## Reverendly Speaking

"The Spirit of the Lord is upon me, because he has anointed me to bring good news to the poor. He has sent me to proclaim release to the captives and recovery of sight to the blind, to let the oppressed go free, to proclaim the year of the Lord's favor."

Luke 4:18-19

Dear People of St. Andrew's,

Early in his ministry, Jesus went to his hometown synagogue in Nazareth on the Sabbath and was asked to read the biblical text for the day. He read from Isaiah 61:1-2. "The Spirit of the Lord is upon me, because he has anointed me to bring good news to the poor. He has sent me to proclaim release to the captives and recovery of sight to the blind, to let the oppressed go free, to proclaim the year of the Lord's favor" (Luke 4:18-19).

If you compare Jesus' rendition of two verses from Isaiah 61 to the verses as they appear in Isaiah, you'll see that Jesus stopped short of reading the full passage, which contains the line "[to proclaim] the day of vengeance of our God."

After reading the text, Jesus tells the congregation, "Today this scripture has been fulfilled in your hearing," and in so saying, he seems to be declaring that the parts of the two verses he *did* read comprise a kind of mission statement about his work. The fact that he left out that other part suggests that he didn't see his work as proclaiming the Lord's vengeance.

Last year in the U.K., a poll of more than 2,000 adults showed that the majority of respondents linked religion and violence in their view not only of history but of this present age. In short, the survey found that although 61 percent of people believe the teachings of religions are essentially peaceful, 70 percent think that most wars in world history have been caused by religions and religious extremists.

It may be some small comfort to know that only 8 percent think religions are inherently violent, but that comfort is likely blown away when we learn that 47 percent think the world would be more peaceful if no one were religious! It's just like that old John Lennon song, *Imagine*. "And no religion, too....Imagine all the people living life in peace."

But drawing on this study, Robin Gill, an emeritus professor of Applied Theology at the University of Kent, acknowledges that there are passages in religious texts that, when handled badly, lend themselves to a violent interpretation. Nonetheless, he argues that Muslims, Jews and Christians can and should read those passages in a way that builds peace rather than violence. Commentators on the study say that it is a challenge to all religious people to denounce religious violence and handle their sacred texts with care.

We should note that the assumption that most wars are caused by religion is not borne out by a study of history. Gill's report says, "It is not obvious that either of the World Wars that blighted the 20th Century were directly caused by religious factors, ... In addition, of the four dictators in the 20th Century most responsible for killing millions and millions of people (including their own citizens) — Stalin, Mao Zedong, Pol Pot and Hitler — three were committed atheists and Hitler's religious beliefs were by no means conventional."

And according to Philip and Axelrod's three-volume *Encyclopedia of Wars* (published 2008), there have been more than 1,700 wars fought in human history. Of these, the authors include only 123 of them (7 percent) as being related to a religious cause.

That said, the causes of wars are never simple and seldom straightforward, and religious motivations may be involved in the mix of reasons people go into any war. In any case, the attacks of 9/11, which the extremist Muslim perpetrators declared were motivated by religious views, have fed the misperception that religion is behind most wars and that the world would be more peaceful without any religions.

Still, any amount of religious violence is harmful, and when it is perpetrated by Christians, it makes Jesus' mission statement in Nazareth sound like fake news.

It would seem that the folks in the Nazareth synagogue that morning weren't much interested in handling their sacred texts with care. They wanted those texts to say what they believed, rather than believe what those texts said. And used that way, the texts became justification for attempted murder.

We need to approach our Scriptures with faith *and* intelligence. If Jesus left out the vengeance stuff, maybe we should, too. Retribution and vengeance — it's just not part of the church's mission.

We should read the Bible with a peaceful intent, putting the texts that can be used to support violence into a context consistent with the overall message of Scripture and one that does not bring shame to the name of Jesus, the Prince of Peace.





#### Anxious for Nothing: Finding Calm in a Chaotic World

According to the National Institute of Mental Health, anxiety disorders are reaching epidemic proportions. We are tense. Why? Change is one reason. Sociologists speculate the world has changed more in the last thirty years than it has in the last three hundred Every day seems to bring new change and threats. We also face personal challenges job loss, cancer, divorce, addiction, bankruptcy. Add to personal challenges those of a global nature imported into our lives every few seconds thanks to smart phones, TVs, and computer screens.

Anxiety just comes with life. However, as God's Word reveals, it doesn't have to *dominate* life. In this five-session video-based Bible study, Max Lucado looks at seven admonitions from the apostle Paul in Philippians 4:4-8 that lead to one wonderful promise: "The peace of God which surpasses all understanding." As he unpacks each verse, he shows how God is ready to give comfort to help us face the calamities in life, view bad news through the lens of sovereignty, discern the lies of Satan, and tell ourselves the truth. We *can* be anxious for nothing, and discover true peace from God that surpasses all human understanding.

#### Happy? What It is and How to Find It

What's keeping you from being happy? Do you really have to lose weight or find a new job before you can say you're happy? No matter how hard we try, happiness can seem elusive. Even as we reach our goals, we set new ones, making happiness always out of reach. In this video study, Matt Miofsky, lead pastor of The Gathering United Methodist Church in St. Louis, helps us discover that contentment isn't dependent on the "things" of life. Instead, he'll help us see that happiness can be found in the value of our relationships, a forgiving lifestyle, living in the present, feeling gratitude, and learning to release control.

This four-week study uses basic theology and the words of Solomon.

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## **December 2018 Vestry Meeting Highlights**

#### RECTOR'S REPORT - Fr. Reese

\*As of 12/10/18, there was \$92,985 in ops account and \$109,110 in the parish reserve account. As of 6/30/18, there is \$19,379 in the Foundation's checking account – monies available to the vestry. We have another \$43,324 available from the Foundation principal as a result of the 2.5% spending allocation designated by the Foundation Board for 2016 at their meeting on 2/8/16. We have another \$53,473 available from the Foundation principal as a result of the 3% spending allocation designated by the Foundation Board for 2017 at their meeting on 2/21/17. We have another \$75,659 available from the Foundation principal as a result of the 4% spending allocation designated by the Foundation Board for 2018 at their meeting on 2/21/18. And there was \$2,451,867 in the Foundation principal as of 12/10/18, down from \$2,596,448 on 9/30/18 - a decrease of \$144,581 over that period. Northern Trust has been in contact and is not concerned about the downturn. There is also \$103,437 in the Dan Curtis fund fbo St. Andrew's within the Community Foundation of Tampa Bay, with \$7,237 in grant money currently available (a combination of unused past distributions and the distribution for 2018).

\*Annual Stewardship Campaign – is ongoing. The third round of pledge cards went out 11/29. Currently, we have 118 pledges for 321K. There are still 55 pledgers who pledged 111K in 2018 whom we have not heard from for 2019. With that in mind, you will receive names and phone numbers of such people at the vestry meeting on Monday. I have attached sample copies of how to make your phone calls. *Please make every effort to attend Monday's meeting!* Postcard pledge reminders will go out on 12/18 and 1/8.
