much discussion in response to the first quote provided by ROJO. The vestry decided to secure more quotes and vary the "plan" from a customized remodel to a generic remodel. Will revisit next time.

The Diocese issued a statement that a portion of the annual apportionment (about one month's payment to the diocese) will be refunded. The diocese would like to know how we are planning to spend the refund.

A motion was made by Ms. Baker to split the apportionment refund 50/50 between the Outreach and Youth/Children's Christian Education ministries. Ms. Borsch seconded the motion and, after some discussion, the motion was approved.

Sr. Warden – Mr. Ferlita:

The vestry will provide dinner on February 16 for the Lenten series.

Five people will run for incoming vestry at annual parish meeting.

The refrigerators in the parish hall need to be replaced. Donations will cover one and St. Andrew's needs to pay for two.

A motion was made by Mr. Baker to pay for the refrigerators out of the Parish Reserve Account, not to exceed \$1200. Ms. Baker seconded the motion and, after no discussion, the motion was approved as presented. (NB – In a later development, donors actually paid for two of the fridges, while the church paid for one.)

Jr. Warden – Mr. Levy:

The leaking continued with the rain and needs to be addressed. Reviewed quotes of parapet sealing with additional add-on's (painting entire building, caulking of windows, first floor of parish hall, etc...) and will consult with the Building & Grounds Committee before proceeding.
