“Go therefore and make disciples of all nations, baptizing them ... and teaching them to obey everything that I have commanded you”

Matthew 28:19-20

Dear People of St. Andrew's,

Just a few months ago, there was a lot of online buzz about the NETFLIX serial, “Making a Murderer.” The events take place in what NETFLIX calls the “heartland of America” and takes a close look “inside a high-stakes criminal case.” The mini-series was filmed over a 10-year period and focuses on Steven Avery who was accused, tried and convicted in 1985 of the sexual assault and attempted murder of Penny Beerntsen.

Avery spent 18 years in prison for this crime, a crime he didn't commit - an inconvenient truth uncovered by the Innocence Project. After being released in 2003 because DNA evidence exonerated him, he filed a \$36 million lawsuit against the county and various individuals connected to the case. Then, two years later, he was arrested and charged with the murder of Teresa Halbach, a local photographer.

Controversy aside, the show has been a huge success for NETFLIX and has generated tsunami-level conversations on social media sites and online news sources.

The title itself is suggestive. What does medical research tell us today as to what, precisely, turns an infant with no moral consciousness into an adult with no moral consciousness and a person who will someday commit the most grisly crimes? There was a time when the problem was thought to be in the brain, and that a frontal lobotomy would turn a violent person into a compliant one. How is a murderer “made”? Is the family and cultural environment to blame? Or, is the perpetrator simply born with violent, antisocial and sociopathic tendencies? Perhaps the truth lies in a mix of these speculations.

NETFLIX implies that the murderer was *made*. Something - some agency - acted upon Avery. Some external force fashioned him as though he was a chock of wood for the woodcarver or a block of granite for a sculptor. Something molded him, formed him into a murderous monster. This is what is suggested by the title, “Making a Murderer.”

“The making of ...” is a common expression:

- *The Making of a Lady* (novel and PBS 90-minute movie),
- The Making of a Nation (various media)
- *The Making of a Man* (Christian-themed book by Tim Brown, Heisman trophy winner at Notre Dame and NFL wide receiver for the Oakland Raiders)
- The Making of a Terrorist (NPR interview, and title of numerous op-ed pieces)

Is it possible that the church has a stronger role to play in “making” or “turning” (*continued*)

people into disciples of Jesus Christ than we have heretofore considered? Jesus said, “Go therefore and make disciples of all nations, baptizing them ... and teaching them to obey everything that I have commanded you” (Matthew 28:19-20).

We have one thing to do: make disciples. Jesus called disciples. We should, too.

The disciples lived with Jesus. We should, too. But, wait! We can't. Not in any literal sense. Jesus is gone, and, if we are to make disciples, the only “Jesus” they can spend time with is us.

Dallas Willard emphasizes disciples as *apprentices*. In the medieval period, apprentices might be as young as 10 years old. They lived with their master craftsmen teachers year after year, studying and learning the trade and honing their skills. Then, as masters themselves, they hung up their own shingle and took on an apprentice of their own, thereby continuing the cycle. With Jesus gone, making disciples falls upon us, who presumably have been apprenticed to Jesus for some time and can now be considered “masters” who can take on “apprentices,” who will someday take on their own disciples.

Do we understand that our “job” is, first, to be a disciple of Jesus (baptized and taught to obey), and then to call someone else (a friend, colleague or fellow churchgoer) to be an apprentice under our care and guidance?

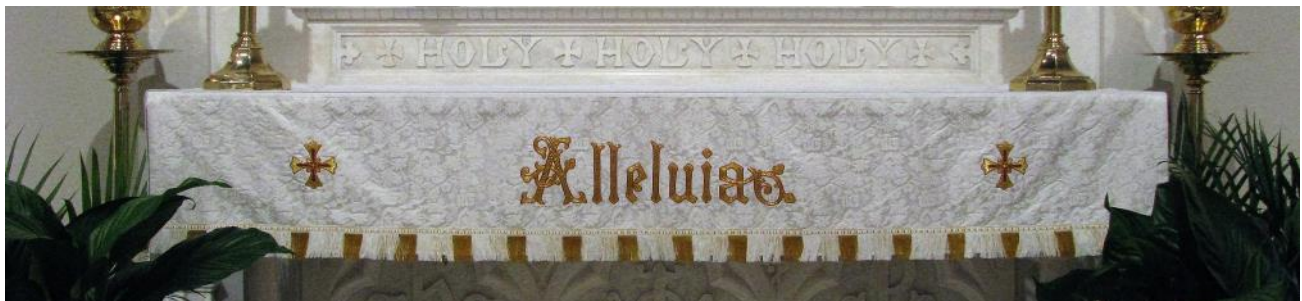
Who is your apprentice right now? Who is learning from you? Who is watching how you “do” the teachings of Jesus?

The NETFLIX people are not likely to follow you for a 10-year period. But if they did, what would they find? Would they find someone who had been “made” and “turned” into a follower of Jesus? It could be an amazing story.

towel and water gun, and wear their bathing suit (one-piece suits for girls please) under comfortable clothing and close-toed shoes that can get wet.

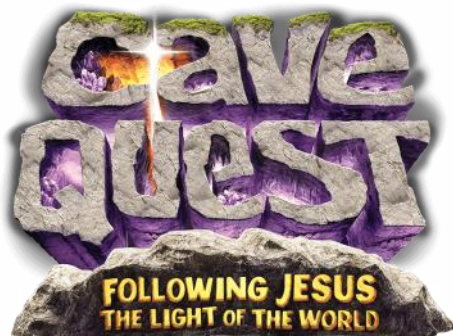
Graduation Sunday!

WHO: Children age 4 by June 1–rising 6th grade.

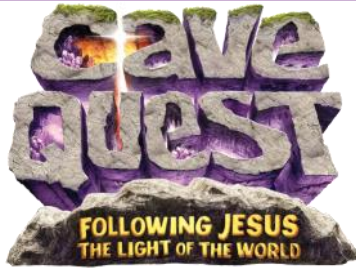

The Faith of a Mockingbird

A Small Group Study Connecting Christ and Culture

Pastor and author Matt Rawle is on a mission. He sees Christ all around him—in books, movies, TV shows, rock music—and he wants to share what he sees. As Matt says, “God offers the raw ingredients, and ‘culture’ is whatever we cook up.” In *The Faith of a Mockingbird*, based on Harper Lee’s *To Kill a Mockingbird*, Rawle uses Lee’s beloved characters to explore Christian faith, theology, and ethics. Join Scout, Atticus Finch, Boo Radley, and Tom Robinson in this four-week study considering God’s world and what it all means. Each week we will view a short DVD focusing on a particular character from the book, then have discussion.

Here is the line-up:

April 10 – Using the song of the mockingbird, Rawle describes how cultural movements affect the church and church life challenges culture, like the movements of a Spirit-inspired dance.

April 17 – Rawle uses Atticus Finch to describe the difference between a hero and a saint, and how Christ calls us to put aside our heroic aspirations for a saint’s holy calling.

April 24 – In order to explain the difficulty of recognizing systemic racism, Rawle uses how a choir stays in tune to show how easy it is for a system to miss the mark.

May 1 – Using the mystery of Boo Radley, Rawle explains how the more we practice God’s will, the more our holy imagination can capture who God is and what God is doing in the world.

This class, facilitated by the Rector, meets in Room 302 (the Library) on the third floor of the Parish Building.

Revelation: 22 Studies for Individuals and Groups

N.T. Wright for Everyone Bible Study Guides

Many regard Revelation as the hardest book in the New Testament. It is full of strange, lurid, and sometimes bizarre and violent imagery. As a result, people who are quite at home in the Gospels, Acts and Paul find themselves tiptoeing around Revelation with a sense that they don’t really belong there. But they do! This book offers one of the clearest and sharpest visions of God’s ultimate purpose for the whole creation. Here we see how the powerful forces of evil can be and are being overthrown through the victory of Jesus the Messiah and the consequent costly victory of his followers.

A starry-eyed young beauty, Marjorie Morgenstern is nineteen years old when she leaves New York to accept the job of her dreams-working in a summer-stock company for Noel Airman, its talented and intensely charismatic director. Released from the social constraints of her traditional Jewish family, and thrown into the glorious, colorful world of theater, Marjorie finds herself entangled in a powerful affair with the man destined to become the greatest-and the most destructive-love of her life.

Rich with humor and poignancy, *Marjorie Morningstar* is a classic love story, one that spans two continents and two decades in the life of its heroine. This unforgettable paean to youthful love and the bittersweet sorrow of a first heartbreak endures as one of Herman Wouk's most beloved creations.

February Vestry Meeting Highlights

Rector's Report – Fr. Reese:

- As of 1/16, there was \$208K in ops account. There is \$135K in the Foundation's checking/CDs – monies available to the vestry. We also have \$38K available from the Foundation principal as a result of the 2.25% spending allocation designated by the Foundation Board for 2015. We have another \$43K available from the Foundation principal as a result of the 2.5% spending allocation designated by the Foundation Board for 2016. We have \$68K in the parish reserve account. And there was \$1,724,209 in Foundation principal as of 12/31 (a drop of 33K for 2015). There is also approximately \$89K in the Dan Curtis fund fbo St. Andrew's within the Community Foundation of Tampa Bay, with \$3,794 in unused grant money available from 2015 and approximately \$3,400 in grant money to be made available to us for 2016 (restricted to being spent on building maintenance).
- The Vestry signed a diocesan form recommending Jerry Sather for ordination to the diaconate.
- The Parochial Report was presented for signatures and Vestry approval. Mr. Getz voted to approve, Ms. Roberts seconded. All agreed. No discussion.
- Diocesan Convention is scheduled for October 15. Irene Baker, George Levy, and Amy Ramirez volunteered to be delegates and Peter Baker volunteered to be the alternate delegate.
- Pledges for 2016 indicate we still need another \$12K in order to have a balanced budget. Fr. Reese will provide names of past pledgers who are still remiss in pledging for 2016.
- Fr. Stadel's surgery went well and he is at home. He has retired from St. Andrew's. There was discussion on having a little retirement party for him when he feels better and is on the mend.
- Fr. Reese asked for approval of the purchase of a carpet cleaner for \$400. Ms. Brown made a motion to approve. Mr. Watson seconded. All voted yes. No discussion.
- There is currently a need to upgrade to the free version of Windows 10. This will require the purchase of two new computers to be used by Fr. Reese and Kathy Jenkins. The hardware upgrade will cost a total of \$1,708. Mr. Getz made a motion to approve the expense. Mr. Morgan seconded. All voted yes. No discussion.
- Gino's at 10006 N. Armenia was selected as the site for the Vestry retreat. There will be a buffet, salad, bread and dessert for about \$15 per person. It was agreed to meet on April 9, 2016, from 10 a.m. – 3 p.m. Irene offered to facilitate the meeting using the Myers Briggs "type" personality indicator that each vestry member could take online. Since this meeting is so close to the monthly vestry meeting, and since so many vestry members will be in Guatemala during the second half of April, it was agreed to cancel the meeting on April 18 and hold the regular monthly vestry meeting in conjunction with the vestry retreat on April 9. There is also a diocesan-wide Vestry retreat at DaySpring on Saturday, May 7 from 9 a.m. – 3 p.m. on May. *(continued)*

Senior Warden: Jeff reported on cabinets donated and suggested Chris Cobb could possibly replace some pictures with newer and fresher ones. Along with this there was discussion on getting Wi-Fi for the narthex to promote a Facebook page. Also discussed outgoing Vestry members to create a list of duties and experiences for their various committees. Amy volunteered to put it all together in a handbook.

Junior Warden: George reported on the on-going mission of getting quotes and going about the best way to move forward on the repairs of the cracks in the church, especially where water intrusion is a major problem.

Treasurer: Peter Baker said the situation was standard. The largest expense was the quarterly payment for property insurance.

Outreach: Loueita reported a well-attended meeting the past Sunday. Easter Boxes of Hope and the request for washcloths for March's Klean Kits will be in next Sunday's bulletin. Holly reported that her nephew would be in charge of supplying and cooking the fish for the next St. Andrew's Day Fish Fry. This information was well received. We will be very happy to have SnookMan helping us out this year.

Irene Baker is putting shawls in the church for use by those who get chilly during service and would like this and other stewardship items to be included in the bulletin.
