Dear People of St. Andrew's,

What are some of the symptoms of integrity deficit disorder?

A person who is afflicted with this disorder knows what's right but doesn't follow through and do what's right. He or she makes a promise or commitment, then fails to keep it. Thus when you meet a person with integrity deficit disorder you're never quite sure if you can trust that person or not.

A second symptom is also one of the causes: people who have integrity deficit disorder live from the outside in rather than from the inside out. They let their feelings and emotional responses of the moment govern their behavior more than doing what's right regardless of their feelings of the moment.

To put it another way, people with integrity deficit disorder are reactive rather than proactive. Reactive individuals base their decisions and actions on the outward circumstances of the moment, what's going on around them. If someone is rude to them, they are rude in return. They are affected by their social environment. Reactive people build their emotional lives around the behavior of others, empowering the weaknesses of other people to control them. They let other people decide how they are going to act.

In addition, reactive people are often affected by the physical environment. If the weather is good, they feel good. If it isn't, they let it affect their attitude and their performance. Worse still, reactive people blame whatever happens to them on someone or something outside of them. They rarely take any responsibility for what's happened to them. It's always the fault of someone or something else.

In the comic strip, *Frank and Ernest*, two bums are sitting along a wall talking with each other. One says to the other, "Do you believe in fate?" The other replies, "Sure. I'd hate to think I turned out like this because of something I had control over."

On the other hand, proactive people carry their own weather with them. Whether it rains or shines makes no difference to them. They are value driven and if their value is to produce good quality work it isn't a function of whether the weather is conducive to it or not. Proactive people also do not let the social environment control their actions or decisions.

That's where integrity comes in. Having integrity is about behaving in the way you promised to behave even though the mood in which you made the promises has changed or the environment outside you has changed. If you have integrity it protects you from your changing moods, desires and feelings. It even protects you from the changing moods of other people. It protects you from saying you are going to something and then not following through.

One day Jesus told a story designed for people who have integrity deficit disorder. His target audience were people who claimed to be the most religious. In his story about the father who asks each of his sons to go work in the vineyard, Jesus makes clear who is obedient and who is not; (continued)

who has the integrity to follow the rules and who only pretends to do so.

The son who does the work, although he initially claims he won't, is obedient. The other son, the one who lies, telling his dad that he'll get the job done, but doesn't have the intention of doing so, is disobedient and defiant. His manners, of course, are impeccable – but he lacks integrity.

In the end, it's not what the sons *say* that matters eternally. It's what they *do*. It's their behavior. "Just tell 'em what they want to hear, then do what you want" is the credo of the bad lad. This sweet-tongued son looks, at first, like a clean-cut kid. He's slick. He's quick. He talks a good game. But he's a bad, bad boy whose outsides hide his disobedience. He's not to be trusted. He lies to his dad, as if his dad isn't ever going to discover just what type of person this son is. As if his dad isn't going to see through his charade.

The Christian faith is a showy faith. It isn't a private religion, because Christianity is a DOING religion. Works matter, as the letter of James shows. Faith matters, of course, but so do works. What we do, how we behave, matters.

Deceitful Christians may fool themselves into thinking they have fooled the world, but they can't fool God. We're all transparent before God. We hide nothing.

It's like that old-time saying about preachers: "The best sermon I ever heard was watching how the preacher lived, not listening to what he said."

The truthful son, who speaks his mind plainly, doesn't tell his dad what his dad wants to hear. Dad asks for help. He answers honestly, "No, sir. Not me."

Maybe that boy speaks rashly. Maybe he isn't as smooth, as slick or as refined as his brother ... but, eventually, he does what's required of him. He doesn't sneak off. He rolls the idea around in his head, makes up his mind and without another word, zooms off to do the obedient thing.

An awful lot of people put too much stock in what appears, rather than what is. Certain individuals may want to appear to be good Christians. They want to go to the right church, to be seen with the right people and to give to the right charities. They may wear the right clothes. They may read the right books, speak the right words, look the right part, but maybe they're like the son who lies to his father, expecting never to get caught. But like the Pharisees, the truth becomes plain to see.

Jesus points to the prostitutes and tax collectors, whose appearance isn't religious but whose hearts are. These people aren't synagogue people. They are scorned people. Outcasts. They're barely tolerated, and often despised. Jesus says the prostitutes and tax men are going to get into heaven before the holier-than-thou Pharisees. Before them. Why?

Because the prostitutes and tax collectors see, hear and believe. They know squat about the law and care little about rules, but they know enough to recognize the truth when they hear it. Once they hear it, their hearts change. Once their hearts change, they live their faith.

Our task is simply to do, with integrity, what God asks us to do. And leave the rest to God.

Moses: In the Footsteps of the Reluctant Prophet

It doesn't get much more dramatic: rescued baby, life in the courts of Pharaoh, parting the Red Sea, leading his people out of Egypt...Moses' life was one challenge after the next, but although he resisted God's calling, by the end of his life he successfully fulfilled the role he was given. Join award-winning author Adam Hamilton as he travels and explores the sites of Moses' life. As Hamilton shares historical information, archaeological data, and biblical text, you'll gain a better understanding of Moses' significance in your life today, and you'll discover how you, too, can turn your own reluctance into boldness.

This six-session DVD study was filmed on location in Egypt, Mt. Sinai, the Nile, the Red Sea, and the wilderness areas where Moses lived and traveled. Each week we will watch a 10-12 minute video, then have our own discussion. Here is the rest of the line-up:

August Vestry Meeting Highlights

RECTOR'S REPORT - Fr. Reese:

- As of 8/14/17, there was \$135,538 in ops account. We have \$170,262 in the parish reserve account. There is \$13,223 in the Foundation's checking/CDs monies available to the vestry. We also have \$37,783 available from the Foundation principal as a result of the 2.25% spending allocation designated by the Foundation Board for 2015. We have another \$43,324 available from the Foundation principal as a result of the 2.5% spending allocation designated by the Foundation Board for 2016 at their meeting on 2/8/16. We have another \$53,473 available from the Foundation principal as a result of the 3% spending allocation designated by the Foundation Board for 2017 at their meeting on 2/21/17. And there was \$1,988,252 in the Foundation principal as of 6/30/17 (up \$123K from 12/31/16). There is also \$95K in the Dan Curtis fund fbo St. Andrew's within the Community Foundation of Tampa Bay, with \$3.2K in grant money available for the rest of 2017.
- Donovan Audio Design (DAD) Project Sony TV in Parish Hall was installed on 7/18. We have a DVD player in Parish Hall AV room hooked up to system. Just use HDMI 2 on the TV to play the DVD. If you wish to use a laptop for a PowerPoint presentation, plug it into the jack underneath the TV and coffee cup table and use HDMI 4. It's a smart TV, so while using the Parish Hall Wi-Fi, you can watch Netflix or Youtuber videos without needing a laptop. Lots of possibilities.
- Annual audits Al and Brad have finished the audits thanks, guys! We will need to approve the audits at the August meeting, since deadline to remit to diocese is 9/1.
- Diocesan Convention Convocation is on Wednesday, 9/6 at 7:00pm at St. Peter's Cathedral in St. Petersburg. All delegates need to attend this gathering. Our intrepid volunteers are Gary Cotter, Al Getz, and George Levy (with Jeff Coleman as the alternate).
- Reznor Problem The dehumidifier in the church has had it. George negotiated a replacement for it through CGM, our HVAC people. Cost for the new Trane unit would be \$12,107. There is a \$4,750 credit built into it, since we paid CGM \$4,750 to repair it a while back. They agreed that if the repair job did not work and we needed a new unit, they would credit us for the \$4,750 we spent in vain to fix it. Proposal was emailed to the vestry.
- Jeff Coleman requested that we acquire an old laptop to leave in the AV room for use with the new TV in the Parish Hall. Gary Cotter agreed to donate one.

Audit: Gary Cotter made a motion that the Parish Audit be approved. The motion was seconded by Brad Hall. The motion was approved.

Brad Hall made a motion that the Foundation Audit be approved. The motion was seconded by Chris Capsambellis. The motion was approved.

SENIOR WARDEN'S REPORT - Jeff Coleman:

Jeff asked if someone will head up a table for the vestry for Rally Day. It might help with nominations.

New ovens have been installed in the Parish Hall. Jim Carmichael made it look good.

Abbey Dohring Ahern of The Dohring Group addressed the vestry. She suggested rent of (continued)

\$18-20 per square foot for the 6th floor as is. Could benefit from tax incentives for renting to Not for Profit tenants. 5 years is the standard commitment. Diocese will be involved in approval process of tenants (s).

Total fees to agent are 8%. Dohring is willing to discount her rate. May be able to get tenant's brokers to lower their rate as well. Tenant would pay for 1/6 of elevator and other common areas. Estimated time to find a tenant would be 3 to 4 months. 3% rent escalations expected on a 5-year lease.

Jeff Coleman distributed a report outlining some scenarios.

We need to inform the parishioners of what we want to do (i.e. 6th floor). Fr. Reese suggests an article in "The Call" and to address the church during services as well as weekly email and Sunday bulletin.

Jeff suggested we sort out asbestos on 4th and 5th floors and the drawings. Jeff Coleman made a motion to remove asbestos on 4th and 5th floors at \$27,500 and proceed with drawings from Rojo for \$11,750 to be paid from reserve fund. The motion was seconded by Morgan. Discussion followed. The Motion was amended to pay asbestos and drawings out of foundation funds. The motion passed 7-5.

Dates for the choir's trip to the Dominican Republic are May $26^{\rm th}$ to June $4^{\rm th}$.

JUNIOR WARDEN'S REPORT - George Levy:

Estimates for termite treatment in the church are \$7,141 from Chet's and \$13,780 from Haskell's.

George made the motion that \$7,200 plus and additional \$500 for contractor prep be paid out of reserve fund. The motion was seconded by Gary Cotter. The motion was carried.

Quote for Trane dehumidifier from CGM Services came in at \$12,107. George made a motion to approve purchase out of the reserve fund. Al Getz seconded the motion. The motion was carried. George will pursue warranty beyond 1 year.

TRESURER'S REPORT - Gary Cotter:

Gary reported that we are ahead of last July's revenue but revenue is off. This is not a good trend. Fr John requested that Gary write up something for the bulletin to highlight this situation.

Gary will head up videotaping our inventory. Lori will assist.


